The Agricultural Society had a very slim meeting at the court house Tuesday last. We are sorry to say that most of those present wanted office and some got left. Do you want to incorporate into a city East Tawas and Tawas City? East Tawas wants to join hands with Tawas City and consolidate into a city of about four wards, which by adding the mayor and city attorney and a supervisor from each ward would give us six supervisors on the board to guard against removing the court house.

Representative Orth has put a bill in the legislature asking that two terms of the circuit court of this county be held in AuSable. If Mr. Orth could see the stand our Supervisors took on this measure the past week he would let the matter drop just where it is. After the matter was debated for about a half-a-day several votes and amendments was had and the result was that each resolution was buried and the people are indignant over the matter.

Sheriff Bradley made service on Supervisor Miner the fore part of this month with three gilt edge Plank road judgements, or what you might call executions. But it was to late to have any effect this year. Our sheriff had been laying in ambush for over a month awaiting the arrival of Mr. Miner. And of course he made service upon the first opportunity, Mr. being absent from the seat of war, out of this county. Wake up taxpayers and prepare to meet the enemy at the spring election.

A MOMENT OF TERROR.

White Camping Out a Rattlesnake Crawls
 Up a Hunter's Trousers.
 Dr. Sampson and J. K. Snyder, both of Centerville, Conn., had an experience recently that they will never forget. They camped at the lower dam on Swift Run near a ledge of rocks on the night in question, and before darkness came upon them they scraped a lot of leaves together for a bed and provided a pile of wood to keep up a fire during the night. About ten o'clock they prepared for sleep and drawing a blanket over them lay down to pleasant dreams.

Along toward one o'clock Mr. Snyder felt chilly, and got up to put some more wood on the fire, and then lay down and soon fell into a deep sleep from which he was awakened by a cold object which seemed to be resting on his left leg. Without moving he lay awake waiting for developments. The next moment he felt an indescribable sensation come over him, which seemed to paralyze every nerve in his body. Realizing that there was something extraordinary the matter he called to the doctor to hurry and get up, as something was crawling up the right leg of his pantaloons and he believed it was a snake.

The words went through the doctor like an electric shock, and raking a brand out of the fire he approached Mr. Snyder, who was lying as if paralyzed, with the cold sweat standing in big beads on his forehead. Half blinded by the flickering flame of the brand he noticed what at first looked like a broad strap hanging out of Mr. Snyder's trouser leg, but the next moment exclaimed:

"My God, Snyder, lie still; it's a rattlesnake!"
 Trembling like a leaf, Mr. Snyder seemed powerless to move even if he would. The condition of things was at once evident. The reptile had been attracted to the fire and sought warmth on the person of Mr. Snyder. Every moment she disappeared further up the leg, and prompt action was necessary. Grasping the snake by the tail, the doctor pulled with all his might. His hand slipped, and the rattlesnake, fourteen in number, came off and remained in his hand. The reptile had wrapped itself around the bare skin on the man's leg and violently shook his derelict tail, indicating anger at such harsh treatment. This performance also threw Mr. Snyder into convulsions.

Recovering himself, the doctor brought himself of his knife, and quickly opening a blade, keen as a razor, he cut the pantaloons up to the body. This released the snake, and she quickly unwound and threw herself into a coil, ready for effective work, but before she could strike the doctor struck her a blow with a club that cut her clean in two. Mr. Snyder was lifted by the arms and dragged away from the hideous serpent and the next moment was on his feet, scarcely able to stand.

FAITHFUL SLAVE.

The Story of Uncle Dave Who Was Andrew Jackson's Body-Servant.

