—Miss Mamie Jondreau, W. U. T. operator, of this city, returned from Mackinac Island Tuesday last, after spending ten days among friends.

—Mrs. J. J. McSpaden, sister of Mrs. E. D. Benedict, and her husband returned to their home at Amherstburg Ont., after spending a short vacation at this place.

—Mr. Stevenson, of Urbana Ohio, father of Mrs. Chas. A. Jahraus, came to our city a short time since and will reside with his daughter and friends in the county during the summer months.

—Miss Jennie Krobiliowski and her sister Vella leave to-morrow for Detroit where they have been engaged to work in a steam laundry. These girls have worked at the Bay Side Hotel for about two years. Miss Anna Rodzimeiska will accompany them.

—The Mich. Log Towing Co. have come to Tawas bay, from Saginaw to raft and assort the many large rafts that may come over from Georgian Bay, and send them in small rafts to Bay City. John McKinnon, Chas. Patience, John McGary and others, are some of the leading raftmen.

—The building committee of the board of supervisors, consisting of F. W. Latham, Frank Betz, M. Murphy, Thos. Galbraith and A. J. Ferrister were in session Wednesday and Thursday, reviewed the county poor farm and the court houses per a former resolution of the board, and decided to make some vast improvements around the county buildings, something much needed.

—Parties have been corresponding with representative men of our village within the past week asking terms on which they might bring a stove, heading and hoop manufactory to town. The firm represents about \$150,000 capital and wish to know if a site could be procured free and what the citizens would do in the shape of a bonus. The matter should be pushed if the firm contemplates business, as this is the point for such an establishment.

W. A. BURRITT, of Harrison, Clare county, certainly should be the Democratic candidate for Senator in the 28th Senatorial District. Mr. Burritt is fully qualified. He has been three times elected Prosecuting Attorney, of Clare county. He is a good lawyer and familiar with public business and State affairs, and would give his constituents a good representation in the State Senate, and we are confident he would be elected if nominated.

THE nomination for County Clerk on the Democrat ticket seems already to be generally conceded, as C. A. Jahraus, the present efficient incumbent, will be his own successor. The convention will give him the nomination by acclamation. Mr. Jahraus has made a popular officer during the past two years, and even the Republicans seem to be almost a unit for him. When a man proves himself to be a faithful servant of the people the first term, he is sure to get their support for a second term.

WHILE we frankly state that two years ago we were the peoples' candidate for Sheriff on the Democrat ticket, and like many more unfor-

tunates, was rushed before a candidate whom the people thought was entitled to a second term regardless of partisan colors. We protested against the nomination on these grounds, but the convention insisted that we should enter the race and our nomination was announced by acclamation, and as we had predicted, was defeated. This fall another strain is advocated, daily awaiting us to enter the field once more. We have hesitated some time to be a candidate, but under the present circumstances and to please our numerous friends, have concluded to make the race providing the convention may see fit qualifications in me to give me the nomination. In the fall of 1890 nobody wanted to run on the Democrat ticket; but this fall we have heard of a few aspirants—men who are well qualified: Robt. Smith, Noah Henniger, Wm. Elliott, Oscoda; Jas. Barnes, John Dunn, Au Sable; J. W. Lanktree, E. Tawas; Frank Duplanty, Whittemore. If the convention, in its wise judgement should give any other candidate named the nomination, we will cheerfully abide by its decision and work for Democracy and its candidates.

## Accident on the Rail.

On Tuesday evening last, at 5 p. m., Joseph Grise, conductor on a log train running from Alpena to the camps on the Mud Lake Branch, while aiding one of his brakemen to turn the brake, it gave way, precipitating him headlong between the train, rolling him under the brake staffs killing him instantly.

The remains were brought to his father's home in this city the following morning on a special. His wife and child were visiting at the home of Mr. Grice, deceased's father, and it was a heartrending scene to witness a father and mother, six grown up brothers, one sister and a young wife and child standing ready to receive the dead body of a once loving son, brother, husband and father.

He was 29 years old in January, and had been married about two years. A young son about a year old is left fatherless. He has lived in Tawas City since childhood. His brother Phil arrived last evening from Chicago, in answer to a telegram, likewise John Hanson and wife of Sanilac, parents of Mrs. Grise.

