COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS
(OFFICIAL.)
The village council met in regular session at the village hall, Monday evening, Nov. 23, 1891. In the absence of the President and President Pro. Tem. it was moved by Murphy supported by Bonney that Mr. Smith take the chair for the evening. Carried.
The clerk then called the roll. Present—Smith, Koenig, Bonney, Armstrong and Murphy. Absent—Bennett.
The minutes of meeting of Nov 9 were then read and on motion approved.
The following bills were then presented to the council:

A recess of 5 minutes was ordered and the audit of the above bills.
The committee on claims and accounts made the following report on above bills: That we recommend that the several bills be allowed as read except W. M. Perry's and John W. King's which be referred back for report of street commissioner.
Moved and supported that the report of committee be accepted. Carried.
The resignation of Mr. Vaughn as night watchman was then read.
Moved and supported that the resignation of Mr. Vaughn be accepted. Carried.

Moved and supported that the council proceed to ballot for night watchman, his duties to commence at 4 o'clock in the evening and continue until 6 o'clock in the morning at \$1.25 per night, and to avoid the office during the pleasure of the council. Carried.
The first ballot resulted as follows:

Albert Tamerack 4.
Moved and supported that Mr. Tamerack having received a majority of all the votes cast be declared duly appointed night watchman during the pleasure of the council. Carried.

Moved and supported that the council return a vote of thanks to Mr. Vaughn for his past services as night watchman. Carried.
Stephen Vaughn then presented a bill for matches of 25 cents. Allowed.
The following resolution was then offered:

RESOLVED That the marshal be and he is hereby required to make out his report of all taxes collected from the village tax roll and other sources, and that he present said report at the next meeting, Dec 6, 91 and that the clerk be instructed to notify him.
On motion the resolution was adopted.
On motion Thomas Connors was appointed second assistant chief engineer for the balance of the ensuing year, and that he be asked to take the engine on once a week and that he be paid for his services.

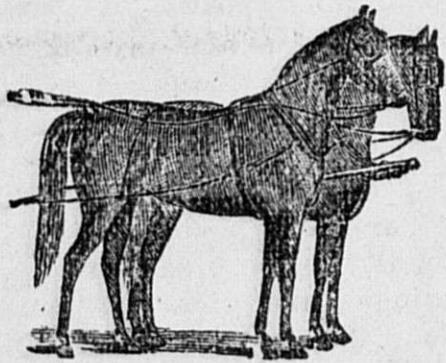
