Crop Report.

The Sec'y of State issued the following crop report July 1:

The estimate herein made of the 1891 wheat crop is based on the number of acres in wheat in May as shown by the returns of supervisors, and the average yield per acre as shown by more than 1,200 estimates received from our regular crop correspondents and supervisors. The estimates of yield per acre have been made while the crop was yet all standing and are of course subject to revision.

The area in wheat in Michigan this year, as shown by the returns of supervisors to this office, is 1,578,252 acres.

Multiplying the acres in each county by the estimated yield per acre in the same county and footing the products, gives 20,895,374 bushels as the probable total yield in the State. This is an average per acre of 13.09 bushels in the southern counties, 14.18 bushels in the central counties, and 12.63 bushels in the northern counties. The average for the State is 13.24 bushels.

The total number of bushels of wheat reported marketed by farmers in June is 751,001. The total number of bushels reported marketed in the eleven months, August-June, is 13,760,490. This is 2,304,814 bushels less than reported marketed in the same months last year.

The unfavorable weather in May not only delayed corn planting but caused a reduction of acreage. The area planted in the southern counties is estimated at 94 per cent, in the central, 89 per cent, and in the northern, 99 per cent of a full average. In condition the crop is from five to fourteen per cent below an average, but in the southern counties it is 22 per cent, and in the central, 15 per cent better condition than one year ago. Oats are doing well. With favorable weather until harvest a nearly full average crop can be expected.

Compared with an average there is a loss of from two to three per cent in the area planted to potatoes in the southern and central counties, a gain of three per cent in the northern counties. In condition the crop in the southern counties is 23 per cent, or 12 per cent higher than on July 1, last year. In the central counties the condition is 87, and in the northern 92.

Meadows and pastures, and clover sowed this year, are, in the southern and central counties, in fine condition. In the northern counties the weather has been less favorable and the condition is from 20 to 26 per cent below an average.

Apples in the southern counties now promise about one-third, in the central two-fifths, and in the northern, two-thirds of an average crop. Since June 1, this crop has declined 22 per cent in the southern and central counties, and 16 per cent in the northern counties. Peaches promise in the southern counties and the State, 82 per cent of an average crop. The figures for the central counties are 87, and for the northern 74.

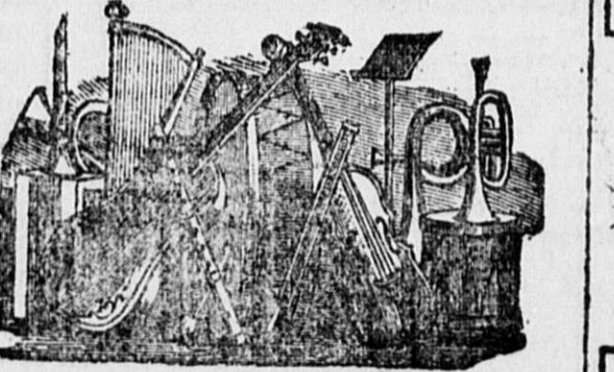

Neighboring Notes.

The village board of health has decided to exercise its authority and has issued notices to all persons exposed to diphtheria to keep away from the village under penalty of prosecution.—Harrisville Review.

A two gallon jug filled with water taken from Clam Lake at Cadillac, was sent to Ann Arbor by Health Officer Ealston to be analyzed relative to its purity. Up to date Guy Copler says he has skimmed nine barrels of dead lizards from the water near the east shore during the present month. That ought to purify it some.—Petoskey Democrat.

Thos Onequant, an Indian from the settlement, got full on the Fourth and tried to clean out Henry Voekey's place at Van Etta Lake. The result was that Tom McNeil, who has charge of the place, had to use a shooter in self defense. The Indian was not badly hurt—the ball striking him in the wrist and making a flesh wound.—Oscoda Press.

H. K. Gustin stated to the Review last week that the injunction proceedings instituted by Rachel S. Gustin against A. Backus, Jr., and Morrill Bros., was principal to restrain them from refraining upon the rights of complainant in the old spur and grade into Killmaster, which was built at their own expense and which is private property. Its cost was \$6,000. The proceedings as to the highway are a secondary matter.—Harrisville Review.

Henry Stephens, who has a large lumber plant at Waters, twelve miles south of Grayford, is building a railroad west from Waters which will connect with the Grand Rapids & Indiana Road a few miles south of Elmira. The new road will be about fifteen miles long and pass through a virgin forest of pine and hardwood, of which Mr. Stephens is the principal owner. Six miles of the road is already ironed, and 200 men are pushing the work as fast as possible.

The Lewiston Courier has been removed from Lewiston to Onaway, Presque Isle county, where A. J. West, the publisher, has been issuing a paper for some months back. He has been awarded the tax list for Presque Isle county. Both Hamel, of the Alpena Pioneer, who started a republican paper at Rogers City a short time ago and Denney Larke, who flopped his paper back into the fold, for the purpose of gathering in the tax list, must feel pretty wrathful at the Auditor General, now that they have been left out in the cold.

Sheriff Lund is happy again. Since his prisoner, Warner, skipped two months ago, he has kept a constant watch on all the past haunts of the man, confidently expecting that sooner or later he would come back to them again. One of the places where he expected to find Warner was Cadillac, and sure enough he did show up there this week, being drawn to the city by Potebaugh's circus. Officers wired Sheriff Lund that his man was there; the latter then to place him under arrest, which was done. Sheriff and prisoner arrived home last evening. Warner was not much affected by his arrest. He is the man who was arrested in Harrisville for attempting to pass forged paper.—Harrisville Review.

Mat Wixom, manager and proprietor of Wixom's circus, which showed in town yesterday, is a very mad man, and there seems to be reason for his anger. When Wixom's advance agent was in town he endeavored to get a license from the city clerk. The clerk being absent from the city the agent went to Alderman Eli Miller, who issued a license for the show for \$2.50. Miller was evidently not well posted on the ordinances, which, it seems provided for a \$100 license. The license issued by Mr. Miller bore the seal of the city. Yesterday while the circus was in progress, a complaint was made against Wixom for showing without license. The warrant was served by Marshal Colwell and Wm. Elliott, who handcuffed Mr. Wixom and brought him before Justice Dietz. In the mean time a number of aldermen had gathered in the court room and, after considerable discussion decided that Wixom be released. Mr. Wixom said to The Press last evening that he should at once commence suit against the city for \$400,000 damages and that with that end in view he had already, by telegraph, retained two leading Bay City lawyers. Mr. Wixom claims to have been roughly handled by the officers and much abused, and says that he will spend every dollar he has to avenge his wrongs. He lives at Bancroft, Shiawassee County, and is said to have plenty of money and lots of friends.—The Oscoda Press.
