It is curious, but many Republican papers are warning the people to beware of an era of cheap goods if the Democrats lower the tariff. They told us before election that the tariff did not increase the price. If it does not, it will not effect the price to reduce it or remove it entirely.

A BILL has been introduced into the Pennsylvania legislature forbidding the employment of miners who do not know enough about English to warn others of danger or understand such warning. But they are still intelligent enough to vote—the democratic ticket.—Detroit Journal. Did the foreign miners and working men in Michigan, especially in the upper peninsula, possess even the trifling amount of intelligence the Journal begrudgingly credits them where, oh, where would the g. o. p.'s majority in this state come from?

THE republican legislature is bound to make places for its satellites. A son of Senator Fox had been promised a position as page, but Speaker Tateum had to give it to another. There was nothing in sight for young Fox, so the legislature kindly made a berth for him by creating the position of messenger to the attorney general. There was no necessity of a messenger. Mr. Ellis, the democratic official, had not asked for a messenger, and if he had he should have been allowed to choose his own servant. But the republicans must pay off their political debts, and so young Fox will draw his salary for doing nothing. Oh, yes, this is a reform republican administration.—Potoskey Democrat.

It is harmless business, speculating upon what the next tariff is to be, but it really seems as if those who communicate with the public might be more profitably employed. It is not likely to be an extreme advance in the direction of free trade. The views laid down in Mr. Cleveland's letter of acceptance of his nomination to the presidency will more probably form its basis. It will be constructed upon scientific principles, if Mr. John G. Carlisle frames it, as is generally expected to be the case, and, of course, it will be very different from the tariff we now have, in preparing which one manufacturer after another was called up and asked what he wanted, with the result of its being put into the bill to be reported. This is about all we know concerning the subject for the present. We may

as well wait for the rest.—Boston Herald.

ACCORDING to the Monitor the republican party in the 23d Judicial circuit is in a very pauperized condition in regard to Judicial timber, only one man among all the republican attorneys in the district being considered by it as available as a candidate for circuit judge at the coming election. Main J. Connine, our present prosecuting attorney, is the Monitor's candidate, and in bringing forward his name it finds it necessary to assure the people that because he is the only available candidate of the party it must not be supposed that that fact renders him in any way less capable of discharging the duties that would be imposed upon him as circuit Judge. The Monitor, among its other apologies for presenting the name of Mr. Connine, says, in effect, that it would not have done so had Hop. O. E. McCutcheon remained a resident of this county, but that the latter would have received the nomination without a protest. According to a statement a little further on in the Monitor's article we fail to see the need of this or any other apology. It says: "Since his residence in this county for five years Mr. Connine has shown himself the peer of any attorney who has practiced at the bar in this county." It will be noticed that Mr. McCutcheon is even not excepted. Why, then, the apology? Even if the latter gentleman was still a resident of this county Mr. Connine, according to the Monitor, would still be the most available candidate. The Herald does not, however, believe the republican party in this judicial circuit is pauperized in regard to judicial timber to the extent the Monitor would have its readers believe. We would be sorry to cast such a slur on the republican attorneys of this circuit. We have two in our mind now, either of whom have "attained fully as much prestige" as has Mr. Connine, who have been honored as frequently by the residents of their respective counties, and who are both as well qualified as regards legal ability, judgment, moral character and gentlemanly deportment as is Mr. C. We refer to Prosecuting Attorney Sharpe, of Ogemaw county, and Hon. O. Palmer, of Crawford county. The Monitor is also totally astray in its statement that there are several aspirants in the democratic party for the nomination and that the party is not pulling in harmony. The wish in this case is father to the thought. We can assure the Monitor that the most perfect harmony prevails in the democratic ranks, and that Judge Simpson will receive the nomination for circuit judge by acclamation at the coming convention. This will not be done because the democrats have no other available candidate—we have lots of them—but because he is fairly and justly entitled to it for the able, fair and impartial manner in which he has discharged the duties of the position during his term of office, and also because he is the unanimous choice

of his party, the members of the bar included. His reelection is, of course, a foregone conclusion.

If the republican attorneys of Iosco county are as poor sticks as the Monitor hints, it not considering them even worthy to be thought of as possible candidates for judicial honors, would it not be wise to let Mr. Connine remain where he is? In the event of his election as circuit judge—which is a very far-fetched supposition—where would the county procure a prosecuting attorney to succeed him? Of course a good one could be procured from the democratic ranks, but that would be rather humiliating to the republican party. The voters will spare it that humiliation, however.
