CONGRESS is again doing business at the old stand.

The republican papers are again busily engaged selecting Cleveland's Cabinet. They might as well save their wind as their advice will not be followed in this matter, or in fact in any other matter by the incoming administration.

JUDGE MORSE says emphatically that he is not a candidate for the office of commissioner of pensions, and that he would not accept the position if offered him. Michigan intends, however, to capture that position and has another candidate, an old soldier with a brilliant war record, Congressman Wheeler. With Mr. Wheeler at the head of the department, the affairs of the office would be run more in the interests of the old soldiers than they have heretofore been, and pension attorneys, or sharks, would have but slight pickings. Mr. Wheeler is not seeking the appointment, but the people know that he is just the man for the place and a spontaneous boom has sprung up in his behalf.

PRESIDENT HARRISON'S message has been laid before the house and senate. The republican policy of protection is defended and, of course given all the credit for the present prosperity of the country. While having considerable respect for President Harrison's opinion, on matters in general, we recognize the fact that his opinion in regard to the question of protection is a minority opinion and carries but very little weight at present. The country will be as prosperous in 1896 as it is at present, if not more so, and Harrison's opinion on protection—unless he changes his present one—will cut no more figure than that it did in November last. The party will have to get a new issue as well as a new leader. Harrison and protection are dead ducks.

Auditor General Stone is out with his fifth quarterly financial statement of the condition of the various state institutions. It covers the first three months of the year. There was a saving of \$14,237 as compared with the previous quarter. The cash account Sept. 30, 1892, shows \$170,080.16 in the hands of institu-

tion treasurers, \$122,925.89 of available appropriation held by the state treasurer subject to draft before Jan. 1st, 1893, or, in all, a surplus of \$287,756.05. Current expenses during the last December quarter were \$317,761.15; receipts from earnings and other sources during the quarter, \$96,895.75, leaving net expenses to be paid from appropriations of \$219,465.39.

THE latest scheme of the Democrats is to create several new Democratic states by cutting up Texas and some of the other large southern states, and the admission of Utah, Arizona and New Mexico. This would give several additional votes in the electoral college and a big increase in the Senate. Such schemes may bring transitory advantage, but our democratic friends should remember that "honesty is the best policy."—Alpena Pioneer. For unadulterated gall, republican organs surely take the cake. The Pioneer should know that a republican house had about decided upon the admission of two of the above territories, and would have admitted them long 'ere this had it not been for the fact that they were likely to go democratic, that and nothing else has kept them out so long. The population of these two is much greater than is that of the last two territories admitted by the republican party and they are therefore more entitled to statehood. We are glad to notice, however, that the republican organs are profiting by the lesson given them last month, and now recognize the fact that "honesty is the best policy." How much better for those organs, and their party as well, had they recognized this fact some time ago. Their repentance comes rather late, but then it is better late than never, and we congratulate the party on its repentance, deathbed though it may be.

The Saturday Night is no more. In its place, however, appears The Press, its successor, which is in no wise changed in appearance from the old Saturday Night. Who the proprietor of the Press is, does not appear in any portion of the paper but we presume it is still "Senator" Pierce. The change of name is a great mistake. The Saturday night has been a constant visitor to the homes of many in this country and to withdraw it and foist something new onto the people, simply to satisfy a whim of the publisher, smacks too much of the amateur in journalism to suit an intelligent public. The change of name, however, is not the only mistake made by the publisher of the Press. The worst and most fatal mistake is the cutting of the subscription price to \$1 per year. The reasons given are not only frivolous but are entirely false. If the publisher of the Press knows anything at all about the business he knows that at \$1.50 per year he barely gets the first cost of his printing paper, and at \$1 he is bound to be out a certain amount on each subscription. He says that the cost of getting out a paper to-day is not one half as much as it was when the subscription of the Saturday Night was fixed at \$1.50. Such may be the case with the Saturday Night, or Press, which is principally made up with cheap plate matter, but with regard to papers that employ competent workmen and use plates only in case of necessity the statement is false. Further than that the statement is a complete rebuttal of former statements of the Saturday Night as a republican organ, that the wages of the American mechanic and laborer were increasing under the beneficent influences of a protective tariff. If wages are increasing or are better than they were eight or ten years ago, how is it that the cost of getting out a weekly paper is so much less than it was at that time? Again he says that the price of white print paper is only one half what it was ten years ago. The man making such a statement does not do so from experience, as had he been in the newspaper business ten years ago he would know that print paper was lower then than it is now. The same holds good in regard to type and other material. The prices have varied but little in the past ten years, and the variation is more favorable to ten years ago than to the present time. The fact of the matter is that the publisher of the Press wanted to cut under his competitors, and, not having the courage to say so plainly, invents a few paltry excuses for his action. One paper in the same portion of the country had some experience of a reduction of subscription price. It was a dear experience and the Press is likely to find it the same in its case.

