Hurrah for the Glorious Fourth! At TAWAS CITY.



The anniversary of our Country's Natal Day will be ushered in by the ringing of bells and a national salute with heavy guns at early dawn.

GRAND PARADE.

At 9 o'clock there will be a Grand Civic Parade by members of the G. A. R., Fire Department, young ladies representing the Original Colonies, Civic Societies, and Young America, who will be out in full force, headed by the Tawas City Cornet Band.

After marching through the principle streets, the procession will break ranks in front of the court house, at which place the following program will be observed:

The illustration below will give the reader an idea of what takes place at noon:



It will be a parade by the Ancient and Honorable Order of Fillibusters and needs no further description.

East Tawas citizens have, by request, kindly consented to assist in the Fillibuster parade, and are sparing neither time nor money to make their effort to excel in ridiculousness a success.

The Yacht and Boat Races.

In the sail boat race, there shall be at least two boats in order to obtain a prize, and all boats shall be measured immediately after the race and time allowance given according to the Herreshoff system of set offs for finding sailing length and corrected time.

Each boat shall be allowed one man for each six feet length or fraction thereof. The boats will be started at half past two local time sharp and fifteen minutes before that time a preparatory gun will be fired or whistle sounded and two gun reports or short whistles give the starting signal. The start will be from an imaginary line drawn directly out into the Bay from C. H. Prescott's mill dock in Tawas City, thence westerly to the first clump of Spiles of the Hart Mill dock, thence out

to the Can Buoy off the point known as Tawas point by the Light house, thence back around the spiles of Harts Mill dock, thence easterly across the starting line; and all times of each boat will be taken as they cross said line at the finish.

The first prize will be a Prize U. S. Flag to be kept and known as a Yachting trophy and to be held by the winning boat on Tawas Bay and subject to be challenged for on six days notice at any time during the season, and the boat winning the same three times in succession shall become the owner thereof, or the boat having the same at the end of the season for two successive seasons shall be the owner.

Second prize, the sum of two dollars. The Ladies rowing race will be started from same place, Skiff row boats or canoes, one lady to each boat and race or course will be down to and around above clump of spiles off Hart's dock and back to finishing at starting line. First and only prize an opera glass.

Mens rowing race—same course, first prize an opera glass second prize \$2.00. In rowing race the boats will pass the turning buoy on the land side and leave it on the Bay or open water side.

In the sailing race the boats will approach each turning buoy to leeward of the buoy and leave it on the windward side to avoid jibing around the buoy in making the turn.

Rowing races will be started each respectively above one half hour each after the other when sailing race has been started.

A very pretty, and as well appropriate feature of the 9:00 o'clock Dress Parade will be a representation of the freedom of the thirteen colonies, in which thirteen young ladies dressed in white dresses, crowns, and Red, White and Blue sashes will represent the colonies and one dressed in white will represent the Goddess of Liberty. We do not doubt but what this will be one of the most prominent features of the day, and here take the opportunity, to thank, on behalf of the committee those who will take part and willing to lend a helping hand toward making our celebration a success. Miss Nettie Darling will represent the "Goddess of Liberty" and the following young ladies, the thirteen states: The Misses Grace Gilbert, Sarah McLennan, Ida Funk, Minnie Henderson, Nina Henderson, Rebecca Simon, Mabel Murphy, May Crandall, Mabel Murchison, Nellie Hamilton, Belle Johnson, Winnie Dupraw and Hattie Johnson.
