Supervisors and Tax-Payers, Take Notice.
 Following are Secs. 12 and 14, and part of Sec. 15, Public Acts of 1891:
 SEC. 12. It shall be the duty of each Supervisor or assessing officer, as soon as possible after entering upon the duties of his office, to ascertain the taxable property of his assessing district, and the persons to whom it should be assessed, and their residences. For this purpose he shall require every person of full age and sound mind, to make and subscribe to a true and correct statement under oath, administered by such Supervisor or assessing officer, of all the taxable property of such person, firm or corporation, whether owned by him or it, or held for the use of another, and it shall be the duty of every such person, firm or corporation, to make such statement under the following form of oath, duly administered by the supervisor or assessing officer:

 _____ being duly sworn, deposes and says, that the above is a full and true statement of all the taxable property owned by him, liable to assessment in this assessing district.

SEC. 14. In every case when any person shall wilfully neglect or refuse to make out and deliver a true and correct sworn statement, under oath administered by the supervisor or assessing officer as required by this act, said person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine of one hundred dollars or thirty days in the county jail, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court. If the supervisor or assessing [office] officer shall be satisfied that any statement so made is incorrect, or if by reason of absence or other sufficient cause said sworn statement cannot be obtained from the person whose property is to be assessed, said supervisor or assessing officer is hereby authorized and required to examine on oath any other person or persons whom he may have good reason to believe and does believe has knowledge of the amount or value of any property owned or held by such person so neglecting or refusing or omitting to be examined or to furnish a statement; and such supervisor or assessing officer is hereby authorized to set down and assess to such person so entitled to be assessed, such amount of personal property as he may deem just.

SEC. 15. On or before the third Monday of May in each year, the supervisor shall make and complete an assessment roll, upon which he shall set down the name of every person liable to be taxed for personal property in his township, and also a full description of all the real property liable to be taxed in such township.

Democratic State Convention.

The Democrats of Michigan will meet in State convention in the Muskegon Opera House in the city of Muskegon, on Wednesday, May 4th, 1892, at twelve o'clock noon, for the purpose of electing twenty-eight delegates to the Democratic national convention called to meet at Chicago, Ill., June 21st 1892; for the selection of a Democratic State Central Committee to serve for the ensuing two years, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before it.

This convention will elect two delegates and two alternates at large from the Eastern Electoral District; two delegates and two alternates at large from the Western Electoral District; twenty-four Congressional District delegates and twenty-four Congressional alternates (two delegates and two alternates from each Congressional district.) It will also choose two members of the Democratic State Central Committee from each Congressional district, and a chairman of the State Central Committee from the State at large.

According to the rule adopted by the Democratic state convention held at Detroit in 1880 and since adhered to, every county in the state convention for each 500 votes cast for Governor at the last general election and one additional delegate for a fraction not less than 250 votes. But each county is entitled to, at least two delegates. All delegates must be residents of the counties they represent.

The delegates from each Congressional district will meet in caucus at 10 o'clock a. m. on the day of the convention at places to be hereinafter designated, and select candidates for, recommendation to the convention for, two district delegates two district alternates; two members of the State Central Committee; one Vice-President of the convention and one member for each of the following committees of the convention—Credentials, Permanent Organization and Order of Business, and Resolutions.

All voters of Michigan, who favor the repeal of unjust laws permitting taxation for purposes other than the need of government, economically conducted; who desire reform in the prodigal expenditure of the public money and who are in sympathy with the public money, and who are in sympathy with the declarations of principles of the Democratic party are cordially invited to participate in the selection of delegates to the convention.

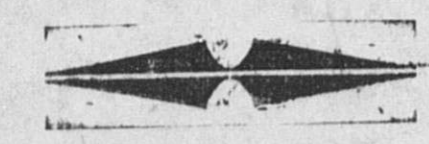
