About the middle of December the weather will become warmer and average so until about the first of January, '92, when the cold wave will come on again in January, and February will average colder than has been experienced in many years past."

Deer have been more plentiful than they have ever been since the country has been settled up, and thousands of deer have been killed in this part of the state. The hunters have had an unusually favorable season, and everyone should now respect the law himself and compel others to do the same. If the law is enforced there will be plenty of deer for years to come, while if it is disregarded they will soon be like the elk, buffalo and pigeons. The principal reason why deer were so thick this year is because they could not be run down in the snow last winter. Every farmer in northern Michigan is interested in preventing the unlawful killing of deer, and should promptly report all violations.—The Independent Democrat.

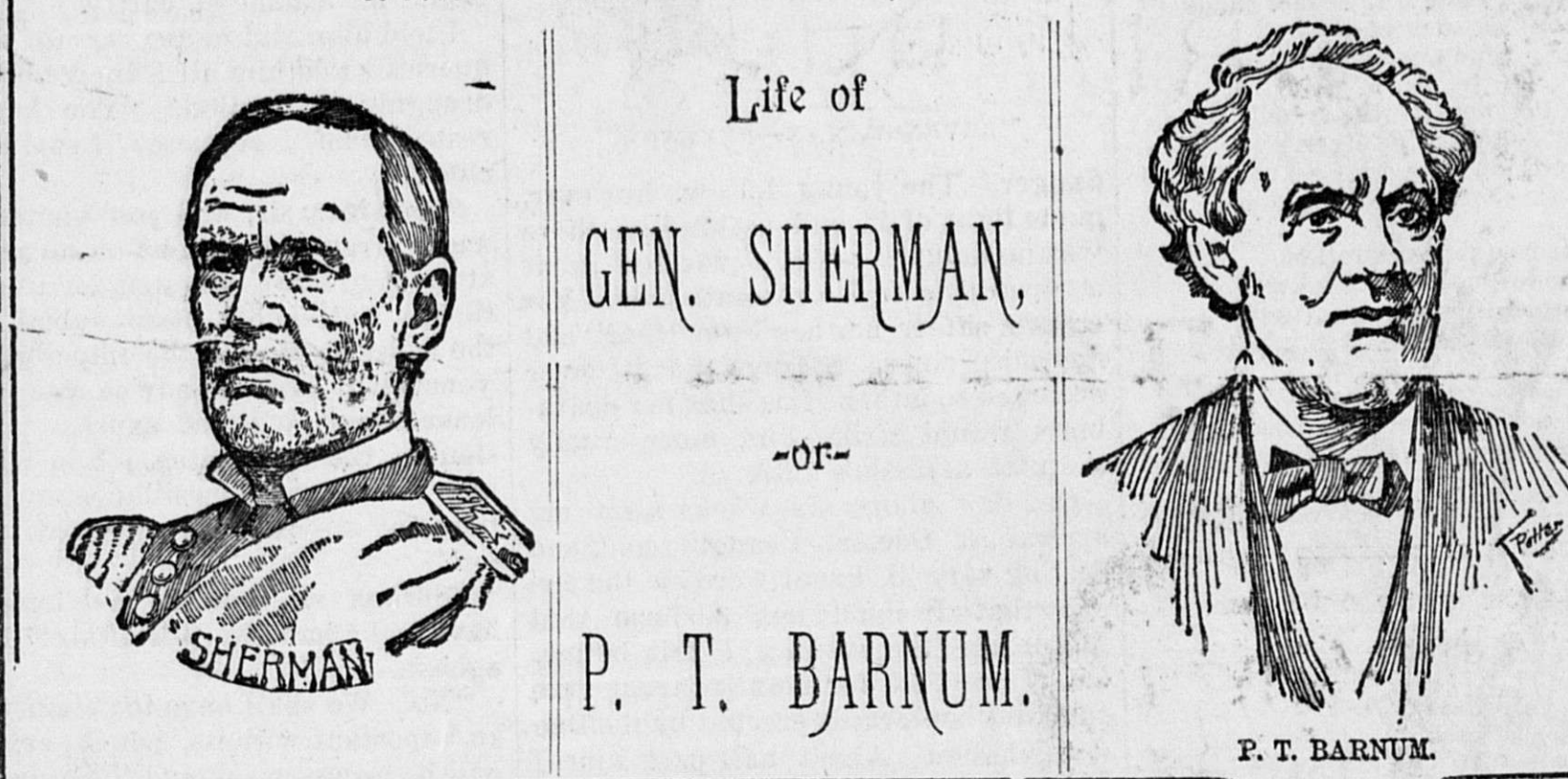

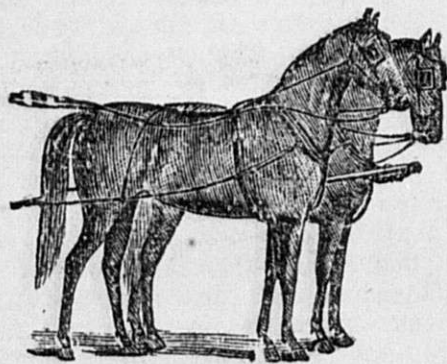

ATTEMPTED TRAIN WRECKING.

By Unknown Parties on the M. C. R. R. Last Week.

An attempt was made to wreck the north bound passenger train on Sunday night last, which fortunately miscarried. Ties were piled on the track in three different places between Beaverlake and St. Helens in order apparently to make a successful job of it. The engineer discovered the obstructions however in time to stop his train, before coming upon them, the ties were removed and the train went on its way, many of the passengers who were asleep in their berths, little dreaming of the narrow escape from death or severe injury they had.

