Council Proceedings.

(OFFICIAL.)

A special meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City, was held at the council chamber, Monday evening, January 17th, 1898, pursuant to a call by the Mayor, for the purpose of considering the matter of making an appropriation to meet the expenses of the Sanitary convention to be held in this city, January 20-21. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Murphy. Present Mayor Murphy, Aldermen Bigelow, Dove, Murphy, Phelps, and Clerk Paterson. Absent Aldermen Rollin, Waterbury and attorney Jahraus.

The following resolution was offered by Alderman Dove, and supported by Alderman Bigelow:

RESOLVED, That while we are heartily in favor of the purposes of the Sanitary convention which is to be held in our city January 20 and 21, 1898, we are unable to contribute toward the expenses of said convention from the public funds, but recommend that said expenses be raised by personal contributions.

The resolution was adopted, all present voting yes.

Moved by Alderman Murphy and supported by Alderman Phelps that council adjourn. Carried, all voting yes.

SINCE Cramp has shown an inclination to appoint all possible opponents to good federal jobs, the candidates for congressional honors among the republicans of the Tenth district, are springing from every four-corners and cross road.

It will be amusing to see the Mancelona Herald and a few other anti-Pingree republican papers throughout the state in their efforts to get back into line next fall, when the wind-bag reformer walks away with the republican nomination for governor again.

THE recent disgraceful senatorial fight in Ohio is another strong argument in favor of the election of senators by a direct vote of the people. If the people had an opportunity to vote for senators, fewer such men as Mark Hanna would be able to purchase seats in the United States senate.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY and his advisers, it is said, are concerned over the question of president Dole's rank, which must be settled before the character of his official reception can be determined. It may add them to know that as an Hawaiian Mr. Dole will naturally expect to be entertained with a luau, a feast whereat Kanaka courtesy demands that the distinguished guest shall be regaled with poi, baked puppy and twenty-one kinds of raw fish.—New York World.

THE Canadians are bound to get even with the states for the levying of that lumber duty if it is possible. They are now talking of putting a duty on nickle. It is well known that nickle enters largely into the manufacture of armor plate and most of it comes from Canada. One American firm owns a mine over there which benefits the states about \$1,200,000 every year. The Toronto Globe wants a duty placed on matte (raw nickle) and thus force the American owners to move their refineries from New Jersey over there. The Globe says that Toronto would probably get the refinery and that this large sum expended there each year would go a long way towards the improvement of Toronto and calls upon the Dominion government to do its duty to the people of Canada.—Ex

It appears that an attempt is being made by the Tammany organization of Greater New York, to again dictate the policy of the democracy and eventually name the candidate for 1900. This attempt also seems to have a backer in the Chicago Democracy lead by Mayor Harrison, who has aspiration to run for vice-president. The "snap" was partially given away last week when the New York Journal came out against W. J. Bryan for his persistency in clinging to the 16 to 1 ratio. It is none too early at this date to serve notice on all so called democrats who advocate any change in the financial plank of the party for the next campaign, that such action will not be tolerated by the rank and file of the party. William J. Bryan and the "free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1," is the leader and motto for 1900, and woe to those who attempt to tread on either the man or the principle. They will be consigned to a deeper political oblivion than either Don. M. Dickerson or the fat fisherman from Buzzard's Bay.

If the silver forces of the country are thoroughly united, they can win. That has been admitted by anti-silver men. If the silver forces are not united, it will not be the fault of the men who are at the head of the National Committees of the three parties which advocate the free coinage of silver in the last National Campaign. As a result of a number of conferences between Chairman Jones, of the democratic national committee; Chairman Butler, of the populist national committee, and Chairman Towne, of the silver republican national committee, a joint address to the friends of silver has been prepared and will be widely circulated, with

a view to securing cooperative action in every congressional district in which there are organizations of two or more of these parties, in this year's campaign. In other words, the object is to secure the election of a silver representative in every congressional district which has a majority of silver voters. If the spirit of this address is accepted and put into practical effect by the voters, there is no doubt that a majority of the next house will be silver men.
