 The old stand-by, B. F. Oakes, who has been connected with his firm in the capacity of book-keeper and cashier for the past decade of years, still holds the fort with honor.
 The new burner, which has been in course of construction for the past two months is completed, and is now doing duty, as the great volumes of smoke issuing therefrom testifies. This introduces something new in the line of burners in these parts, being constructed wholly of iron—two thicknesses—with a water chamber between for the purpose of making steam to run the salt block. It will necessitate the employment of about 30 less men, and consequently is a great economizer.
 A full stock of logs has been secured for the summer's cut, and it is expected the mill will run very steadily this season.

The new burner, which has been in course of construction for the past two months is completed, and is now doing duty, as the great volumes of smoke issuing therefrom testifies. This introduces something new in the line of burners in these parts, being constructed wholly of iron—two thicknesses—with a water chamber between for the purpose of making steam to run the salt block.
