The Democrats will have 27 governors to the Republicans 17, after January 1st. This is a Democratic country.

Hon. Daniel E. Soper secretary of state filed his resignation with Governor Winans on the 16th. The news was received here with much surprise and disappointment.

The supreme court has knocked out another 'hawback' law—the act providing for indeterminate sentence of criminals. As yet the supreme court has upheld all acts of the last legislature, which despite all adverse comments was far ahead of the previous one in point of ability.

Washington Letter.

Speaker Crisp may have made some promises before his election as Speaker—few men ever occupied the position who had not done so in their canvass for votes but he has made few, if any promises since his election. He lets the other fellows do the talking while he does double duty as a thinker; he knows that it will be impossible to so arrange the committee assignments that all the Democratic members of the House will be pleased and if those who enjoy his confidence may be relied upon, he will devote himself principally to the task of making an equitable distribution of the chairmanships and places upon the important committees between the various sections of the country; believing that no Representative will allow his personal disappointment to make him angry when he sees that his section is fully represented. It is now almost certain that the lists of committees will not be announced until after the Christmas recess and it is expected that Speaker Crisp will, after all the members have been given a chance to be heard, retire to his home in Georgia, or to some other place, where he can devote his time during the recess to making up the committees.

All sorts of gossip about the chairmanships and the make-up of the important committees may be heard, but about the only thing that everybody seems to be agreed upon is that the ways and means committees, which deals with tariff matters, will be nominated by Northern and Western members, whoever its chairman may be. The general opinion is that Mr. Mills can have the chairmanship of this committee if he wishes it, but some of his close friends say that he will not take the place, several reasons being given why he will not; one of them being that if there is an extra session of the Texas Legislature in the Spring he will be a candidate for the unexpired term in the Senate of ex-senator Reagan—now temporarily being filled by Senator Chilton and that if he is elected he will at once resign his seat in the House. But there are those who think that is just the reason why he should take the chairmanship. They argue that for Mr. Crisp to tender this important place to Mr. Mills and for him to accept it would show that no bad blood was left by the hot fight for the nomination, and that the committee could be so made up that the next Democrat on the committee could from the first take up the hard work of the chairman and that in the event of the election of Mr. Mills to the Senate this gentleman might be made chairman.

Resolutions providing for an investigation of the Pension office will shortly be offered in the House by Representatives Cooper, of Indiana, and Enloe, of Tennessee. The latter gentleman says that his resolution will be for an investigation of the methods used and is intended to save some of the tax payers money that now goes through leaks which he thinks are in the machines. Mr. Cooper is particularly interested in going for Gen. Raum, he being of the opinion that the investigation by the last Congress was not adopted, but the probabilities favor the adoption of a resolution that will be acceptable to both gentlemen.

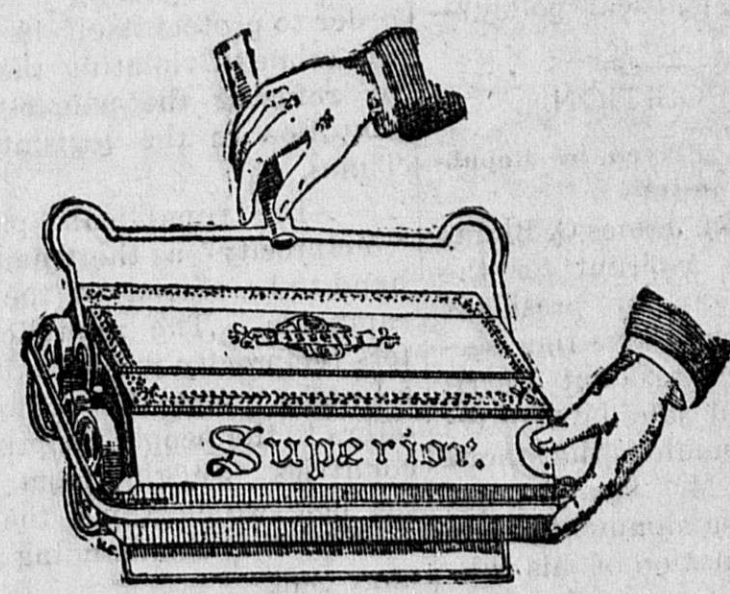

OUR OPERA HOUSE.

