## Judge Simpson.

Though Hon. W. H. Simpson, present judge of the 23 d judicial circuit, and a candidate for re-elecion at the coming spring election, is generally known to most of the residents of the county and needs no introduction by us, still we beieve that a great many are not aware of the fact that the judge was one of the boys in blue who, went to the front in defence of the country during the war of the rebellion. We therefore give a short ketch of his life.
He was born in Oswego county N. Y.0 Aug. 9, 1846. His father was 2 farmer and as soon as the on was old enough he began work as 2 farmer's boy and remained upon the farm until 1863, when he enlisted in the 10th N. Y. Artillery, in which he served until Oct 1865. He was in the Wilderness campaign, nd at the seige of Petersburg, and was with Sheriden in the Shenadoah battley. He alound Petersburg dice in the present at Lee's surrender. When pe attained his majority he came to Michigan to find for himself a home He attended and taught sehool il the fall of 1873 and school unfrom the Weslyn University of Ill., when he went to Oscoda where e taught school for one year, and hen entered the law office of 0 . E. MCutcheon. After completing his studies he was admitted to the bar by Jndge Green in 1876.
He is a member of John Earl Post G. A. R., and was commander Mr. Simper years.
