A Shocking Accident.

One of the most terrible accidents that ever occurred in this community was the accidental shooting of Fred. Moorhead on Christmas morning, at the Prescott mill yard.
 A number of sharp shooters assembled to try their skill at shooting glass balls thrown from what is called a trap, arranged for the purpose, and in the excitement, Edward Walker was reloading a shot-gun with shells that had been used before, when by some mishap one of the shells was discharged and the load of shot buried itself in the breast of Mr. Moorhead, killing him almost instantly.

He was a highly respected citizen in this community—was general manager in the large stores of C. H. Prescott & Sons for a number of years.
 Mr. Moorhead was 29 years of age, and was born in Indiana, Pennsylvania, where the remains were immediately transferred, accompanied by his wife and daughter, and Mr. Allen Prescott and Mrs. J. M. Walker.
 Coronor Howell was notified and immediately impaneled a jury, consisting of A. S. Larabee, Spence Williams, J. M. Waterbury, W. Ramage, Thos. Armstrong, and Thos. E. Conners.

An inquest was held at the court house Tuesday last. After all the witnesses were sworn as to the circumstances, the jury returned a verdict of accidental shooting.
 If expressions of sympathy helped to alleviate sorrow, Mrs. Moorhead's grief would be lessened, indeed.

Washington Letter.

Speaker Crisp has been ill with the grip but he is so busy making the committee assignments that he says he cannot enjoy the luxury of taking to his bed until the troublesome business is settled, and he expects that it will be settled, on Wednesday, when Congress will take a recess until the 5th of January. The selection of Northern men for the chairmanships of both the Ways and Appropriation committees, it being about settled that Mr. Springer, of Illinois will have the first, and Mr. Holman, of Indiana the last, has made some dissatisfaction, the argument being made that one section should not have both. But Mr. Crisp's friends reply by citing the fact that the South has all three of the Democratic members of the committee on Rules, Crisp, McMillin, and Catchings, which, they say about equally divides the power, so far as the control of legislation is concerned.

Representative Mills, who has been quite ill is now convalescent. In reply to a note from Speaker Crisp tendering him the second place on the committee of Ways and Means and asking which committee, Commerce or Postoffices, he preferred taking the chairmanship of, Mr. Mills wrote asking not to be assigned to the Ways and Means committee and expressing a willingness to accept such other committee assignments as may be made for him. The committee on Commerce has been changed to the committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, and it is thought Mr. Mills will be its chairman.

The House Committee on Rules reported in favor of increasing the membership of the Ways and Means committee from 13 to 15 and of the quadro-centennial from 9 to 11. After accepting this report the House on motion of Mr. Springer, voted to change the name of the last committee to that on the Columbian Exposition. The new rules will not be reported until after the recess, but it is not expected that they will differ very materially from those used in the Fiftyeth Congress, when Mr. Carlisle was Speaker of the House.

Representative Ealhe, of Tennessee, offered a resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Rules, providing for the appointment of a committee of five to investigate charges against the Pension Bureau, including the notorious rorting and promotion cases, which resulted in the removal of "Corporal" Tanner; the office brokerage, which got a son of Commissioner Raum in trouble; the favoritism which claims of certain attorneys are given preference over those of other individual claimants or other matters coming to the conduct of the Commissioner in the matter or to the administration of his office which in the judgment of said committee, may conduce to the honest, clean, just, economical and efficient administration of said Bureau. The adoption of this resolution by the House may be put down as a certainty.

Representative Culbertson of Texas, changed his mind after having accepted and declined the democratic vacancy on the Interstate Commerce commission. It is understood that he did it in deference to the wishes of his Texas friend who want him to be a candidate for the Senate.

Mr. Harrison's friends are inclined to be jubilant over the Chilian situation. They have an idea that Mr. Harrison's special message to Congress recommending that war be declared against Chilli, which they say he will certainly send in as soon as Congress reassembles, if the new President of Chilli, who assumed power Saturday, does not before then give an answer to the demands for the City of Valparaiso which attacked the loss of the Chilean sailors.

Two more probable than the other is that the House and Senate will have had a vote on the drainage bill, which is reported by a committee on the 10th, and although the House and Senate are not yet ready to vote on it, a declaration of war is more probable than the other.