A Credit to the Village and Manager Davey. As a Dancing Hall It is "Great."

Opera troupes find in East Tawas, when visiting here for the purpose of presenting a drama, farce or comedy, etc., a neat, clean, and wholesome auditorium.

This is a resource that has long been neglected by us, and we trust Manager Davey will pardon this late mention of the success of his efforts.

The building is centrally located on the east side of Newman street. The entrance is on the north side, where, on arriving there, one encounters a 10ft. stairway leading upward to a long hall or corridor.

The ticket office is immediately on the right at the head of the stairway. Opposite the ticket office is a double-door entrance, to be used in case of fire, and which is very convenient for the purpose of ventilation, and for leaving the auditorium after an entertainment.

But the regular entrance is further down the hall. On one's first trip down this long corridor, one is not favorably impressed, but on arriving at the door leading into the main room, one is ushered into it, when, presto change! you are dazzled with the brilliancy of the scene. A room with a seating capacity of over half a thousand is before you. Reserved seats of arm chairs are placed in three rows arranged circularly, and are designated "A" "B" and "C" respectively. 200 persons can find comfortable accommodation in these. Immediately in the rear of these are 150 more seats for the accommodation of those not wishing a reserved seat. The gallery (elevated) contains also 150 seats. This number do not crowd the room, and more can be put in in case of emergency.

All of these face the stage, which is capacious and well equipped with fine scenery, affording troupes to present their plays to the best possible advantage, and, it being elevated, anything transpiring thereon is plainly visible to any person in the room.

The dressing rooms are convenient and comfortable, and what is most impressive is the cleanly and wholesome appearance of everything, very unlike most places of the kind.

The room is lighted with large lamps (electric lights are expected to be installed soon) making it as light as day itself.

When the chairs are removed, a finer dancing hall cannot be found in Northern Michigan. The floor is waxed for dancing purposes, and twenty sets of dancers have ample room to perform.

A small stage is so arranged as to be easily moved from place to place as may be desired, and is ornamented with a fine piano and sufficient room for a full orchestra.

In conclusion we would say that all credit is due Mgr. Davey for his hustle and enterprise in this matter, and also for securing the best troupes on the road for our amusement.

Fire! Fire!

That dread alarm was sounded on the morning of Saturday last at a little after four o'clock.

Thomas Caesar's residence in the outskirts of the village, caught, on was supposed to have caught, from a defective chimney and was entirely consumed.

M. Murphy, Editor and Prop.

The Democrats will have 27 governors to the Republicans 17, after January 1st. This is a Democratic country.

Hon. Daniel E. Soper secretary of state filed his resignation with Governor Winans on the 16th. The news was received here with much surprise and disappointment.

The supreme court has knocked out another "hawback" law—the act providing for indeterminate sentence of criminals. As yet the supreme court has upheld all acts of the last legislature, which despite all adverse comments was far ahead of the previous one in point of ability.

Washington Letter.

Speaker Crisp may have made some promises before his election as Speaker—few men ever occupied the position who had not done so in their canvass for votes but he has made few, if any promises since his election. He lets the other fellows do the talking while he does double duty as a thinker; he knows that it will be impossible to so arrange the committee assignments that all the Democratic members of the House will be pleased and if those who enjoy his confidence may be relied upon, he will devote himself principally to the task of making an equitable distribution of the chairmanships and places upon the important committees between the various sections of the country; believing that no Representative will allow his personal disappointment to make him angry when he sees that his section is fully represented. It is now almost certain that the lists of committees will not be announced until after the Christmas recess and it is expected that Speaker Crisp will, after all the members have been given a chance to be heard, retire to his home in Georgia, or to some other place, where he can devote his time during the recess to making up the committees.

