THE election of Senator White, of California, to be chairman of the democratic congressional Campaign committee, and the adoption of a strong resolution, endorsing the Chicago platform, ended the career of numerous very foolish fairy tales.

THE republicans who started out to throw down some of the bars to the Federal offices, are up against a snag in the shape of the inability of the house civil service committee to agree upon a bill. To conceal this difficulty and to gain time, the committee has started an indefinite series of hearings, such as the senate committee has been conducting off and on for months.

WHILE we are congratulating ourselves on the fact that the sum total of our exports and imports aggregated more than \$1,000,000,000 for 1897, what are we to say when we consider the fact that England's export and import trade amounted to no less than \$3,722,115,000 for 1897, nearly four times the sum of our foreign trade?—*Grand Rapids Herald.*

DURING each month of the year we furnish our readers with Republican prosperity supplements—no more such supplements will be sent out with our paper. The supplements are a fraud, a delusion and a lie. We are ashamed of them, sick and sore at the idea of sending out such "prosperity supplements" when at the same time we are unable to collect enough money to meet our bills after having made them.—*Petersburg, Ind., News.*

SENATOR WHITE, of Cal., who is leading the fight against the ratification of an annexation treaty, is so confident that the treaty cannot be ratified that he proposed to Senator Davis, who has charge of the treaty, that a day be set for taking the vote, and the proposition was declined. That little incident tells the story of the situation as well as it could be done in a column of space.

THE hot fight made for recognition of Cuba, by the democrats of the house, has frightened the whole administration outfit very badly. The fake news of Spanish successes in Cuba also indicate that the fight has extended to the Spaniards. The fighting isn't over yet. Representative Bailey proved on the floor of the house that the efforts of the democrats were thwarted for the time, only by a breach of faith on the part of Czar Reed and Mr. Hitt.

ACTING-PRESIDENT HUTCHINS, of the University of Michigan, will speak at the last of the farmers' Institute, held at the Agricultural College February 22-25, upon the subject: "Higher education and the people." Mr. Hutchins has also accepted an invitation to speak before the Teachers' Association of the Upper Peninsula February 4. His subject will be: "The Modern University and its relation to the people." Several days will be spent by the President in the Upper Peninsula at this time.

Czar Reed has one commendable trait frankness. When he learned that the committee on territories was inclined to favorably report bills for the admission of Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma, as states, he told the members flat-footed that it was useless for them to do so, as he did not intend that those territories should be admitted, so long as he had the power to prevent, and the present conditions continue to exist. He added that it was simply a question of gold against silver, it being well known that each of the territories named would send two silver men to the senate, if they had the opportunity.

THE refusal of the house committee on banking and currency, which has been holding daily sessions in order to hear everything that Secretary Gage, members of the monetary conference, and other advocates of the single gold standard, might have to present in the shape of a gold argument, to grant hearings to representatives if the American Bimetallic Union, was an unprecedented and an uncalled for insult. The executive

committee of the American Bimetallic Union sent a very manly and dignified protest to the committee, closing with the following appeal to the love of fair play that every properly constituted American has: "So far as we are aware, this is the first time that in a matter of so much importance, a great congressional committee engaged in giving hearings on a proposition before it, has refused to accord a full and fair hearing to both sides."

Monday morning a crew of 30 men were set to work cleaning sidewalks and were employed all day. The storm was general throughout the state.

### AuSable Tax Matters.

The board of supervisors appointed Prosecuting Attorney Sharpe and supervisor George E. Oakes, of East Tawas, as a special committee to secure a copy of the tax roll of AuSable township for the purpose of spreading the county and state taxes, which supervisor Dudgeon refused to do. Messrs Sharpe and Oakes called on Treasurer A. R. Weir and made a demand for the roll, but was refused until the treasurer could take council. The township board were also instructed to hold a meeting to appoint a successor to supervisor Dudgeon. After waiting about 10 days and no action being taken by either the town board or Treasurer Wier, Prosecuting Attorney Sharpe went to Lansing last Monday and secured an order from the supreme court compelling Mr. Wier to allow the committee to make a copy of the roll or show cause by Jan. 28. The committee secured a copy of the roll.

Mr. Sharpe also secured an order to the township board to meet and appoint some person who would accept the office of supervisor and perform the duties, by Saturday, January 29, or appear and show cause why they should not do so. A successor will undoubtedly be appointed to Mr. Dudgeon tomorrow.

There appears at this time but little doubt that the taxes will be spread and collected. A warrant will undoubtedly be issued for the arrest of Supervisor A. F. Dudgeon, and if he can be found he will be brought back for trial, and more interesting developments may be looked for. The only regret in the matter is that the law does not make his offense more serious, and that the parties who are the instigators of the whole trouble cannot be brought to justice.

### The Sanitary Convention.

The Sanitary Convention held at the court house last Thursday and Friday under the direction of the state board of health, was a very successful affair, and cannot fail to result in a vast amount of good. The sessions were all largely attended and the people showed much interest in the various papers discussed. The members of the state board of health in attendance were, President Frank Wells, and secretary H. B. Baker, M. D. of Lansing; Dr. Fred R. Belknap, of Niles; Prof. Delos Fall, of Albion College, and Prof. F. G. Novy of the state University. In addition to the above were addresses and papers by local speakers, all of which were highly interesting and instructive. We would like to give considerable space to each paper discussed, but our limited space will not permit, and as all will be published in pamphlet form by the state board for distribution, we will not undertake it.

The topics under discussion were all of interest and vital importance, as they pertained to the best and most practical ways of restricting and preventing diseases, and we doubt if one person attended who did not gain some knowledge which will be useful.

