On Wednesday evening at 8:30 o'clock ended the last session of the board of Supervisors of Iosco county for the year 1892-93, and the life of the best and most economical board in the history of the county. The members, some of them knowing, and others expecting, that they would not sit at the board during the coming year, returned thanks for courtesies shown each other. The board during the past year has been composed almost exclusively of working men, men who know how hard it is to make up their taxes in the spring of the year, and whose every sole aim during the year has been to run the county as economically as possible, at the same time not being so parsimonious as to hamper the county or the officials in any manner, and they have succeeded so well that it can be safely said that they have saved the county more money than any of the many previous boards. Their sessions which have been from five to ten days shorter than those of previous boards, have been harmonious and pleasant, nothing occurring at any of them to interfere in any shape with the friendly feeling existing between the members. If the residents of the different townships have their own interests at heart they will see to it that each retiring supervisor, who will accept, is re-elected for another term.

## Democrat Caucus.

A convention of democrats was held at the town hall this afternoon by the tax payers of our city and township who were out in a body and the strongest men in the party were placed in nomination for the respective offices. Chas. A. Jahraus presided as chairman, and made an able address in behalf of Judge Simpson. D. O'Brien as secretary. The best of feeling prevailed and the following ticket was nominated, which is to be voted upon April 3d.

Clerk—A. F. Zelter.  
Treasurer—Geo. Keonig.  
Justice 4 years—A. F. Zelter.  
Member Bd. Rev.—Geo. C. Anschutz.  
Constables—S. O. McDonald, John Ballinger, Peter Pfeiffer; Louis Gokey.  
Chas. A. Jahraus, M. Murphy and D. O'Brien were elected as Township Committee.

The convention passed a resolution to stand by the whole ticket and to support Hon. W. H. Simpson for judge.

## Judge Simpson.

Though Hon. W. H. Simpson, present judge of the 23d judicial circuit, and a candidate for re-election at the coming spring election, is generally known to most of the residents of the county and needs no introduction by us, still we believe that a great many are not aware of the fact that the judge was one of the boys in blue who went to the front in defence of the country during the war of the rebellion. We therefore give a short sketch of his life.

He was born in Oswego county, N. Y., Aug. 9, 1846. His father was a farmer and as soon as the son was old enough he began work as a farmer's boy and remained upon the farm until 1863, when he enlisted in the 10th N. Y. Artillery, in which he served until Oct 1865. He was in the Wilderness campaign, and at the siege of Petersburg, and was with Sheridan in the Shenadoah Valley. He also did service in the battles around Petersburg, and was present at Lee's surrender. When he attained his majority he came to Michigan to find for himself a home. He attended and taught school until the fall of 1873 and graduated from the Wesley University of Ill., when he went to Oscoda where he taught school for one year, and then entered the law office of O. E. McCutcheon. After completing his studies he was admitted to the bar by Judge Green in 1876.

He is a member of John Earl Post G. A. R., and was commander of it for three years.

Mr. Simpson has been one of the best judges that ever sat on a bench in this or neighboring circuits. His decisions while being eminently fair and impartial have also been satisfactory, even to those whom they were against. He has been the people's judge, and during the term of his office had their interests at heart. Non-resident land owners have not found it easy to escape paying their taxes as they did under former judges. Formerly the least flaw in a tax roll was an excuse for upsetting the roll. Not so under Judge Simpson. The townships were always given the benefit of the doubt and the tax rolls held good where there was the least shadow of a chance of so holding. Thousands of dollars have found their way into the treasury of the different counties through the conscientious work of Judge Simpson.

No man could go before the people with a cleaner record after six years public service than does Judge Simpson, and if the electors of the district have their own interests at heart it will not be a question as to whether he will be re-elected or not, but simply how great his majority will be.—West Branch Democrat.

## The Query Answered.

To the editor of the HERALD:  
The following query was in the issue of the Press of Oscoda last week:

The following question has been handed to The Press by a tax payer, and an answer requested. As The Press is not posted on this matter, perhaps the Supervisor or a member of the Board of Review will answer it—By what authority did the Supervisor and Board of Review of Oscoda township, drop from the assessment roll of 1892, a large quantity of taxable personal property, consisting of lumber situated on the H. M. Loud & Sons' docks, so that the same was not taxed, and by which action of said Supervisor and Board of Review, the state and county taxes of Iosco county, and the township and school taxes of Oscoda township as assessed, became invalid under the rulings in the Solomon case?