All sorts of gossip about the chairmanships and the make-up of the important committees may be heard, but about the only thing that everybody seems to be agreed upon is that the ways and means committees, which deals with tariff matters, will be nominated by Northern and Western members, whoever his chairman may be. The general opinion is that Mr. Mills can have the chairmanship of this committee if he wishes it, but some of his close friends say that he will not take the place, several reasons being given why he will not; one of them being that if there is an extra session of the Texas Legislature in the Spring he will be a candidate for the unexpired term in the Senate of ex-senator Reagan—now temporarily being filled by Senator Chilton and that if he is elected he will at once resign his seat in the House. But there are those who think that is just the reason why he should take the chairmanship. They argue that for Mr. Crisp to tender this important place to Mr. Mills and for him to accept it would show that no bad blood was left by the hot fight for the nomination, and that the committee could be so made up that the next Democrat on the committee could from the first take up the hard work of the chairman and that in the event of the election of Mr. Mills to the Senate this gentleman might be made chairman.

Resolutions providing for an investigation of the Pension office will shortly be offered in the House by Representatives Cooper, of Indiana, and Enloe, of Tennessee. The latter gentleman says that his resolution will be for an investigation of the methods used and is intended to save some of the tax payers money that now goes through leaks which he thinks are in the machines. Mr. Cooper is particularly interested in going for Gen. Kaum, he being of the opinion that the investigation by the last Congress was not adopted, but the probabilities favor the adoption of a resolution that will be acceptable to both gentlemen.

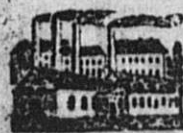

OUR OPERA HOUSE.

A Credit to the Village and Manager: Davey. As a Dancing Hall It is "Great."

Opera troupes find in East Tawas, when visiting here for the purpose of presenting a drama, farce or comedy, etc., a neat, clean, and wholesome auditorium.

This is a resource that has long been neglected by us, and we trust Manager Davey will pardon this late mention of the success of his efforts.

The building is centrally located on the east side of Newman street. The entrance is on the north side, where, on arriving there, one encounters a 10ft. stairway leading upward to a long hall or corridor.

The ticket office is immediately on the right at the head of the stairway. Opposite the ticket office is a double-door entrance, to be used in case of fire, and which is very convenient for the purpose of ventilation, and for leaving the auditorium after an entertainment.

But the regular entrance is further down the hall. On one's first trip down this long corridor, one is not favorably impressed, but on arriving at the door leading into the main room, one is ushered into it, when, presto change! you are dazzled with the brilliancy of the scene. A room with a seating capacity of over half a thousand is before you. Reserved seats of arm chairs are placed in three rows arranged circularly, and are designated "A" "B" and "C" respectively. 200 persons can find comfortable accommodation in these. Immediately in the rear of these are 150 more seats for the accommodation of those not wishing a reserved seat. The gallery (elevated) contains also 150 seats. This number do not crowd the room, and more can be put in in case of emergency.

All of these face the stage, which is capacious and well equipped with fine scenery, affording troupes to present their plays to the best possible advantage, and, it being elevated, anything transpiring thereon is plainly visible to any person in the room.

The dressing rooms are convenient and comfortable, and what is most impressive is the cleanly and wholesome appearance of everything, very unlike most places of the kind.

The room is lighted with large lamps (electric lights are expected to be installed soon) making it as light as day itself.

When the chairs are removed, a finer dancing hall cannot be found in Northern Michigan. The floor is waxed for dancing purposes, and twenty sets of dancers have ample room to perform.

A small stage is so arranged as to be easily moved from place to place as may be desired, and is ornamented with a fine piano and sufficient room for a full orchestra.

In conclusion we would say that all credit is due Mgr. Davey for his hustle and enterprise in this matter, and also for securing the best troupes on the road for our amusement.

Fire! Fire!

That dread alarm was sounded on the morning of Saturday last at a little after four o'clock.
