Democratic State Convention.

The Democrats of Michigan will meet in State convention in the Muskegon Opera House in the city of Muskegon, on Wednesday, May 4th, 1892, at twelve o'clock noon, for the purpose of electing twenty-eight delegates to the Democratic national convention called to meet at Chicago, Ill., June 21st 1892; for the selection of a Democratic State Central Committee to serve for the ensuing two years, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before it.

This convention will elect two delegates and two alternates at large from the Eastern Electoral District; two delegates and two alternates at large from the Western Electoral District; twenty-four Congressional District delegates and twenty-four Congressional alternates (two delegates and two alternates from each Congressional district.) It will also choose two members of the Democratic State Central Committee from each Congressional district, and a chairman of the State Central Committee from the State at large.

According to the rule adopted by the Democratic state convention held at Detroit in 1880 and since adhered to, every county in the state convention for each 500 votes cast for Governor at the last general election and one additional delegate for a fraction not less than 250 votes. But each county is entitled to at least two delegates. All delegates must be residents of the counties they represent.

The delegates from each Congressional district will meet in caucus at 10 o'clock a. m. on the day of the convention at places to be hereinafter designated and select candidates for recommendation to the convention for two district delegates two district alternates; two members of the State Central Committee; one Vice-President of the convention and one member for each of the following committees of the convention: Credentials, Permanent Organization and Order of Business, and Resolutions.

All voters of Michigan who favor the repeal of unjust laws permitting taxation for purpose other than the need of government economically conducted; who desire reform in the prodigal expenditure of the public money and who are in sympathy with the public money and who are in sympathy with the declarations of principles of the Democratic party are cordially invited to participate in the selection of delegates to the convention.

Given under my hand and the Seal of the State, at the Capitol in Lansing, this eighth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and of the Independence of the United States, the one hundred and sixteenth.

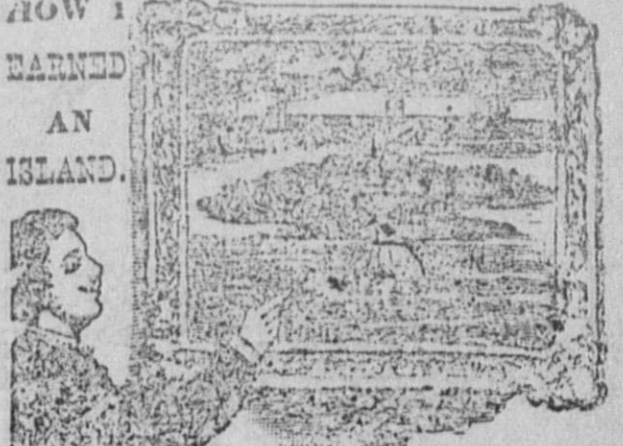

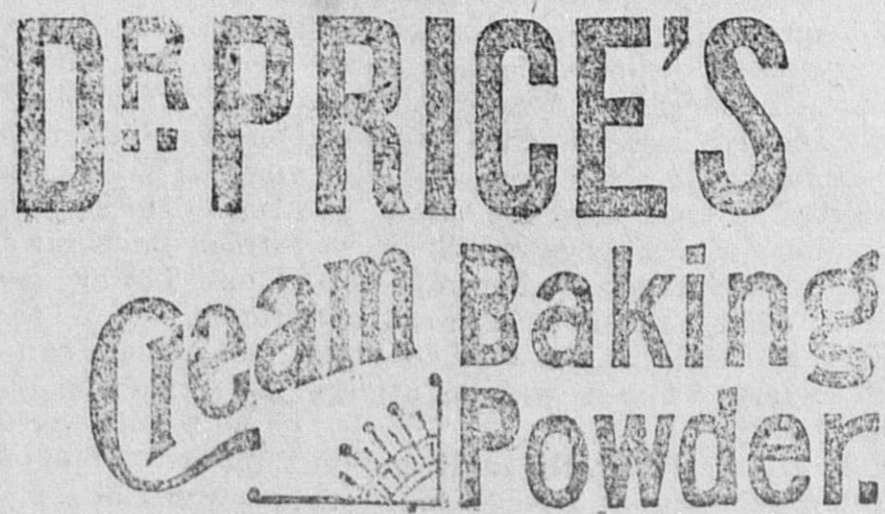