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of war should Mr. Harrison recommend that as the only honorable way to end the matter, I can say on the highest authority that no such statement has been authorized by any Democrat of prominence in the party councils. The most diligent search failed to find a single Democratic Senator or Representative willing to express an opinion, until all the correspondence between the two governments shall have been sent to Congress. Then, if it appears that American honor demands a declaration of war, no Democrat will be found opposing it; but should it appear on the other hand that an attempt was being made by the administration to curry favor with thoughtless people by making war upon a weaker nation, no Democrat will be frightened by a fictitious public clamor into voting a dollar for a political war. That is about the situation as it stands to-day.

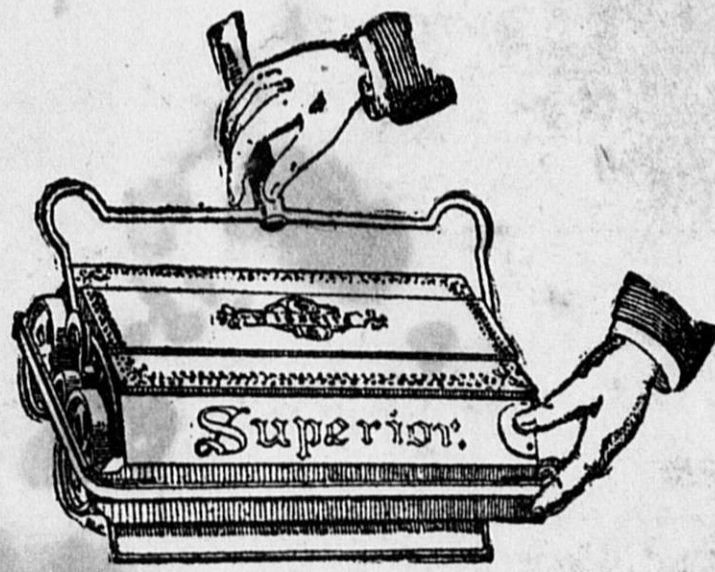

GILLMAN ARRESTED.

State Game Warden Hampton Swore Out a Warrant Last Night.

The Evening News is a pipin, a detective on the side, a whole police force in itself. In its glowing article on deer hunting at Turtle Lake, which appeared in its columns about a month ago, it stated what sport there was in hunting deer with hounds, and all through the whole article the hound seemed to take an important part. It was written by Alex. McLeod, of Detroit, who was up this season with Gillman on his first deer hunt, and on his return he wrote the article; and either through his ignorance of the law, or his thoughtlessness, he mixed the hound plentifully in the story. From this article State Game Warden Hampton first took notice, since which time he has corresponded with Ed. Gillman, and receiving no satisfaction in Gillman's reply, he has decided to arrest him for hunting deer with dogs, which is in direct violation of the state law.

Howell's Annotated Statutes, 3d volume, reads thus: No person shall make use of a dog in hunting or pursuing a deer within the boundaries of the state; it also says that any dog found pursuing a deer may be shot, and that the owner will have no redress for the same.

Last night Chas. P. Hampton, the game warden, arrived in the city, and a complaint was made before Justice Cavanaugh and a warrant issued for Ed. Gillman's arrest. Mr. Hampton left on the train this morning for Detroit, where he will get Gillman and return here for trial sometime before Jan. 10th. Mr. Gillman seems willing to go ahead with the case, as he claims he has a perfect and lawful right to pursue deer with hounds on his own territory; he (Gillman) having four or five thousand acres. It will no doubt be a test case and one that the Gillman party is perfectly willing to see go on. At any rate it will probably be decided whether or not Gillman has the right to hound deer. The right may be decided, but whether it will be decided that he shall not run deer we are not able to say at this writing.—Alpena Echo December 30 1891.

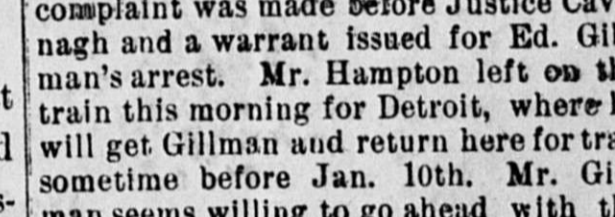

A Shocking Accident.

One of the most terrible accidents that ever occurred in this community was the accidental shooting of Fred. Moorhead on Christmas morning, at the Prescott mill yard.

