After doing ample justice to this, the party, in the evening, further celebrated the wedding festivities in the spacious parlors of Mr. Schneider by a social dance. —As we are going to press we are informed of the death of one of our young pioneers. Chas. Styles, who grew up here and was about 30 years old, was overtaken with paralysis last spring and took a course of treatment at Ann Arbor and Detroit this summer, returning much improved, and left for the Upper Peninsula where he has been making his home for the past 3 yrs., and died from the effects of the disease this week. He was a member of the Odd Fellows of this city, and was met at the train by them and relatives, and buried in the Tawas City cemetery. His Relatives have the kind sympathy of this community.

—The board of health at a meeting held last night, decided, at the advice of Dr. Darling, that it was dangerous to keep school in the new building, as the furnaces had not been put up and the rooms had not been thoroughly dried before commencing school, and directed the school board to discontinue school for ten days, and in the meantime keep the rooms thoroughly heated. Some of the school board are inclined to doubt the necessity of it, but school has been closed, however. There is no doubt but it is a safe measure in view of the fact that diphtheria is prevalent. No chances should be taken whatever. It was an unwise move putting the children in the schoolrooms without the building being thoroughly completed and dried out beforehand and resulted in much complaint from teachers and scholars. There should be no half way measures about fighting the dread diphtheria, everything should be done to blot it out. The Health officers have stated that warm dry feet, good food and ventilation are the prime requisites to avoid the dreadful scourge and these should be looked after thoroughly.

COLUMBUS DAY.

It was Celebrated in an Appropriate Manner by Our Schools.

Last Friday morning at 10 o'clock, the scholars of our schools formed at the Bagger school room, preparatory to marching to the new building where an appropriate program was to be carried out.

The procession was headed by the East Tawas Band. Arrived at the new building, after a national selection by the band, the stars and stripes were raised by a detachment of the G. A. R. The flag was saluted properly by the vets and scholars, and after a few more preliminaries the literary portion of the program was reached. This proved very attractive and interesting. Some delay was caused from time to time, and it was 1 p. m. when the program was finished.

Our Ballot.

On Tuesday of this week, the Board of Election Commissioners, consisting of Judge of Probate, E. Laidlaw, County Treasurer, R. K. Gowanlock, and County Clerk, C. A. Jahraus, met at the court house for the purpose of preparing the official ballot of Iosco County. The Democratic Legislature of 1891 passed a law called "An act to prescribe the manner of conducting, and to prevent fraud and deception, at elections in this state." By the terms of this law, there is but one ballot to be used and on that ballot will be printed all of the tickets and the names of all candidates nominated. The general form of the public acts of 1891. On the left hand side of the ticket will be printed the names of the offices voted for, and opposite and to the right of such name of office the several candidates for that office. The Board of Election Commissioners in determining the ballot, Tuesday, decided that the Republican ticket should be placed first on the Ballot, next to the name of the office; then the Peoples' Party ticket; then the Prohibition ticket, and then the DEMOCRATIC TICKET. This makes the Democratic ticket constitute the very last column on the ballot.

By the terms of this Act, a prof' copy of the ballot shall be on file in the office of the County Clerk open for inspection by the candidates.

The printing of the ballots was assigned to the Saturday Night newspaper.

The said Board of Election Commissioners are to provide at each of the polling places at least twice as many ballots as there were voters at the last election. And shall also provide to the Board of Election Inspectors of each voting precinct a sufficient number of stamps bearing a cross, (X) together with ink pads, erasing stamps and other apparatus necessary.

By the provisions of this act, each party must have at the top of the column of such ballot assigned to each party, as a distinctive and characteristic heading thereto, a vignette.

A voter desiring to vote the straight Democratic ticket can make a cross in the little square beneath the word "DEMOCRATIC" at the head of the ticket.

Let Democrats remember that their ticket will be on the extreme right or last column on the sheet or ballot, and that no mistake can be made if that ticket is voted straight.

PROCLAMATION.

I, Michael Murphy, Supervisor of the Township of Tawas, county of Iosco and State of Michigan, as required by law, do hereby warn the inhabitants of said Township, of the provisions an act entitled, "An Act to Maintain Political Impunity" being sections 9377 to 9386 inclusive, of Howell's Annotated Statutes, which said act defines the offences of bribery and corrupt practice at any public election, in this State, and makes it unlawful to sell, barter or give away any liquor on the day of any such elections, and prescribes the penalties for violations thereof.

All violations of said act will subject the offender to prompt and speedy punishment. Sheriffs, Marshals, Constables and all police officers are required to close all houses or places found violating the provisions of the said act and to report forthwith all such violations to the Prosecuting Attorney of said County and to the undersigned.

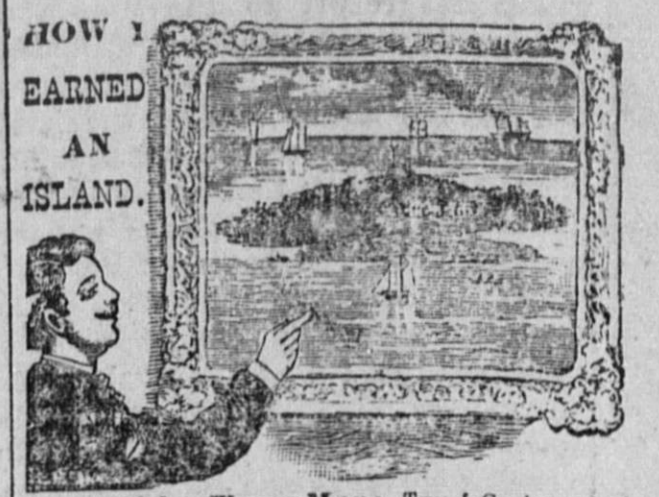

Everyone here sympathizes deeply with Mr. Harrison and the rest of the family and friends, regardless of partisan prejudices, as he is the President of us all.

Mrs. Harrison was a true christian woman, and the world is better for her having lived in it. She was conscious to the last and the end was apparently painless.

The funeral will be exclusively private, the members of the cabinet acting as pallbearers. The remains are to be taken to Indianapolis by special train for burial.

Expressions of sympathy are heard from all over the world. Following is a telegram of sympathy received by the President from Grover Cleveland, dated New York, Oct. 25:

Benjamin Harrison, Executive Mansion, Washington:

I hasten to assure you of my sincere sympathy in the hour of your terrible bereavement. GROVER CLEVELAND.

This is the second event of this sad nature which has taken place at the White House.
