Mrs. Sullivan was married to the popular first ward councilman about nineteen years ago, and they have resided in old Kansas City, Kan., for a long time. Mr. Sullivan is one of the most popular men in the city, and expressions of sorrow were heard from every quarter when the death of Mrs. Sullivan became known.—Kansas City Times. Mr. Sullivan was born and raised in this township, his father being one of the earliest pioneers of Tawas, and those who remember him will extend their heartiest sympathy in his great loss.

Judicial Conventions.

This week has been a week of conventions throughout the state. County conventions for the nomination of a Commissioner of Schools and Judicial conventions for the nomination of candidates for Circuit Judges. The 23d Judicial Circuit, to which this county belongs, has held both its party conventions for the latter purpose, the republicans holding theirs at Oscoda on Tuesday and the democrats' occurring at Au Sable on Wednesday.

The republican convention at Oscoda on Tuesday was neither a large or an enthusiastic one, some of the counties being entirely unrepresented. This is accounted for by the fact that politics will not enter into the contest to any great extent, at least such is the wish of a majority of the electors—and it being generally understood that Hon. Wm. H. Simpson would be re-nominated to succeed himself politicians, except the most rabid ones, took no interest in the convention, he, from the fact that he has discharged the duties of the position during the past six years in an able, honest and impartial manner, always having an eye to the best interests of the people generally, having given general satisfaction, is acceptable to them as a candidate for another term. Nothing could better illustrate this fact than the action of a delegate from Alcona county, holding the power to cast the county's full vote, in stating to the convention his desire to cast that vote for Hon. W. H. Simpson. This, of course, he was not permitted to do, but it was a handsome compliment to Mr. Simpson, as well as an evidence of the fact that his worth is appreciated by the people of Alcona, and that they are anxious to have the circuit court of their county presided over in the same honest, fearless and efficient manner during the next six years as it has been during the past.

Notwithstanding this expressed preference on the part of the Alcona delegation the convention proceeded to the business it was called to perform and nominated as the republican candidate, Main J. Connine, the present prosecuting attorney of this county. After making the nomination, the convention, which was a very tame one, adjourned. Of the nominee we will have more to say during the campaign.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

Agreeable to a call the democrats of this judicial circuit met in convention at the city hall, Au Sable, on Wednesday, at 1 o'clock.

The convention was called to order, Hon. Chas. R. Henry being elected temporary chairman and Mr. Snider temporary secretary.

The committee on permanent organization recommended Arthur M. Johnson as permanent chairman and Mr. Snider as permanent sec'y.

The committee on credentials reported each county represented, the most of them by full delegations. The reports of the committees were on motion adopted.

On the call for nominations Hon. C. R. Henry, in an able and eloquent speech presented the name of Hon. W. H. Simpson, our present Judge, to the convention as a candidate for re-election. The nomination was supported by every delegate present, many of them embracing the opportunity of saying a few words in praise of the able manner in which the nominee had discharged the duties incumbent upon him as circuit judge during the past six years.

A motion was then made that Hon. W. H. Simpson be declared the nominee of the convention as candidate for Circuit Judge of this judicial circuit, to succeed himself, by acclamation, which motion was carried unanimously by a rising vote.

A committee was appointed to wait upon the Judge and apprise

him of the action of the convention. They returned in a few minutes accompanied by Judge Simpson who briefly addressed the convention and visitors, thanking them for the honor conferred on him and promising to do his best to secure the election.

After the appointment of a judicial committee a motion to adjourn prevailed, and one of the most enthusiastic and harmonious conventions ever held in the district was brought to a close.

He has constantly had before him the interests of the whole people and has discharged his duties in a conscientious and fearless manner—knowing no party, class, creed or color—and the people of the different counties in the district are fully aware of this. They know they have been well and faithfully served, and we believe they will see to it that they are served as faithfully during the coming term and by the same man, Judge Simpson.

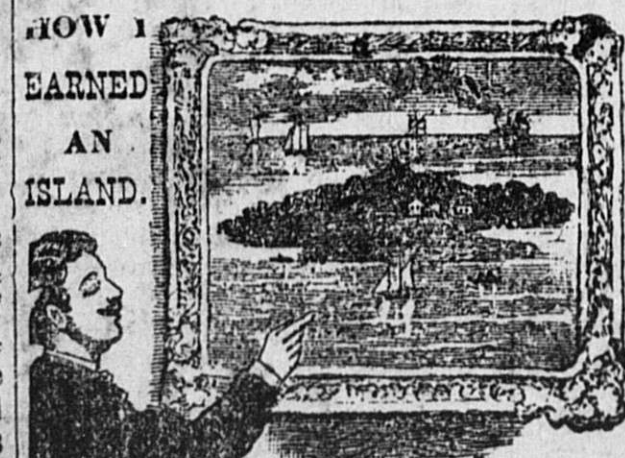