A number of sharpshooters assembled to try their skill at shooting glass balls thrown from what is called a trap, arranged for the purpose, and in the excitement, Edward Walker was reloading a shot-gun with shells that had been used before, when by some mishap one of the shells was discharged and the load of shot buried itself in the breast of Mr. Moorhead, killing him almost instantly.

He was a highly respected citizen in this community—was general manager in the large stores of C. H. Prescott & Sons for a number of years.

Mr. Moorhead was 29 years of age, and was born in Indiana, Pennsylvania, where the remains were immediately transferred, accompanied by his wife and daughter, and Mr. Allen Prescott and Mrs. J. M. Walker.

Coroner Howell was notified and immediately impaneled a jury, consisting of A. S. Larabee, Spence Williams, J. M. Waterbury, W. Ramage, Thos. Armstrong, and Thos. E. Connors.

An inquest was held at the court house Tuesday last. After all the witnesses were sworn as to the circumstances, the jury returned a verdict of accidental shooting.

If expressions of sympathy helped to alleviate sorrow, Mrs. Moorhead's grief would be lessened, indeed.

Washington Letter.

Speaker Crisp has been ill with the grip but he is so busy making the committee assignments that he says he cannot enjoy the luxury of taking to his bed until the troublesome business is settled, and he expects that it will be settled, on Wednesday, when Congress will take a recess until the 5th of January. The selection of Northern men for the chairmanships of both the Ways and Appropriation committees, it being about settled that Mr. Springer, of Illinois will have the first, and Mr. Holman, of Indiana the last, has made some dissatisfaction, the argument being made that one section should not have both. But Mr. Crisp's friends reply by citing the fact that the South has all three of the Democratic members of the committee on Rules, Crisp, McMillin, and Catchings, which, they say about equally divides the power, so far as the control of legislation is concerned.

Representative Mills, who has been quite ill is now convalescent. In reply to a note from Speaker Crisp tendering him the second place on the committee of Ways and Means and asking which committee, Commerce or Postoffices, he preferred taking the chairmanship of, Mr. Mills wrote asking not to be assigned to the Ways and Means committee and expressing a willingness to accept such other committee assignments as may be made for him. The committee on Commerce has been changed to the committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, and it is thought Mr. Mills will be its chairman.

The House Committee on Rules reported in favor of increasing the membership of the Ways and Means committee from 13 to 15 and of the quadro-centennial from 9 to 11. After accepting this report the House on motion of Mr. Springer, voted to change the name of the last committee to that on the Columbian Exposition. The new roles will not be reported until after the recess, but it is not expected that they will differ very materially from those used in the Fiftieth Congress, when Mr. Carlisle was Speaker of the House.

Representative Enloe, of Tennessee, offered a resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Rules, providing for the appointment of a committee of five to investigate charges against the Pension Bureau, including the notorious robbing and promotion cases, which resulted in the removal of "Corporal" Tanner; the office brokerage, which got a son of Commissioner Raum in trouble; the favoritism by which claims of certain attorneys are given preference over those filed either by individual claimants or other attorneys and "all other matters relating to the conduct of the Commissioner in the matter or to the administration of his office which in the judgment of said committee, may conduce to the honest, clean, just, economical and efficient administration of said Bureau. The adoption of this resolution by the House may be put down as a certainty.

Representative Culbertson of Texas, changed his mind after having accepted and declined the democratic vacancy on the Interstate Commerce commission. It is understood that he did it in deference to the wishes of his Texas friend who want him to be a candidate for the Senate.

Mr. Harrison's friends are inclined to be jubilant over the Chilian situation. They have an idea that Mr. Harrison's special message to Congress recommending that war be declared against Chili, which they say he will certainly send in as soon as Congress reassembles, if the new President of Chili, who assumed office Saturday, does not before then send an answer to the demands for the punishment of the Chilians who attacked the U. S. sailors at Valparaso and for indemnity for the families of the sailors who were killed, which shall be entirely satisfactory, will give him a boom for the Presidential nomination. They are hoping for a message of defiance from Chili, as they wish war to be declared, believing that war would make Mr. Harrison's renomination certain and his re-election much more probable than it would otherwise be.

