REPRESENTATIVE HARTMAN, of Mont., takes issue with the republicans who are trying so hard to create the impression that the silver question is dead. He says it is the liveliest issue now before the people, owing to the absolute failure of the Wolcott commission; that last year thousands of republicans voted for McKinley, believing that he would do something for silver, and now they know that he will not. Mr. Hartman makes this prediction for 1900: "There will be 2,500,000 free silver republican votes, 1,500,000 populist votes and 4,500,000 democrat votes for the nominee who stands for the identical principles that Mr. Bryan stood for last year."

SECRETARY LONG'S annual report contains several sentences that must have escaped Mr. McKinley's blue pencil by accident. For instance, he speaks of "possible annexation of islands in the Pacific", as though he entertained doubts about the annexation of Hawaii and he acknowledges his fear of that growing treasury deficit by saying that in expenditures for the navy "a due regard is necessary to the relation of the national expenditures to the national revenues." It is very difficult to reconcile the decidedly peaceable tone of the secretary official talk about only small additions to the navy being provided for by this congress, and of his intention to take war ships out of commission in order to save running expenses, with the action just taken by his department in placing a large contract, the largest made since the war for ammunition and guns.

Alger, Smith & Co., expect to raft about 23,000,000 feet of pine timber at Black River next season, and tow it to Lake Erie ports. It is understood this will wind up that branch of their lumber operations in the lower peninsula of Michigan, their timber being exhausted. They have taken out as high as 105,000,000 feet of pine in a single year from this section of the state.

**An Ordinance.**

"An ordinance for the preservation of the purity of Tawas River, Dead Creek and tributaries thereto in the City of Tawas City and within one-half mile of the corporate limits thereof, and to prevent obstructions of said river and creek."

SECTION 1.—The City of Tawas City Ordains: That no person shall throw or deposit or cause to be thrown or deposited in Tawas River or Dead Creek or other waters within said city, or within the limits of said city or within one-half mile of the corporate limits of said city any rubbish, or any offal, dead animal or any putrid meats decayed fruits or vegetables, manure, ashes, or any filthy or offensive thing or substance which may in any manner obstruct or render said waters impure unwholesome or offensive.

SECTION 2. No person shall maintain or keep or cause to be maintained, or kept on his or her premises adjacent to or abutting on said Tawas River or Dead creek in said city of Tawas City, or within one half mile of the corporate limits of said city of Tawas City, within 20 feet of the low water mark of said Tawas River or Dead creek, any privy or vault, pig pen, manure pile, manure box, garbage pile, cess pool, sink or other source of filth, which may drain into said river or creek and render the waters thereof impure, unwholesome or offensive.

SECTION 3. That no person shall maintain, construct or build within said city of Tawas City, or within one-half mile of the corporate limits of said city of Tawas City, any and into said Tawas River or Dead creek, or into said river bed or creek bed, any sewer or flush box from any barn, house, privy, pig pen or any building, or any place for the purpose of conveying or running any excrement or any other filth into said river or creek.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall not be construed so as to prevent any person or persons from constructing or building sewers from their residents or other buildings into Lake Huron, provided said person or persons desiring to construct or build a sewer emptying into Lake Huron, shall first obtain from the board of health of said city of Tawas City, if there shall be one, a written permit, which said permit shall prescribe the manner in which said sewer shall be constructed, and provided further, if there shall be no board of health, then the person or persons desiring to construct a sewer as aforesaid, shall obtain said permit from the city council of said city of Tawas City.

SECTION 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be punished, upon conviction, by a fine of not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of prosecution, and in the imposition of such fine and costs, the court may make a further order that the offender be committed to the common jail of Iosco county until such fine and costs are paid, provided that the whole of such imprisonment shall not exceed the term of ninety days.

SECTION 6. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. This Ordinance shall take effect on and after the 27th day of December, A. D. 1897.

He has sown 18 acres of wheat this fall. Mr. Lowe is wintering 54 head of stock, which includes 17 sheep and 16 hogs.

John Armstrong, of Baldwin, has a nice 60 acre farm with 40 acres improved. This season he harvested 48 bushels of wheat; 175 bushels of corn; 70 bushels of oats; 66 bushels of peas; 46 bushels of rye; 223 bushels of potatoes; 200 bushels of other root crops and 14 tons of hay. He has 24 head of stock. This is only his second year on his farm.

Rueben Wade has one of the best farms in the county, situated on the Hemlock road, in Tawas township. It contains 129 acres, 80 of which is under cultivation. Fine farm house a large barn with stone foundation. He has two acres of orchard. This season he harvested 700 bushel of potatoes, 155 bushels of wheat, 849 bushels of oats, 266 bushels of peas; 40 tons of hay and 2300 bushels of other root crops. He has 37 head of stock.

Joseph Lindsay, has 120 acres in Reno township, 25 acres of which is improved, first class farm building and a half acre of young orchard. This season he raised upwards of 300 bushels of potatoes; 200 bushels of corn; 47 bushels of wheat; 40 bushels of peas and three tons of hay.
