### New Lumbering Locality.

The new lumbering center about ten miles west of Hobart, in Lake county, is likely to grow to considerable proportions, tle population already numbering 200 people. One hundred and fifty men are employed by John Canfield, who is logging and transporting about 50,000 feet of timber to Pine river each day, over a narrow gauge railway, six miles in length, N Slaght & Co have purchased the shingle mill of Mr. Sprague, together with 1,200 acres of pine purchased of them about a year ago, and are running it on full force turning out about 40,000 shingles per day Tney have also put in a general stock of goods for the convenience of the employe and other workmen and settlers in that vicinity. W. F. Stuart is also operating his shingle mill, which has the same daily capacity as the Slaght mill. The product of both mills is being piled proparatory to the construction of a spur railway track from Hobart early next season. N. Slaght & Co own 9.000 acres of pine in one tract, and control 9 000 acres additional, which they hold on contract from John Ca field. The settlement is fast attaining a position of business importance, and steps wil shortly be taken to secure the location of postoffice there .- Michigan Tradesman.

The chief function of the muscles is to contract, and thus to move a given part by drawing toward itself the tendon which connects the two-the part and the muscle. Some of the muscles are moved by a nerve-force sent from the brain by the will-others act independently of the will, as most of the internal muscles. Still others-as the muscles concerned in breathing-are in the main independent of the will, and yet can be controlled by it to some extent.

Again, even those whose ordinary movements are determined by the will. can be operated on independently of it by what is called "redex" nervous action. In this case a sensation runs up to one of the brain-centers, and then, without going as high as the region of intelligence, runs down a nerve of motion to the supposed muscle.

This is so with the convulsive movements of hysteria, epilepsy, etc. Habitual acts become in time largely, if not wholly, reflex, thus relieving the mind from superintending them. A bird can fly and a fish can swim without a brain-through this reflex power.

No one knows what the moving force is which so wonderfully plays between the brain and the muscles. It is not electricity, although the muscles even of a dead man can be moved by this latter force. In every department of science we soon strike the limits of the knowable.

Sometimes, as in cholera (St. Vitus dance), there is a wild movement of the muscles, often fearfully violent and utteriy uncontrollable. Michigan Crop Report, November, '84

For this report returns have been received from 736 correspondents representing 566 townships. Five hundred and five of these returns are from 357 townships in the southern four tiers of counties.

The weight of the measured bushel of wheat of the crop of 1884 is 10i per cent of full weight, or sixty and 60 hundredths

pounds.

The area seeded to wheat this fall in the southern four tiers of counties is estimated at 94 per cent, and in the northern counties 98 per cent. of the area seeded in 1883, indicating a present acreage in the southern counties of 1,225,852 acres, and in the northera counties of 228,205 acses. The condition of wheat November 1 was 107, the

THE official count in the state of New York elects the Democrat electors, which gives Cleveland & Hendricks 219 of the .401 electoral votes. We hope that Mr. Cleveland will make wise and conservative executive officer.

THE prospects are that the lumber woods of Michigan will not furnish the amount of work this winter they have in years past. All of the operators with whom we have talked state that they will put in less than half the number of feet they did last year. This is caused by the uncertainty of the market and the large amount of lumbor still on the docks.

IF ANY lumbermen are holding their hands from their customary operations in the woods on account of the uncertainty in which the tariff on lumber is involved, we cannot discover valid substantial reasons for such a course. Conceding that the duty is sure to be reduced, leaving the timber in the woods will not prevent loss overtaking the owners. Whereever the timber is, it will depreciate in value, and no more in the lumber piles than on the stump. If the production of the manufactured article is excessive, to curtail operations is the proper thing, but if there will be a market for the lumber it may as well be cut, since a reduction in value will overtake it as well in one place as another -if a reduction is to come.-B, C. 
