COMMISSIONER Raum is keeping almighty quiet these days, but he will not be forgotten by the new administration.

Is it the Monroe doctrine or the shekels of the much favored Pacific Mail steamship company that is endangered by the Panama railroad people?

MR. HARRISON was so weary that he dictated, instead of writing, his annual message to Congress. Poor fellow! he has had enough to make him weary.

THE Democrats will not be satisfied with a change in the heads of the various branches of the government service; they have a right to expect that changes will be made all along the line.

Those who suppose that Mr. Cleveland will have anything to do with the election of a U. S. Senator from New York do not give that gentleman credit for the good sense he has so often shown himself the possessor of.

MEMBERS of Mr. Harrison's cabinet have discovered that it doesn't pay to hold office. Queer that they have just found it out, isn't it? They will all be given an opportunity to get into better paying occupations after the 4th of next March.

It is a little early to begin electing the speaker of the House of the Fifty-third Congress, but the Republican papers are already in the midst of the contest. They were so far away from the contest of November 8, that it may console them to think they are in one, even an paper.

It is perhaps just as well to remember that it is President-elect Cleveland who shall decide whether it is expedient to call an extra session of the Fifty-third Congress. This little fact seems to have been entirely over-looked by some people.

THE Republicans who are now shedding crocodile tears over the prospective woes of the Democratic party in controlling the country, and incidentally the federal offices, would most willingly have shouldered those woes, if the people had not decided otherwise.

If it be right that one set of men shall hold appointive offices all their lives, unless they misbehave, why go to the expense of holding elections? If the Chinese system is the best for the appointive offices, why is it not also the best for the elective offices? If we are to build up an office-holding aristocracy let it include the highest as well as the lowest.

GROVER CLEVELAND has not yet been elected! President, and there is talk among Tammanyites in New York that he may not be. The scheme is to throw him out by casting the votes of the New York and Illinois electors for some one else. But no scheme of the kind is likely to be seriously undertaken. If it should be it would bring down upon the men who were thus recreant to the trust placed in them such condemnation that they would never be able to hold up their heads among honest men again. Legally an elector may vote for any one he pleases for President, but according to the rules established by all parties, electors are chosen to vote for specific persons, and they have no moral right to vote for any one else no matter whether they like the candidates or not.—Alpena Echo.

Constitutional Freedom.

The following extracts from the constitution of the United States and the constitution of Michigan exhibit in a clear light how thoroughly the country is guarded against a union of church and state and how completely religious liberty is guaranteed to all citizens. These fundamental principles cannot be departed from with safety and those assailing them should receive no countenance from loyal citizens:

Constitution of the United States:
"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."
1789.

"No religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States."

Constitution of Michigan:

Art. iv., Sec. 39.—The legislature shall pass no law to prevent any person from worshipping Almighty God according to the dictates of his own conscience, or to compel any person to attend, erect or support any place of religious worship, or to pay tithes, taxes or other rates for the support of any minister of the gospel or teacher of religion.

Sec. 40. No money shall be appropriated or drawn from the treasury for the benefit of any religious sect or society, theological or religious seminary, nor shall property belonging to the state be appropriated for any such purpose.

Sec. 41. The legislature shall not diminish or enlarge the civil or political rights, privileges and capacities of any person on account of his opinion or belief concerning matters of religion.

These requirements of the national constitution every public officer takes a solemn obligation to support and defend, and cannot depart from them without perjury and treason. These are the constitutional provisions which Congressman Weadock has stated that he had subscribed to and would abide by and defend with his life. Every public officer must take an oath to support and defend the constitution of the state and nation.—Bay City, Times-Press.

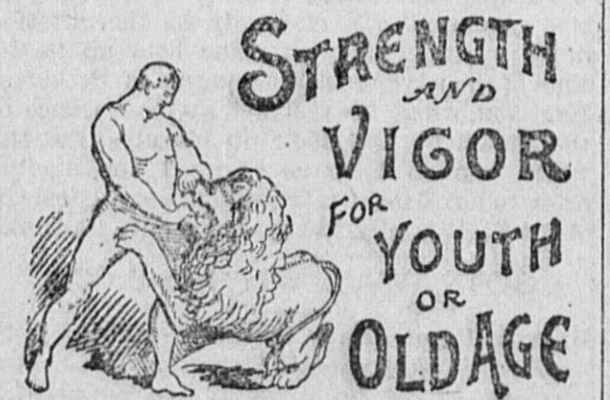