As one of the members of that Board of Review I handed the Press an answer to this query, but for some reason the Press refuses to publish it this week, I wish to say through the columns of your paper that the reason that lumber was not assessed was because the prosecuting attorney, Mr. Connine advised us not to assess it.

**State Teacher's Institute.**

A Teachers Institute is set for the week beginning April 3d, in Tawas City, by the Supt. of Public Instruction. It will be conducted by Prof H. C. Rankin, of Lapeer. Assisted by Commissioner Osgerby and Supt. McDonald. The work will be divided into daily and evening sessions. The daily sessions will be held in the High School room; the evening session in the Methodist church. The daily session will consist of discussions on methods of instruction and regular class work, aiming to show the workings of a model school. The work of this session is especially for the teachers, but others are cordially welcomed who wish to attend.

The evening sessions are to be of a more general nature and for the public, consisting of lectures, citizen's meeting, and school topics of a general order. Every teacher in

the county should avail themselves of this model school instruction. It is instituted especially for you; the law allows you to attend, even though you be teaching, without loss of time; and your money paid at examinations supports it—Hence it is your school and your rights to enjoy its benefits. Therefore; a most cordial invitation is extended to all teachers to come and enjoy the institute.

DEAR SIR:—I am informed that the report is being industriously circulated throughout this Judicial Circuit that certain tax cases pending in Iosco county are being held back from trial for the avowed purpose of having them tried before me in case I am elected judge; and the statement is being made that this is being done because I will favor the parties who are contesting their taxes, and, as judge, decide the cases in their favor. This declaration is false and shows upon its face that it could have been originated only by someone who was in a position to know it is false.

The facts are these:

About two years ago three cases were begun against the village of Oscoda to recover taxes paid under protest. One of these cases was brought by the Gratwick, Smith & Fryer Lumber Company, one by Pack, Woods & Company and one by the Loud Lumber Company. I appeared in the last case as an attorney for the Loud Lumber Company; Pack, Woods & Company and the Gratwick, Smith & Fryer Lumber Company appeared by other attorneys. The Gratwick case was the first one brought to trial, and it was decided in favor of the village.

After the trial of the Gratwick case, although no written agreement was made to that effect, a sort of tacit understanding was arrived at among all the lawyers that the other two cases should be permitted to stand untried and abide the result of the Gratwick case, which was appealed to the Supreme court. These three cases all depended upon the same law and upon the same state of facts; and are all brought for the same year's taxes; and are based upon the claim that the property was subjected to an unjust valuation. The jury in the Gratwick case said that this was not true. For the purpose of saving expense both to village and all parties, a tacit agreement was arrived at to permit the other cases to stand and abide the result of the Gratwick case, and that is what is being done now. It would certainly be very unwise to put the village to the extra expense of having three trials of three different cases, when the trial of one case can be used to settle and end them all. If the Gratwick case is affirmed in the Supreme court, the understanding is that the other two cases will be withdrawn, as I am informed. If the Gratwick case should be reversed and the tax held illegal by the Supreme court, the probability is that the other two cases would then be settled without trial. So, in either event, the holding back of the other two cases is a matter of economy and good sense on both sides. They are not being held back for the purpose of having them tried or not tried by any particular judge; nor are they being held back because of any dissatisfaction with the rulings of the judge who tried the Gratwick case.

Another complete answer to this whole story, is that if I happen to be elected judge, the fact that I acted as counsel in the Loud case, would disqualify me from sitting as judge at the trial of that case; and the fact that the other two cases depend on the same law and the same state of facts, would disqualify me equally from setting in those cases. This must certainly have been known to the parties, who knew enough about the cases to originate the above story, and must therefore have put them in a position where they know their statement was false when they started it in circulation. The above explanation will apply with equal force to any claim that shall be made that any cases that I have been interested in are being held back to be tried before me, in case of my election.

**PROCLAMATION.**
