C. D. Bennett has manufactured 7,000,000 shingles the past season. Mr. Bennett is a man who pays his men cash for their labor every Saturday night, and also pays the highest market price in cash for shingle bolts. If we had a few more such men in town we would be better off.

The Cleveland & Oscoda Transportation Co. expect to put on another good passenger propeller for the season of 1893, thus giving Tawas the best boat service from river and Ohio ports there has been for many years. The new boat will carry an electric light plant, has 35 state rooms, and good accommodations generally, with a speed of 15 miles per hour. This one and the Pilgrim making Tawas Bay the terminal point on the route will probably give us four chances each week to go to Detroit. They expect to leave this port at 5 a. m. and connect with rail at Port Austin, enabling passengers to reach Detroit at 2 p. m. same day. The owners of the line are able to fulfill their promises and desire to accommodate the citizens of the Tawas, and without any solicitation, so far as we know, are taking their own chances of making the line a successful venture.

The Columbia Daily Calendar remains the only valuable daily pad calendar. The calendar for '93 is of the same general design as that of previous years, consisting of 366 leaves, one for every day in the year, and a calendar for the entire year. The day of the week, of the month, and of the year are given, and on each leaf is a short sermon on the "Gospel of Outdoors, Health, and Happiness," with valuable hints on practical road making. The leaves are so arranged that there will be no stub left, and each one can be referred to at any time during the year. The pad is upon a metallic stand of ivory black, arranged so as to rest upon the desk at a convenient angle. The pad which is made of aggregate is enough to give it all fresh and new, and of more value than the ordinary calendar. The calendar is made by Pope Mfg. Co., of Boston, New York and Chicago.
