At a Democratic County convention held at the court house to-day to elect delegates to attend the state convention to be held at Lansing Oct. 4, and to elect full delegations to the Representative and Senatorial conventions, (which are called elsewhere in this issue.) Hon. C. R. Henry, Chairman of the county committee, called the convention to order at 1 p. m., and made some very able remarks and then called H. M. Elliott to the chair, who addressed the convention and thanked them for the honors conferred.

Chas. A. Jahraus was chosen secretary of the meeting.

Representative as follows: A. M. Johnson, A. F. McDonald, J. G. Freeman, J. Dunn, F. W. Winter, F. Betz, J. R. Staats, Wm. Elliott, John Kenny, John Doyle, E. V. Esmond, G. H. Cosgrove, W. C. McLean, M. Schneider, Jas. Larkin.
