He was a member of the A. O. U. W., and had an insurance of \$2000 on his life in the order. Carlson has several relatives living at Alabaster.

BOTH candidates being on hand the preliminaries of the senatorial fight are being arranged at Lansing. What an opportunity the Democratic legislators have to turn down Moneybags Stockbridge.

It is reported that President Harrison on the expiration of his term will devote his time to writing a book on the Republican policy of "Protection" A work on "What I Know About Spending a Surplus" would be an easier job for him and would bring him in a larger revenue.

It is to be devoutly hoped that an extra session of Congress will be called and the work of tariff reform commenced at once by the Democratic party. The verdict of the country was in favor of reform and the will of the people should be carried out with as little delay as possible. An extra session is imperative.

T. V. POWDERLY says that that the Peoples and Prohibition parties will unite before 1896 and will then sweep into power with Prohibition as one of the dominant issues. That's all very well, but T. V. will have to hustle around quite lively and secure a few more votes in both parties before much "sweeping into power" is done.

MARTIN BURKE, one of the Cronin Murderers, serving a life sentence at Joliet has been summoned to a final account before a higher tribunal. He was a victim to consumption, and though his death had been expected for some time the end came very suddenly. It is claimed that he made no confession but stuck to his claim that he was innocent of any connection or knowledge of the crime. Dan Coughlin, the ex-convict is the only one remaining in prison of those convicted of complicity in the murder of Dr. Cronin, and having maintained silence so long it is not likely that he will ever throw any light on the mystery of that crime.

JUDGE CHIPMAN has introduced a bill in Congress of which the following is the text, which if passed and becomes a law will earn him the gratitude of thousands of mechanics and laboringmen in the cities and towns contiguous to Canadian towns. It has the ring of true protection to the workingmen: "No alien who is a non-resident of the United States shall work at any mechanical trade or at any manual labor within the borders thereof. Any contract to employ said alien at said trade or labor shall be void, and any alien who engages in trade or labor prohibited by this law shall be liable to fine of \$100 or imprisonment for ninety days at the discretion of the court before which he may be convicted."

THE question of electing the president and vice-president of the United States by a direct vote of the people will receive considerable attention during the present session of Congress. This is a progressive step and one that will meet with the approval of a majority of the voters of the country, and it is to be hoped that legislation tending to this end will be enacted in the near future. Representative Springer has given this question a good deal of thought, and his views on the matter are the best we have yet heard advanced. If carried out the second term question would be definitely settled. At the last session of Congress he introduced a joint resolution providing that the term of office of president and vice-president be increased to six years, and making the incumbent ineligible for reelection. Also providing a scheme for their election by the people. The committee on the election of president and vice-president and representatives held their first meeting of this session last week and were addressed by representative Springer and Col. McClure, both of whom spoke in favor of the resolution. Action of Congress on this matter will undoubtedly be based on the recommendation of the committee. Another good idea for the committee would be the recommendation of a four year term for representatives in Congress.

THE question of immigration will occupy the attention of congress more or less until the question is satisfactorily settled. The idea advanced by many favoring the total suspension of immigration for one year does not appear to be acceptable to a majority of our law makers, or even to a majority of the people at large. This is advanced more for the purpose of guarding against cholera than for anything else. While every precaution possible should be taken against allowing this dread disease to gain a foothold in this country, we think the end can be accomplished by other means than a total suspension of immigration. The fear of the cholera, however, is not the only thing that brings the subject of immigration so forcibly before the public at this time. It is a question that is of vital importance to the working people of the country and their interests demand the most careful consideration of the question. Again, the class of emigrants that are daily coming to our shores are the cause of much anxiety to those having the welfare of our country at heart. While we do not at present favor a total restriction of immigration even for one year, we are not in favor of unrestricted immigration as at present. For the protection of the laboring classes who are obliged to constantly compete with the cheap foreign labor continually being sent or brought to this country immediate steps should be taken in the matter. This question of immigration is of as great importance as is the tariff question, which was the vital issue of the recent campaign and should receive as prompt and thorough consideration from Congress. It is a question that is also agitating the old country and a protest is being made by English workman against unrestricted immigration, as they claim that the great influx of foreign labor is driving home labor out of the market.