In addition to the addresses the convention was enlivened by excellent music, both vocal and instrumental, by the local talent of the two cities.

### Sugar Beet Contracts.

We have been shown a copy of the Michigan Sugar Co.'s contract with farmers for the growing of sugar beets, by Mr. Phinney, who has sent for a copy. The company agrees to furnish seed at 15 cents per pound and will contract to take all beets raised that test 12 per cent of sugar and a co-efficient purity of 80 per cent at \$4.00 per ton and a higher per cent at a prorata increase of price. According to tests already made of beets raised in this county, our farmers would receive \$5.33 per ton for beets. There is little doubt but that even this price can be increased by a careful study in raising beets.

**Sugar Beets.**

The state board of Agricultural has just issued bulletin No 150, relative to growing sugar beets, which shows that much interest has been exhibited in the experiments in sugar beet growing in the state during the season of 1897. In 1891 the state board of agriculture distributed 1,600 pounds of imported sugar beet seed in large and small parcels to about 400 persons in more than 40 counties; 238 of these reported and sent samples for analysis. The average yield was reported at the rate of 15 tons per acre, and the per cent of sugar contained at nearly 14. This result was promising, yet nothing further was done until the spring of 1897, when the experiment station again took hold of the matter and distributed 700 pounds of the best varieties of seed, furnished by the United States department of agriculture in quantities of 1 to 4 pounds to a person.

While much interest was manifested, especially in inquiries for seed, not one-fourth of the growers followed directions for planting, growing and measuring the yield, and the reports as published in bulletin No 150, just ready for issue, are not nearly as complete as was expected and desired when the seed was distributed. More than 400 samples from 64 counties were received and analyzed, with a result even better than in 1891, so far as per cent of sugar is concerned, the amount ranging from 14 to nearly 19 per cent. The yields were not fully reported and in very many cases are so manifestly "guesses" that they are entirely unreliable, some reporting more than 90 tons per acre, which is preposterous.

Four acres were grown on the college farm, and an accurate account kept of the cost of growing and harvesting, and the yield per acre. Numerous samples were also analyzed of the different varieties and from different portions of the field. The results are as follows: Cost of growing and harvesting, per acre, \$29.40; average yield, 14,328 tons per acre; average per cent of sugar, 16.18; average purity, 89 per cent. This is a good showing for the possibility of growing sugar beets in this state with profit. At the price named in the bounty law, \$4 per ton for 12 per cent beets, the gross value per acre of the beets grown on the college farm would be \$56, and the net profit above cost of growing \$27 per acre.

The season of 1897 was unusually favorable for ripening, and the per cent of sugar is undoubtedly higher than it will average in a series of years. The yield also is probably above the average.

The bulletin contains a table showing the results of all analyses, also a map of the state showing the number of samples received from each county the per cent sugar, and purity. A large edition of the bulletin has been printed, as there have been many inquiries for it beyond the regular list.

It must be remembered that the per cent of sugar given does not mean that there is so much per cent sugar of total weight of beet or of dry matter of the beet, but is the per cent of sugar of the dry matter in solution in the juice of the beet.

**The Michigan Schoolmasters' Club.**

The next session of the Schoolmasters' Club will be held March 31, April 1-2, at the University of Michigan. There will be sessions of general interest Friday and Saturday mornings April 1-2, and meetings of special sections Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons. Friday evening there will be a recital in University Hall at which ancient Greek music will be performed, and following this a reception given by the faculty of the University to the Schoolmasters' Club. The subjects considered during the various meetings of the sections will be more numerous than usual, and include ancient and modern language, mathematics, physics, biology, English and history.

**Care of Brood Mares.**

The brood mares are fed much the same as the idle work horses, and get much outdoor exercise. This we consider very important, says a writer, as it keeps them hardy, vigorous and in fine form to nourish their growing foetus. We seldom have accidents with brood mares, and our foals almost always come strong and healthy. The foal, yearling, two-year-old and three-year-old offspring of our road team Maud secured good prizes at last Toronto and London exhibitions. Yearlings and two-year-olds are fed on cut oat sheaves and bran mixed and fed often in small quantities. They also get plenty of good oat straw to pick over. Foals get ground oats and bran fed often in small quantities and a warm scalded bran in the mornings. They also get good clover hay for their night feed. We are very anxious to have our foals grow rapidly, as they invariably do on

this ration, which fits them for rapid development during the following winter on the much coarser feed. We value wheat bran very highly for all young horse stock, as it is not only healthful, but it tends to rapid and substantial development. We water all horses before feeding.—*Prarie Farmer.*

**The Maccabees of Michigan.**

Thomas Watson, Record Keeper of the Great Camp of K. O. F. M. of Michigan, has published this report of the record of business of the Great Camp Knights of the Maccabees for Michigan for the past year. Just made up, and the results should be and no doubt are, satisfactory to every member of the order in the state. The homes of 374 deceased members have been brightened by the payment of from one two thousand dollars each, amounting in all to \$529,211.56. The amount paid during the year to totally and permanently disable members and to old age members was \$36,537.66. The total membership of the order in the state December 31, 1897 was 70,779 of which 1373 were social members a net gain of 5,175 during the year. The number of life benefits certificates written during the year was 9,448, representing \$11,454,000. The death rate was 5.86 per 1,000 members, as against 5.93 in 1896. The management expense per capita for the year were 66 cents, as against 74 cents per capita during 1896, a reduction of 8 cents per capita. Since the great camp was organized some sixteen years ago, it has paid a total of \$3,144,338.58 in death claims, and \$151,665.66 disability claims, making a grand total in death and disability claims of \$3,295,994.24.
