The New "Set Lines" Opinion.

To the Public:

Since the passage of Act 159 of 1891, prohibiting the use of every-thing except hook and line in taking fish from inland lakes, there has been much discussion as to whether the law permits fishing through the ice with a large number of lines attached to "bobs," "tipups" or sticks, so that one person can fish with any number of hooks.

The state game and fish warden held that this practice is precisely the same in spirit and effect as the practice of stringing a large number of short lines to a long one, and that within the meaning of the law such lines are "set lines." It makes no difference in the destruction of fish whether fifty lines are "set" through the ice, or are "set by being suspended from a single long line. Both are equally in opposition to the spirit of the law, which was intended to preserve the fish in our inland lakes, and so the law did not affect fishing in streams, deputy wardens were advised to construe the law in accordance with this opinion until the question was settled.

In the few cases already reported to me the juries have taken this view of the law, but a great many interested in the act have held that it did not apply to lines set separately through the ice, and this view has just been taken by the Attorney General in an official opinion.

In view of this decision, deputy wardens have been instructed to discontinue, for the present at least, all prosecution for fishing through the ice in the manner described, and unless the courts should decide that such fishing is unlawful there will be no further prosecutions. If the people interested in the preservation of fish in our lakes demand it, a test case will be taken to the courts for decision, and I shall be pleased to hear from all interested in the matter upon either side.

**A TOTAL WRECK.**

**The Strong House Ruined by Fire This Morning**

A little before 3 o'clock this morning, fire was discovered in the room immediately over the bar room of the Strong House.

The alarm was soon conveyed to the water works when the fire whistle gave its unearthly shrieks, awakening our citizens from their peaceful slumbers, and to the fact that a fire was somewhere in town.

The fire department promptly responded, and, with a number of other citizens, were soon on the scene.

At first two streams of water were thought to be sufficient to extinguish the flames, but it soon became evident that more were necessary, and accordingly the other hose cart was run out and two more streams were playing on the elements. When these had been working for a short time it was thought the fire was under control, but it broke out afresh, flames and smoke issuing from the roof in great volumes, and one of the hose carts was dispatched for more hose. These were attached to a hydrant, and in a few moments the five streams were found to be insufficient to quench the fire. A second time the hose cart returned to the hall for hose, when, after due time, six fine streams of water were battling with the now surging mass of flames.

After a long fight of over three hours, during which time it was confined to the hotel alone, the fire was entirely extinguished.

The building was owned by A. G. VanWey, and was occupied by John Cowan.

The damage to building and furniture is estimated at from \$9,000 to \$5,000. We have been unable to ascertain the amount of insurance, but understand it was quite well insured. Most of the furniture in the front part of the house was saved.

About the first to discover the fire were Wm. Lafave and Mike Lilly, who were sleeping in the second story. They were awakened by the smoke, and springing out of bed, saw their only chance of escape lay in jumping from the window, which they did, the only injury sustained being a lame foot for each.

The water works proved themselves to be of the first-class, and our citizens have a right to be proud of them. The hydrants, which were feared by some to be frozen, were in excellent working order.
