ALTHOUGH it is perfectly clear that a large majority of the house are just as strongly in favor of adopting the Morgan resolution for the recognition of the belligerency of the Cubans, which was adopted by the senate at extra session, as they were at the extra session, it is equally clear that they will not do it. Czar Reed and his lieutenants agree with the McKinley policy of waiting and will not give the house the opportunity to vote upon the Morgan or any other Cuban resolution. Thus, the country is shown how mistaken it has been in supposing that, under our government, the majority rules, in either or both branches of congress. The majority rules all right, when allowed to vote, but voting is only done in the house by Czar Reed's permission, and in the senate voting is only done when minority consents.

CONGRESS convened last Monday.

THERE are only twenty-one contests for seats in the present house of representatives.

CONFIDENCE is evidently restored at Fall River, Mass. Wednesday the wages of 28,000 employees of the cotton mills of that city were reduced 10 per cent. That's prosperity for you.

THE fight against Mr. McKenna has probably already caused Mr. McKinley to regret having promised to nominate him to the U. S. Supreme court. It's growing quite hot, and the end is not yet.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY's message to congress last Monday was a very common placestate paper. He favors the annexation of Hayti, an island for which we have no practical use, but opposes the recognition of the Cuban patriots.

WE are firmly of the opinion that no party can again fool the people by a declaration in favor of bimetalism "by foreign co-operation" or "by safeguards of legislation." The country will support the clean-cut, straight silver platform at the next election.

THE attitude of the McKinley administration toward bimetalism is a thousand times worse than that of Cleveland. The later was honestly opposed to bimetalism, and so declared, while the former pretended to favor it and secretly stabs it in the back.—*Lausing Review*.

DOWN in Gladwin county they think they have a better scheme than to return their delinquent tax lands to the state land office for the homestead list. On all lands that are delinquent for three years or more the board of supervisors has authorized the treasurer to accept 10 per cent, of the accrued taxes in settlement. In that way the lands are kept on the tax rolls and are contributed to the support of schools, town and county, as they would not do for many years if the other method were resorted to.

THE following suggestion copied from an exchange, is worthy of consideration: "If parents were to encourage their children to pay more attention to the reading of newspapers by subscribing for and taking one or more of them into the family, they would soon discover how much their children increased their stock of general information. Books soon become monotonous to the child, while the newspapers are fresh every day in the week, and is looked for as a promised present. The newspaper is the poor man's library and the children's forte of knowledge. Any man can save enough money in one month to supply his family with his reading matter in the shape of a newspaper for one year."

He has sown six acres of fall wheat.

John Dempsey, has 40 acres in Tawas township, 25 of which is under cultivation. He raised this year 530 bushels of corn; 16 bushels of wheat; 40 bushels of potatoes; 40 bushels of peas; and ten tons of hay. He has eight head of stock and one half acre of young orchard.

Crop Report.

The following is the crop report of secretary of state issued Tuesday.

The average condition of wheat in the state, December 1, was 88 per cent compared with average years. The figures for the southern counties are 84, central 91, and northern 101. The average condition in the state is three, in the southern counties five, and in the central counties two, per cent lower than on December 1, 1896.

These figures represent as accurately as it is possible for figures to represent, the judgment of correspondents as to the condition of the growing wheat crop. From the statement of correspondent in the southern counties, it is clear that the field in that section are unusually spotted, the plant has made small growth, and does not cover the ground as in average years. Wheat sowed early on thoroughly well cultivated ground is in nearly full average condition. This is particularly true of level fields, or those moderately so. But a large percentage of Michigan wheat was sowed late on ground that it was impossible to properly fit owing to its extremely dry condition. No small amount of seed lay in the ground a long time before germinating and some of it has never germinated. The warm, wet weather that prevailed the early part of November was exceptionally favorable and of marked benefit, but it was then too late for wheat to make its usual fall growth.

The total number of bushels of wheat reported marketed by farmers since the November report was published is 2,064,321, and in the four months, August, September, October and November, 7,662,316. This is 2,969,642 bushels more than reported marketed in the same months last year.

Fall pasture has been fairly good. The percentage for live stock are, horses and cattle 97, and sheep and swine 98.

In answer to the question "Are there any diseases prevalent among live stock," 67 correspondents in the state answer "yes" and 502 "no." Of the 67 correspondents answering "yes," 51 name hog cholera as the disease, and of the 51 reporting hog cholera 43 are in the southern counties.

watering Cows in the Stable.

The question of a proper system for
watering stock in the winter season is
worthy of more consideration than
most farmers are inclined to give it.
Especially is this true with dairy
cows, says Farmer's Advocate, as so
large a porportion of their milk is
water. Where roots, mangles or
sugar beets are liberally fed, a drink
once or twice daily of pure water will
suffice; but when a less succulent ra-
tion is given, even though corn ensil-
age be liberally fed, the herd will un-
doubtedly return a greater profit for
the same liberl food and care provid-
ed if the water supply is more abun-
dant. If one would watch a herd of
cows in a pasture of green grass he
would see marked difference in the
frequency and quantity of their drink-
ing. At the last Ontario dairy con-
vention, attended by John Gould, of
Ohio, in referring to the watering of
cows in the stable he gave the results of
his observation watering a herd of
cows drink. The experiment was
made with six cows, and it was found
that the average quantity consumed
daily varied with the individual cows
from 70 to 140 pounds. The test was
made in the stable during several
days, and the water was weighed and
supplied as they needed it in their re-
spective basins. One cow drank 140
pounds daily right along, and some
the smaller quantity, with an average
of 90 pounds each. Another dis-
covery made was that some of the
cows would drink very often, while
others drank at longer intervals. One
cow would take most of her twenty-
four hours' supply at once in the
morning and only a little in the even-
ing. These cows were getting fifty
pounds of ensilage per day, which
shows that even though a moderately
succulent ration is given, the con-
sumption of water is little reduced.
It was found that the greatest desire
to drink was about an hour after the
morning meal. While some of the
cows drank varying quantities from
day to day, others were very steady
in amount taken daily. The animals
were continuously stabled during the
test. It was evident that the cows
that drank several times a day did
the best. There is no doubt whatever
out that an indoor watering system
where the cows can drink wholesome
water at their pleasure, is by far the
most profitable with dairy or even
beef cattle. An important feature
in stable watering is that the water is
always at the same temperature,
which must of necessity maintain the
body at a normal temperature to a
much greater degree than can possible
be the case where the cows are driven
to a creek once a day and allowed to
take into their systems 70 to 100 lbs
of ice water. As to the advantages
of a good system of watering there
can be no doubt, and in order to as-
sist those who have not introduced
the indoor mode, we will, with pleas-
ure, publish letters from readers
who are using satisfactory systems,
explaining the plan and their impres-
sions of its advantages over outdoor
watering during the season that cattle
were stabled; also from those who have
a convenient plan of yard watering
when they may prefer.—*Prarie
Farmer.*
