REMEMBER that there is a state as well as a township ticket to be voted this spring.

JUDGE A. B. MORSE, of Ionia, has been appointed U. S. consul to Glasgow, by President Cleveland. An excellent appointment.

Gov. RICH carried this judicial circuit last fall by 381. We predict that Judge Simpson will carry it next Monday by five hundred.

The principles of democracy, as applied by Secretary Carlisle, have restored public confidence in the methods of the treasury department. —Clinton Independent.

LAY party prejudice aside and go to the polls next Monday and cast your vote for Hon. W. H. Simpson for circuit judge. He has proven himself a fair and impartial judge and the people will see that he is re-elected.

WHEN you go to the polls to vote next Monday remember that there are two tickets to be voted—one containing the state, judicial and county nominations and the other the township nominations. Vote them both.

GEORGE H. DURAND is worthy of the high office for which he has been nominated and every vote that is obtainable should be secured. He is a superb lawyer, grandly equipped for justice of the Supreme Court.—Bay City Times-Press.

JOHN H. DENNIS, one of the leading Populists of this state, is out with an address charging the republicans with "packing" the populist state convention, and urging his third party brethren to vote for Judge Durand. Myron O. Graves, of Petoskey, populist candidate for regent, confirms Mr. Dennis' statement. They claim that at least fifty votes were cast by republican hirelings who were not even residents of the counties they represented.

IT HAS been the policy of THE HERALD to avoid all personal criticisms in the present judicial contest, and this policy has been emphatically endorsed by Judge Simpson and his friends, and, although many efforts have been made to draw the Judge into a contest of personalities such efforts have been futile. Mr. Connine is a gentleman of recognized good standing as an attorney and a good citizen. Coming to this county as Judge Tuttle's partner, he continued to practice under the firm name of Tuttle & Connine for a number of years, when the senior name was dropped, and Mr. Connine forged steadily to the front as a keen shrewd lawyer and a successful politician. In case he should be elected circuit judge of this judicial circuit, we earnestly hope he will make a good, fair and impartial judge, and a judge of all the citizens of the circuit. It is only fair to Mr. Connine to say that in the voluminous circulars, printed and written letters, he has promised the voters of this circuit to be a good judge.

School Commissioner.

Alexander C. Kay, our candidate for School Commissioner of this county, is one of the best educated men in the county. Born in Scotland he graduated from the noted St. Andrew's University and then entered the new college, Edinburg, where took a full four years course, graduating with honors. He then became principal of the Birkenhead schools, a place of eighty thousand. He resigned this position to study medicine and theology. For a number of years he lectured in Scotland, was secretary of the Geological Society of Edinburg, and held the degree of F. R. B. S. E. in that university and was lecturer of natural history for a time.

Mr. Kay came to this country in 1880, immediately declaring his intentions to become a citizen, taking out his full citizenship papers and has since lived in Bay, Aranac, Ogemaw and Iosco counties, and is at present a resident of East Tawas.

Mr. Kay has held the office of secretary of the board of school examiners and has always interested himself in school work since he has been in this county. For years he was in the habit of visiting the schools in the counties where he resided, offering prizes for the best examinations and most proficient scholarship, and out of his limited income yearly appropriated certain amounts for the purchase of books, which he distributed among the schools of the county. One thing noticeable in Mr. Kay's brilliant literary career is the fact that he has kept pace with the modern methods of teaching and is today undoubtedly the best posted person on methods of modern education in Iosco county.

Mr. Kay is in a position where he is able to devote all the time necessary to the office of School Commissioner, and the people of Iosco county make a mistake if they fail to elect him.

His opponent is superintendent of the East Tawas schools and if elected the Commissioner's office will be a secondary consideration, and undoubtedly receive only what attention could be given it after the regular duties of his school work are performed.

The Judgeship.

The people of this Circuit are undoubtedly aware of the fact that Main J. Connine, candidate on the republican ticket, has literary flooded this circuit with printed circulars and letters, some signed by himself and some signed by no one, in which he has complained of a charge against him upon the tax question. Every person who has read these circulars is also aware of the fact that before these circulars came to his view, he had never heard of any such charge made by Judge Simpson and his friends.

The writer met Judge Simpson during the past week and mentioned this fact to him, and asked him if it would not be a good thing for him to get out circulars, or in some way answer the complaint of Mr. Connine, and Judge Simpson informed him that he had never caused anything to be circulated in regard to Mr. Connine upon the tax question, that he had never known of any charges having been circulated regarding the tax matters, and that he did not believe that anything had been circulated against Mr. Connine in regard to this matter, and that Mr. Connine was complaining of something that existed only in his own imagination and has taken this way of telling the people what he would do on the subject.

Judge Simpson further said in regard to his answering these matters that the people had before them the record of what he had done the past six years in regard to this tax business; that they knew how it was when he came upon the bench and how it had been for six years before. He further said that at that time the position of his predecessor in regard to tax matters was so plain that it would be impossible to find a person in the circuit that did not know; that they had his record for the past six years of his position, and that if the people would not believe that record, and if that was not a complete answer in regard to everything relating to the tax matters in his behalf, that anything he might say would amount to nothing. That he was willing to go before the people upon his record as a judge upon tax matters, notwithstanding anything the other side might put forth by way of circulars or otherwise.

Not a single circular has been sent out in Judge Simpson's behalf. His campaign, by his request, has been conducted in the same fair, upright and dignified manner which characterizes his conduct on the bench. His opponent has seen fit to construct straw men for the purpose of knocking them down, and failing to draw Judge Simpson or his friends into a "circular" squabble he goes back to charges made against him in other campaigns and batters away at them.

Is it possible that Mr. Connine's conscience troubles him on this tax question that he must need come out and "defend" himself against an imaginary charge? **

PROCLAMATION.