There being no quorum present the Board adjourned till one o'clock this afternoon.

Minutes of July 15th, 1892, read and approved.

Moved and supported that the bills of last meeting that were laid over be taken up. Carried.

Moved and supported that the bill of Dr. D. C. Howell for \$15.00 be allowed at \$10.00 and the bill of Dr. G. S. Darling for \$10.00 be allowed at \$5.00. Carried.

Moved and supported that the bill of Dr. A. L. Ruffe for \$30 be allowed at \$15. Carried.

On motion the petition praying to place a fish shute at Rodman's dam was indefinitely laid on the table.

On motion the Board adjourned until to-morrow morning at nine o'clock.

The Communication from the State Commission for the improvement of highways was read and on motion was received and placed on file.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Iosco County, in session convened:

Gentlemen: We, the undersigned members of the World's Fair Committee of Iosco County, Mich., do hereby petition your honorable body to make an appropriation of about \$300 out of the general fund of said County to send to Chicago in 1893 goods and exhibits for exhibition. 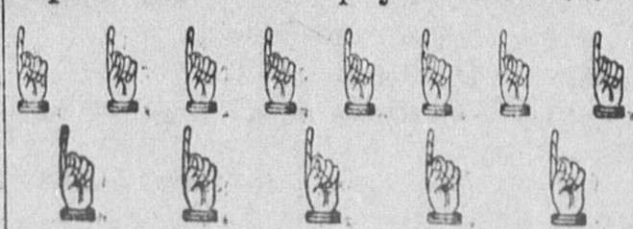

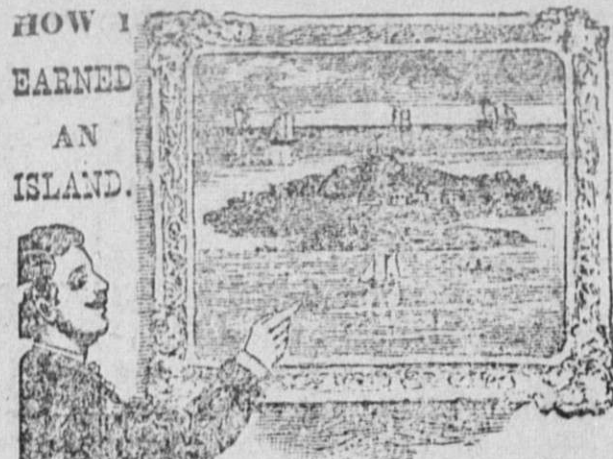

### Just Simple Assault.

Joseph Forcade, who shot night-watchman John Martin of Oscoda, on the night of Sept. 18th. last was tried yesterday and the day before in the circuit court on a charge of "assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than the crime of murder." Forcade's defense was that the shooting was accidental. On the night in question Officer Martin and constable Joseph Senecal heard the breaking of glass at Forcade's house and went there to investigate. They walked into the yard and Martin went around to the rear of the house, where he was met by Forcade with a revolver in each hand. Forcade ordered Martin to get out, whereupon the latter exclaimed; "Hold on, I am an officer." Martin turned his back and stooped down and Forcade fired. the bullet entering Martin's neck near the base of the skull. Martin went to Dr. White's office and had his wound dressed, and then he and Senecal returned and arrested Forcade.

Forcade's house had a bad reputation at the time. When put upon the stand in his trial he told a gauzy story to the effect that he heard glass break. got up and put on his clothes, went out to investigate, found nobody, went back into the house and got a big revolver from a trunk, went out again. saw two men he stumbled forward and his revolver went off accidentally. The jury brought in a verdict of assault and battery.—The Press. Mr. Forcade was brought before Judge Simpson Saturday last and got 90 days at Ionia being the extent of the law under the verdict returned by the jury.

Yesterday the remains of an aged man were found at Mud Lake Junction and taken to West Harrisville for burial. Owen Fox, learning of the fact. left on the noon train, thinking perhaps the remains were those of his brother who disappeared from here a week ago.—Eve. Echo.