A character whose name should be in history is dead in an adjoining county. He was known as "Uncle Dave." All who knew him respected him. He was brought to this section in 1814 by his masters, Colonel John Hutchings and General Andrew Jackson. They settled on a farm about ten miles above the present site of Sheffield and opposite the mouth of Elk river. This farm was famous as the Jackson stock farm, and is the property of Alexander Jackson. Uncle Dave was always a body servant and the trusted lieutenant of General Jackson in all things that could be confided to a servant. He was carried with his master into the Indian Territory when the famous treaty was made. He was also carried with General Coffee on several important surveys. He carried the chain when General Jackson and associates laid off York Bluff, now Sheffield. He was the first man to ride the imported stallion Leviathan and took as much interest in the racing string as any of the owners.

Colonel Hutchings died and General Jackson carried the slaves, Uncle Dave among them, to the plantation of General Coffee, who was administrator of Colonel Hutchings. There Uncle Dave was foreman, and continued to fill the position with ability and credit till 1833, when his young master, Colonel Andrew Jackson Hutchings, came home. Uncle Dave was then made head gardener and put in charge of the private carriage of the family. The young man





The Story of Uncle Dave Who Was Andrew Jackson's Body-Servant.

A character whose name should be in history is dead in an adjoining county. He was known as "Uncle Dave." All who knew him respected him. He was brought to this section in 1814 by his masters, Colonel John Hutchings and General Andrew Jackson. They settled on a farm about ten miles above the present site of Sheffield and opposite the mouth of Elk river. This farm was famous as the Jackson stock farm, and is the property of Alexander Jackson. Uncle Dave was always a body servant and the trusted lieutenant of General Jackson in all things that could be confided to a servant. He was carried with his master into the Indian Territory when the famous treaty was made. He was also carried with General Coffee on several important surveys. He carried the chain when General Jackson and associates laid off York Bluff, now Sheffield. He was the first man to ride the imported stallion Leviathan and took as much interest in the racing string as any of the owners.

Colonel Hutchings died and General Jackson carried the slaves, Uncle Dave among them, to the plantation of General Coffee, who was administrator of Colonel Hutchings. There Uncle Dave was foreman, and continued to fill the position with ability and credit till 1833, when his young master, Colonel Andrew Jackson Hutchings, came home. Uncle Dave was then made head gardener and put in charge of the private carriage of the family. The young man repeatedly offered him his freedom, but it was declined. The young master died and Uncle Dave returned to his position as foreman of the plantation. He remained in that position until the war broke out. All the men of the family went into the rebellion and Uncle Dave was in entire charge of the plantation and all on it during the war. He was as faithful to the trust reposed in him and as loyal to the family as any man whose name embrazons the pages of history, while the manliness displayed in the discharge of every duty reposed in him won the admiration of all.

The most beautiful, touching and pathetic feature of his life was the devotion to the memory of his wife, Katie, who was born in 1792 and died in 1842. He never married again, but every day at the same hour, in slavery and freedom, he went to her grave, and kneeling there, offered a fervent prayer. He was a Christian, and no one doubted his religion, his honesty, his fidelity or his truth. The exact date of his birth is not known, but he was at least a centenarian, and from the best data to be had he was one hundred and eighty years old. His body will be buried beside that of Katie.—Sheffield (Ala.) Letter.

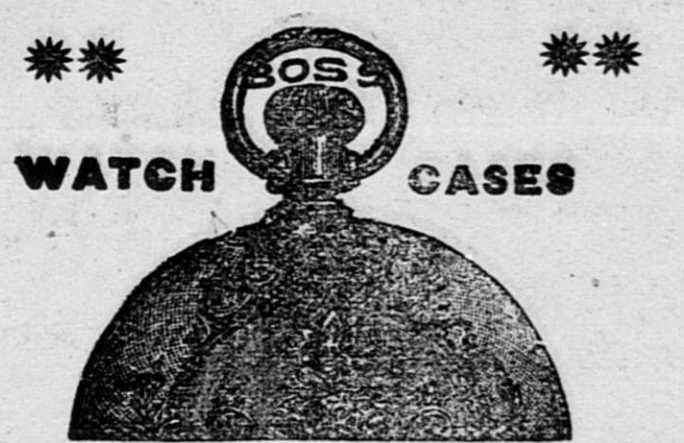
