The delegates from each Congressional district will meet in caucus at 10 o'clock a. m, on the day of the convention at places to be hereinafter designated and select candidates for recomendation to the convention for two district delegates two district alternates; two members of the State Central Committe; one Vice-President of the convention and one member for each of the following committees of the convention Credentials, Permanent Organization and Order of Business, and Resolutions.