The Democrats in the House and Senate are interested spectators of the drama which the administration is preparing for the American people, and although it has been stated that the leaders were prepared to vote in favor of a declaration

of war should Mr. Harrison recommend that as the only honorable way to end the matter, I can say on the highest authority that no such statement has been authorized by any Democrat of prominence in the party councils. The most diligent search failed to find a single Democratic Senator or Representative willing to express an opinion, until all the correspondence between the two governments shall have been sent to Congress. Then, if it appears that American honor demands a declaration of war, no Democrat will be found opposing it; but should it appear on the other hand that an attempt was being made by the administration to curry favor with thoughtless people by making war upon a weaker nation, no Democrat will be frightened by a fictitious public clamor into voting a dollar for a political war. That is about the situation as it stands to-day.

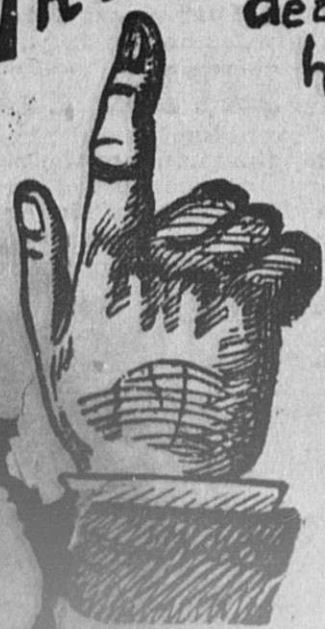

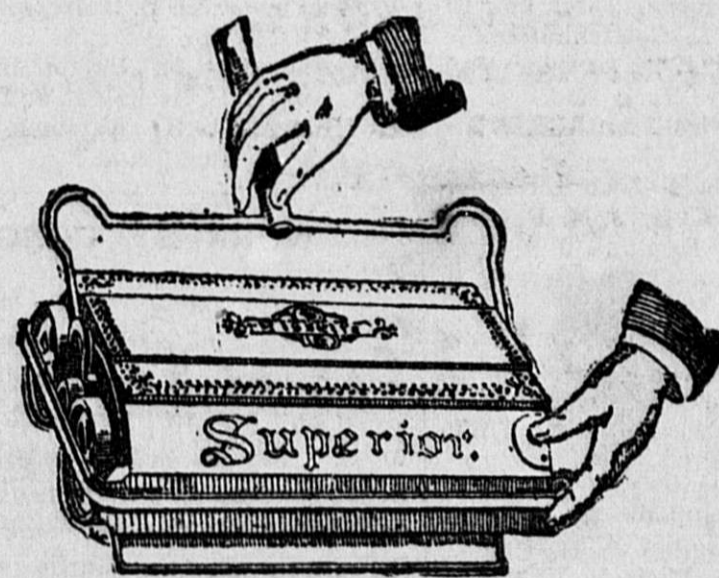

GILLMAN ARRESTED.

State Game Warden Hampton Swore Out a Warrant Last Night.

The Evening News is a pipin, a detective on the side, a whole police force in itself. In its glowing article on deer hunting at Turtle Lake, which appeared in its columns about a month ago, it stated what sport there was in hunting deer with hounds, and all through the whole article the hound seemed to take an important part. It was written by Alex. McLeod, of Detroit, who was up this season with Gillman on his first deer hunt, and on his return he wrote the article; and either through his ignorance of the law, or his thoughtlessness, he mixed the hound plentifully in the story. From this article State Game Warden Hampton first took notice, since which time he has corresponded with Ed. Gillman, and receiving no satisfaction in Gillman's reply, he has decided to arrest him for hunting deer with dogs, which is in direct violation of the state law.

Howell's Annotated Statutes, 3d volume, reads thus: No person shall make use of a dog in hunting or pursuing a deer within the boundaries of the state; it also says that any dog found pursuing a deer may be shot, and that the owner will have no redress for the same.

Last night Chas. P. Hampton, the game warden, arrived in the city, and a complaint was made before Justice Cavanaugh and a warrant issued for Ed. Gillman's arrest. Mr. Hampton left on the train this morning for Detroit, where he will get Gillman and return here for trial sometime before Jan. 10th. Mr. Gillman seems willing to go ahead with the case, as he claims he has a perfect and lawful right to pursue deer with hounds on his own territory; he (Gillman) having four or five thousand acres. It will no doubt be a test case and one that the Gillman party is perfectly willing to see go on. At any rate it will probably be decided whether or not Gillman has the right to hound deer. The right may be decided, but whether it will be decided that he shall not run deer we are not able to say at this writing.—Alpena Echo December 30 1891.
