Besides the above condensed report we would submit the following brief statement regarding the workings of the school during the past year:

At the opening of the year, special attention was given to the importance of regularity in attendance; to secure this the teachers strove to impress upon the pupils its importance, as well as establishing some special devices by which each department was put upon competition for honors. The results have been good; and although the absence and tardiness seem great, yet it has been by a comparatively few, and nearly all have been at their post each day during the whole year.

Special stress has been put upon the common branches, the importance of reading, writing, arithmetic and spelling has not been lost sight of, all being taught in each department of the schools. The progress upon these subjects has been all that could be expected; remembering that the mind of the child has a steady and natural growth, not instantaneous.

The special attention given to rhetorical work has been marked with improvement on the part of pupils in this line of work, the result of which, we trust has been fully certified by those who have taken part in the public exercises of the past week.

The policy of the school for the past year has been, not to introduce every new theory and notion that are prevalent, as in all other spheres of labor, but to use well what we have at hand that has previously been tried and found practical.

Although some three hundred pupils have gathered together daily upon the school grounds, no accidents serious or trivial, has occurred. But few brawls between pupils have taken place. Misdemeanors on the part of pupils deserving punishment have been rare, and hence corporal punishment inflicted in but few cases compared to the number in attendance. These results are gratifying to us, and we hope impress the patrons of the schools that a good healthy discipline has been sustained.

In outlining the years work, we would not forget the assistant teachers; who have at all times shown a disposition to do their duty, and who have been conscientious instructors, doing all in their power to better the condition of the young placed under their charge.

Hence if the work has been a success, we would tender them due praise for their untiring efforts.

To the Board of Education, as a whole, we would tender our thanks for your support and co-operation. And solicit the same interest on your part the coming year as you have given in the past; and assure you if your acts in the future are marked with discretion, the schools of this village need not rank second to any of their kind in the state of Michigan. The foundation is well built; what the superstructure will be, lies with you.

With but few exceptions no jar has occurred between parents and teachers. For this concert of action on the part of patrons, which is so

necessary to the success of the schools we are grateful. With your continued interest and good will in the future, the progress of your children is sure.

Lastly, to the pupils who have, as a whole, conformed so cheerfully to the regulations of the school; who have been so faithful to every duty; so regular in attendance, and so kind to your teachers, to you we owe our gratitude. If your efforts in the future are characterized by such application and zeal as has marked them during the past year, your success is inevitable. Let none wane by the wayside on their journey from the first to the topmost round on the ladder which leads to knowledge. Although some of the steps may seem too great, yet when they have all been scaled and the summit has been reached you will be the stronger men and women for the struggle of life.

Homestead Laws.

A great many people in this vicinity make inquiries relative to the homestead laws, and for their benefit we publish a brief synopsis of the same.

The act of 1878 to encourage the growth of timber on the western prairies was repealed by congress and the act approved March 3rd, 1891; also all laws allowing pre-emption of the public lands of the U. S. as heretofore.

The homestead laws have not been repealed, but an act has been passed and approved amending them. The law now is: Every person who is the head of a family, or who has arrived at the age of 21 years and is a citizen of the United States, or who has filed his declaration of intention as required by the naturalization laws, shall be entitled to enter one quarter section, or a less quantity, of unappropriated public lands, to be located in a body in conformity to the legal subdivisions of the lands; but no person who is the proprietor of more than 160 acres of land in any state or territory, shall acquire any right under the homestead law. And every person owning and residing on land may, under the provisions of this section, enter other land lying contiguous to his land, which shall not, with the land so already owned and occupied, exceed in aggregate 160 acres.

The homesteader is required, before he can become a homesteader, to make an affidavit that his application is honestly and in good faith made for the purpose of actual settlement and cultivation by himself, and not for any other person. The cost of entry is \$5 for 80 acres and \$10 for 160 acres.

After a homesteader has occupied his land as required by law for 14 months, he can at any time thereafter, if he desires it, make, make final purchase of his entry at the minimum price—\$1 25 per acre.

No public lands of the United States can hereafter be sold at public sale, except abandoned military or other reservations, isolated and disconnected fractional tracts and minerals and other lands the sale of which at public auction has been authorized by acts of congress of a special nature having local application.
