MARRAM GRASS.

Hopes for the Plains of Northern Michigan.

This new grass was introduced into Victoria, Australia, in 1883, and has proved to be the most effective sand-stay ever known. Many miles of sand hills have been had taken all he had, and he had been reclaimed by it and barren districts where a few years ago there were no signs of vegetation are now covered with luxuriant, succulent grass which is eargerly eaten by cattle.

The grass is propagated by inoc. ulation, that is, pieces of turf, or banches of the grass, are dug up and transplanted. The rows may be six feet apart and the plants two loose, shifting sand the plants are set twelve to fifteen inches deep, February 2. and in sand not likely to drift nine inches is deep enough. It takes 3,630 plants for an acre. The plants will retain their vitality for three months or more after being removed from the ground, so there would be no difficulty in testing this grass in America.