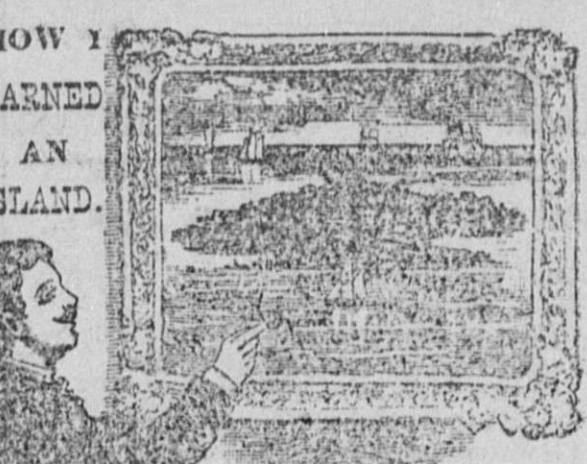

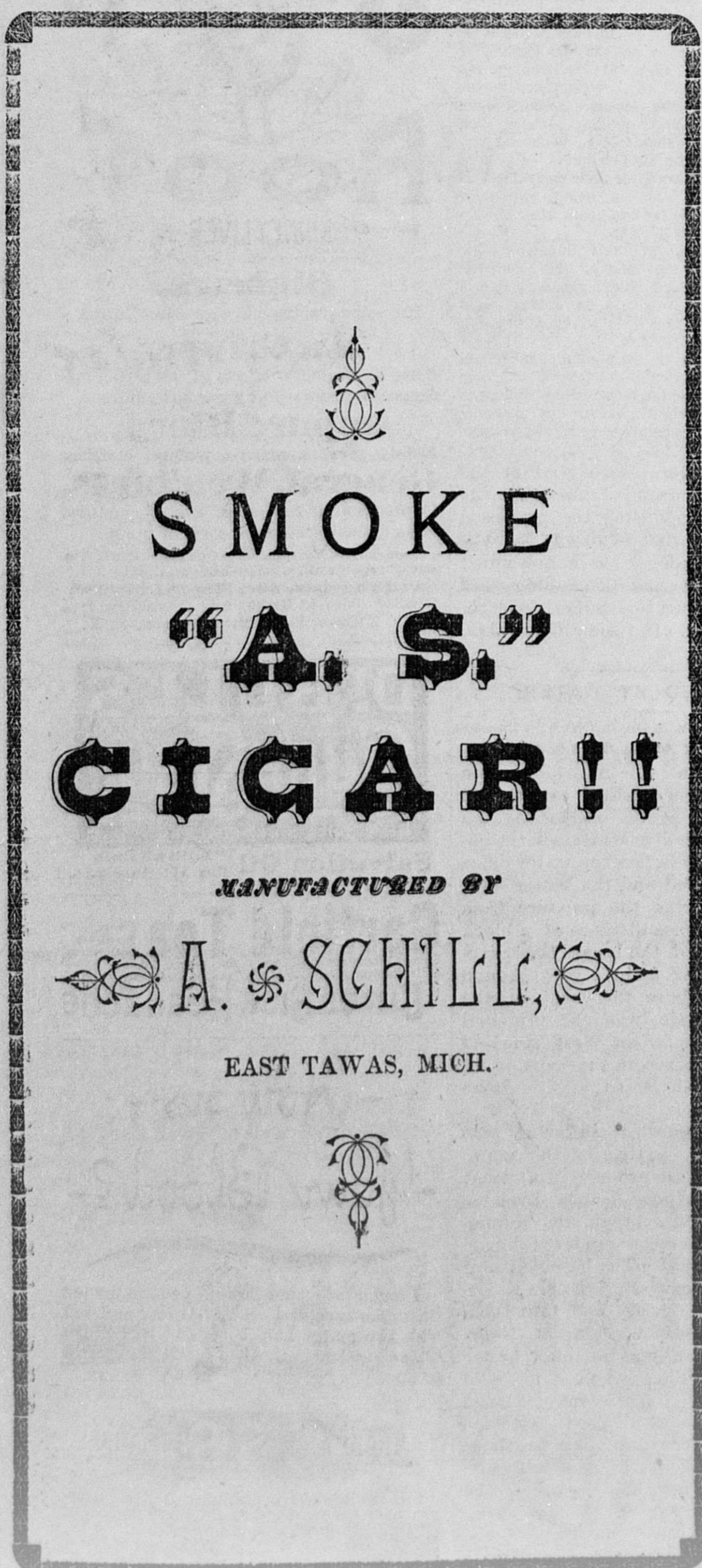