Railway detectives were put in possession of the facts and they have, we understand made a couple of arrests, one of the parties having already made a confession of his part in the matter. Mob law is too good for this class of people.

Stick a Pin Here.

A recent decision of the supreme court is not attracting the attention which its importance merits.

By it, the trusts have been dealt a death blow, and combinations to keep up prices and rob the consumer have been declared illegal, and opposed to the rights of the public.

The case in point was Daniel and Edwin Lovejoy vs Jacob Michaels, and involved the point that a combination had been entered into to raise the price of certain commodities.

A peculiar feature of this decision is that all the democratic justices, McGrath, Morse and Champion, took the grounds set forth in the decision, while the two republican justices, Grant and Long, held that a combination to establish prices was not unlawful, unless the prices proved to be exorbitant.

The case in point was not a very important one, but the principal at stake is a far reaching one, and it is worthy of note that the democratic justices were true to democratic principles, and stood solidly by the people, as against the trusts.

There is food for a good many "hinks" right here, and it doesn't need a finger-board to point out the moral which affords this tale. —Istoskey Independent Democrat.

HELD UP A TRAIN.

Bold Robbery in the Suburbs of St. Louis—Six Masked Men, Aided by Dynamite, Secure \$15,000 from an Express Car.
St. Louis, Dec. 1.—One of the most daring train robberies that has occurred for years was perpetrated on the St. Louis & San Francisco road, most within the limits of St. Louis, last night. When passenger train No. 8 on that road left the depot last night at 8:25 o'clock it was just twenty-five minutes late.

Boarded by Bandits.
The limits of the city had been passed and the engine was just preparing to make up for lost time when three men who had boarded the train Old Orchard climbed over the water tank and coal and covered the fireman and engineer with revolvers. About the middle of December the weather will become warmer and average so until about the first of January, '92, when the cold wave will come on again in January, and February will average colder than has been experienced in many years past."

The hunters have had an unusually favorable season, and everyone should now respect the law himself and compel others to do the same. The principal reason why deer were so thick this year is because they could not be run down in the snow last winter. Every farmer in northern Michigan is interested in preventing the unlawful killing of deer, and should promptly report all violations.—The Independent Democrat.

When the Legislature became Democratic, Mr. Miller accepted the position of managing editor and editorial writer on the daily Telegram-Herald, of Grand Rapids, under its present Republican management. He is a terse, strong writer, a pronounced and radical Republican well acquainted with Michigan men, politics, and general affairs, and is also favorably known to the press of the State, with which he has been so long identified and with prominent men in all portions of Michigan. Mr. Miller is a brother of Wm. N. Miller, former owner of this paper. Mr. Lew is a hard-shell Republican and we hope now that as he is on a good loyal Journal that he may change his political views before 1892.

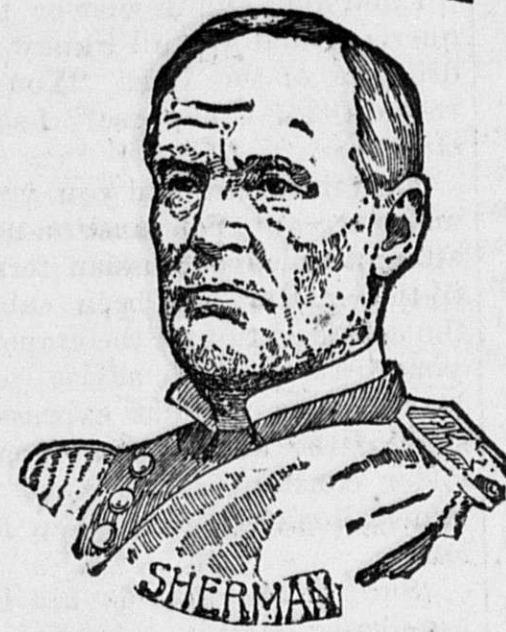

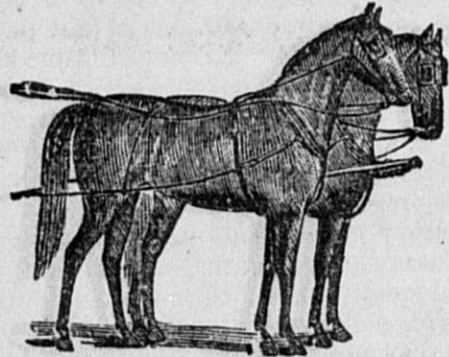

Stick a Pin Here.

A recent decision of the supreme court is not attracting the attention which its importance merits.

By it, the trusts have been dealt a death blow, and combinations to keep up prices and rob the consumer have been declared illegal, and opposed to the rights of the public.

The case in point was Daniel and Edwin Lovejoy vs Jacob Michaels, and involved the point that a combination had been entered into to raise the price of certain commodities.

A peculiar feature of this decision is that all the democratic justices, McGrath, Morse and Chapman, took the grounds set forth in the decision, while the two republican justices, Grant and Loun, held that a combination to establish prices was not unlawful, unless the prices proved to be exorbitant.

The case in point was not a very important one, but the principal at stake is a far reaching one, and it is worthy of note that the democratic justices were true to democratic principals, and stood solidly by the people, as against the trusts.

There is food for a good many "hinks" right here, and it doesn't need a finger board to point out the moral which a'orns this tale. —Petoskey Independent Democrat.
