OSCO COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Taken from the Michigan School Moderator, Nov. 19, 1891.

Is it not time for Iosco county to choose some live man or woman from among the educators of the county to serve as county school commissioner? Has not the office been passed around among lawyers long enough? At least, should not some one be selected who does something more than examine teachers and draw his salary? Under the new law Mr. O. E. McCutcheon was chosen commissioner. He is an attorney of Oscoda, and at once declined to accept the position because he had not time to give to its duties—a most honorable course. No election has been made, and the secretary under the old law, C. S. Pierce, still draws the salary at the old stand. Now, Mr. Pierce is undoubtedly a fine gentleman, probably a good citizen, possibly a successful attorney and editor but he should certainly have conscience enough to resign or decline a position that he has neither time nor inclination to fill as it should be filled. Why should it be deemed right for a person to pocket a salary of \$450 per year, merely to examine teachers for a county of forty districts? Should he not visit his schools at least so far as required by law? It is no excuse to say that the four villages or cities have excellent schools and competent superintendents. Only one of them is outside his jurisdiction. He should visit these excellent schools to learn the best plans, and then visit the district schools to aid and encourage them to make like progress. We attended recently a delightful Iosco teachers' association in Oscoda. The city teachers were out in force, but the country teachers were but slimly represented. Commr. Pierce lives in Oscoda but did not have interest enough in schools to attend a session. He was on the program for a paper on the "Needs of Our Public Schools," but failed to materialize, much the same as he had done at a previous meeting. He may not have had time to tell all the needs of the public schools, but he certainly could have said that the one great need in Iosco county is a live, wide awake, conscientious educator as a county commissioner.

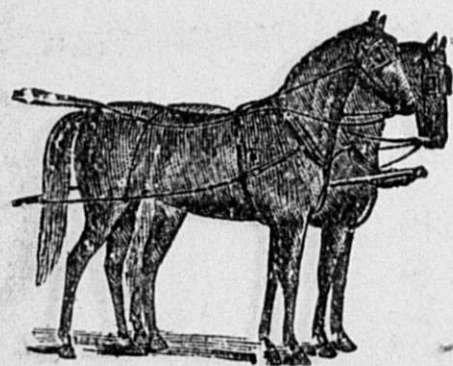

ISOSCO COUNTY SCHOOLS.

Taken from the Michigan School Moderator, Nov. 19, 1891.

Is it not time for Isosco county to choose some live man or woman from among the educators of the county to serve as county school commissioner? Has not the office been passed around among lawyers long enough? At least, should not some one be selected who does something more than examine teachers and draw his salary? Under the new law Mr. O. E. McCutcheon was chosen commissioner. He is an attorney of Oscoda, and at once declined to accept the position because he had not time to give to its duties—a most honorable course. No election has been made, and the secretary under the old law, C. S. Pierce, still draws the salary at the old stand. Now, Mr. Pierce is undoubtedly a fine gentleman, probably a good citizen possibly a successful attorney and editor but he should certainly have conscience enough to resign or decline a position that he has neither time nor inclination to fill as it should be filled. Why should it be deemed right for a person to pocket a salary of \$450 per year, merely to examine teachers for a county of forty districts? Should he not visit his schools at least so far as required by law? It is no excuse to say that the four villages or cities have excellent schools and competent superintendents. Only one of them is outside his jurisdiction. He should visit these excellent schools to learn the best plans, and then visit the district schools to aid and encourage them to make like progress. We attended recently a delightful Isosco teachers' association in Oscoda. The city teachers were out in force, but the country teachers were but slimly represented. Commr. Pierce lives in Oscoda but did not have interest enough in schools to attend a session. He was on the program for a paper on the "Needs of Our Public Schools," but failed to materialize, much the same as he had done at a previous meeting. He may not have had time to fill all the needs of the public schools, but he certainly could have said that the great need in Isosco county is a live, wide awake, conscientious educator as county commissioner.

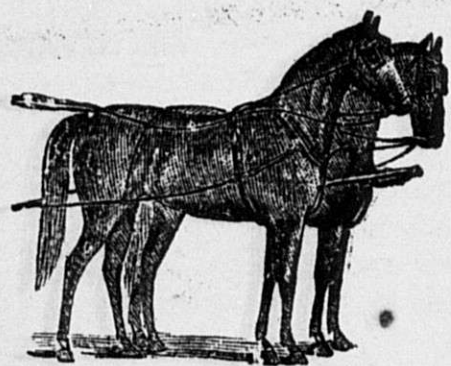