Mr. Grise was insured in the Standard Ins. Co. for \$2,000. The R. R. comrades decorated the casket with a \$15.00 wreath purchased at Bay City. Funeral services were held from St. Joseph's Catholic church to-day, Rev. Fr. Brueck officiating. A large concourse of friends escorted the remains to the Catholic cemetery in E. Tawas.

The funeral was conducted by Wm. B. Kelly, undertaker, and the following gentleman acted as pallbearers: Jos. Reno, Jas. Bofen, John McRae, E. D. Benedict, Steve Brabbon and Nels Brabbon.

Much sympathy is expressed for the brokenhearted relatives.

### AFTERNOON SESSION:

July 13th 1892.  
The Board was called to order at 3 o'clock p. m. by the chairman. Present to roll call: Betz, Johnson, Galbraith, Slingerland, Skat, Duplanty, Rodman and Jackson.

The following resolution was offered by Supervisor Murphy, who moved its adoption. Be it

Resolved, That the Building Committee be empowered to make any repairs on the county poor house that they may deem necessary for the welfare of the inmates

and the public at large, and that the chairman of this Board be and act as one of the said committee.

Which motion was carried by unanimous vote.

The petition praying for the protection of speckled trout and that a fish-club or ladder may be put in at Rodman's dam signed by John Sims and 25 others was read and on motion was laid on the table until the next meeting of the Board of Supervisors.

Moved and supported that the following resolution be adopted which is as follows, viz: Be it

Resolved, That the several township Boards of Iosco County have power to grant to the inhabitants of the several townships in Iosco County permission to let cattle and stock run at large until further ordered by the Board of Supervisors, or that the several township meetings of Iosco County have the power to grant permission of stock to run at large at their annual township meeting, or otherwise. That any action taken by the respective townships, at the annual meeting of the Spring of 1892 shall stand approved for the ensuing year. Carried by unanimous vote.

GENTLEMEN—At your January meeting a resolution was adopted that the county would pay one-half of the expense of an application to the Wayne Circuit Court to collect the delinquent Poll tax. 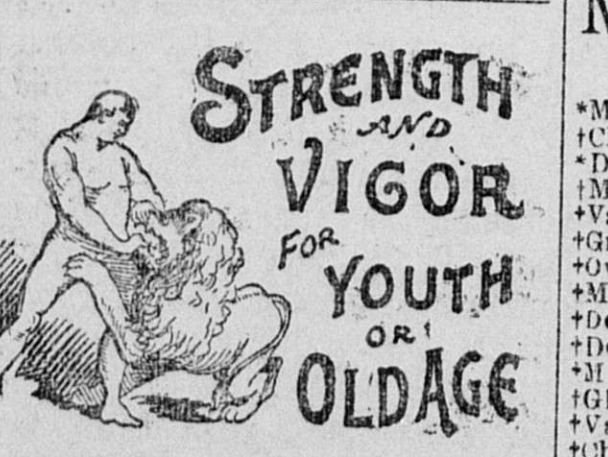

### Another Fire

Sunday morning at about 3 o'clock our people were awakened by that never failing signal—the fire whistle.

The fire was located in the Myers block, on Newman St., occupied by the Murray Sisters as a millinery store and residence and A. Barkman as a clothing store and residence. It being near the village hall, the hose carts were both promptly run out by the first persons who came, and in a remarkably short time the fire was getting more water than it could reasonably stand. The entire loss is estimated at \$7,900, and is distributed among the sufferers as follows; A. Myers \$1,800; A. Barkman, damage to stock by water, \$3,500,—nearly everything in his store being more or less damaged; Murray Sisters, loss of stock and household goods, \$2,600. The latter only barely succeeded in saving their lives. They had \$1,100 insurance on their effects. A. Myers was insured for \$1,000 and A. Barkman for \$4,500.

The building will be repaired immediately.

The fire department did not fall behind their record in doing prompt and effectual work. All credit is due the boys. They were assisted by a fine pressure of water, however, which make their efforts all the more effectual.

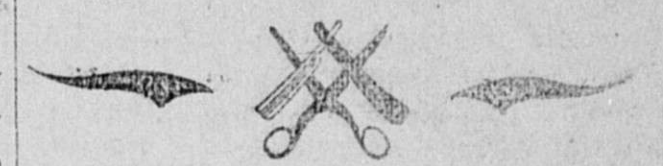
