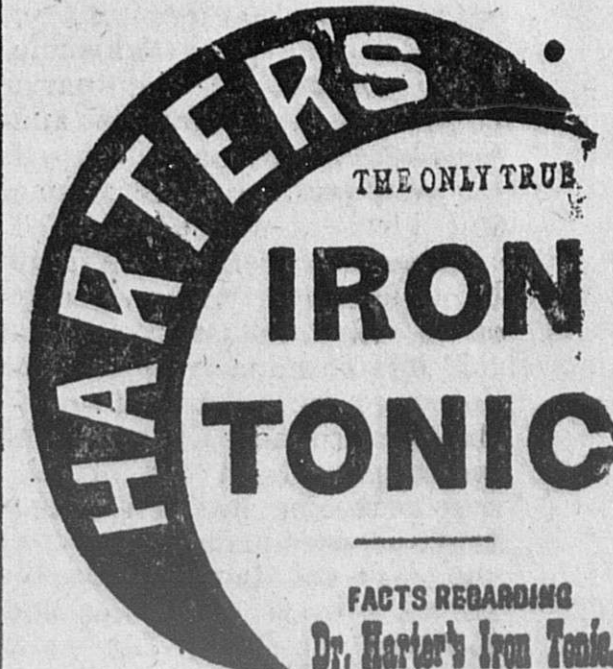

OWING to the recent pardoning of Henry B. Farrington by Gov. Begole the following article which was published in the Au Sable News Oct. 11th 1877 and republished by the Saturday Night, last week, will undoubtedly be interesting to our readers:

The case of The People vs. Henry B. Farrington, was called on the 31st of Oct., Hon. J. B. Tuttle, Circuit Judge presiding, Farrington was arraigned for two heinous crimes: first, for the murder of William Stewart, a liquor dealer and drover, in Au Sable, on the night of the 25th of October, 1875, second, for an assault with intent to kill or murder Richard J. Nye, a turnkey in Iosco county jail.

Henry B. Farrington, the accused, kept a small jewelry store in Au Sable [on the corner at the iron bridge]. His reputation has always been bad. Twenty-five years ago he was a bully and gambler traveling up and down St. Clair river on the boats company with a boon companion named Westbrook. He had a little shop in St. Clair, but never did much legitimate business there or here. He has ever been known as one of the worst and most blasphemous talkers on the shore. A moderately profane man would shudder to hear him "cuss." To sum up—Farrington is and ever has been a fiend—a more perfect "Bill Sykes" than the one Dickens portrayed.

Here the prosecution rested their case. To everybody's surprise the prisoner's counsel announced that they had no defense to put in. *** At the appointed hour court was opened and Judge Tuttle, delivered an impartial and masterly charge to the jury, and sent them out to find a verdict. Not more than fifteen minutes had elapsed before the jury returned and through their foreman announced that they had arrived at a verdict. The interest, the breathless interest, of the people crowding the spacious court room was most intense, and the scene one never to be forgotten as the verdict, "Guilty of murder in the first degree," was rendered. Judge Tuttle then asked Farrington if he had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon him, whereupon the prisoner [his face indicating no emotion, nothing save possibly a slightly increased pallor] said: "My attorneys have smelt woolen and left," he then made an incoherent, disjointed harangue of half an hour's length, the most bitter, the most revengeful tirade, in which he assailed judge, jury, witnesses and men of Au Sable in language such as only he himself could use, when the presiding officer of the court peremptorily, stopped him, and said: "Prisoner at the bar, you are the most guilty man I have ever seen; if an angel from heaven were to tell me you are innocent of the crime of which you stand convicted, I should tell him to go back and bring the rest of the anemic host to confirm it." The silence was actually oppressive as Judge Tuttle passed sentence upon the murderer of Wm. Stewart, consigning him to "Solitary Confinement at Hard Labor for Life." Not a muscle moved in the man's face as he heard his doom pronounced, and he passed from the room with his head as high as ever. The universal opinion is that he received his just deserts.

THE Au Sable Monitor is determined to make the Legislature anything but Republican, (by the way the Monitor is an independent paper.) Since getting left in its calculations in regard to Mr. Henry, over which he felt so confident that he headed his article in reference thereto with a rooster and headlines "who will crow for Henry now," he has discovered the startling fact that several Republican members elect of the Legislature are Knight of Labor. We were not aware that being a member of that organization necessarily made a Republican a Democrat. We are acquainted with several members of the K. of L. who were Republicans when they joined and we notice that they are just as strong Republicans yet. The Monitor predicts, in case senator Conger should resign, that in consequence of these few Republicans being members of the Knights of Labor they will work with the Democrats and elect a Democrat senator in the place of Conger. The Monitor's prediction will not cause any particular consternation in political circles as he was altogether too profuse and wildly erroneous in them last fall.
