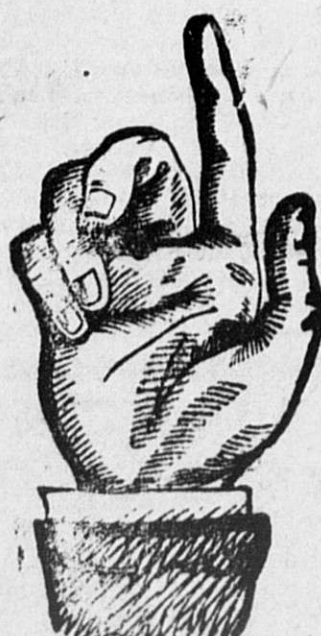

When the Cows Come In.

This is an important period in the life of every cow, although many farmers do not seem to appreciate that fact, seeming to think that because she is a brute she can take care of herself and get along all right anyway. And so she could if given the liberty with which nature provides: but when deprived of this freedom, she is one of the most helpless creatures imaginable. From a business standpoint, says a writer, in the *Ohio Farmer*, no farmer can afford to neglect his cows at this critical time. Upon the manner in which they pass this crisis will depend, in large measure, the value of the herd for the next year. I have seen cows ruined by neglect; yes more, I have known more than one cow to lose her life just for want of proper care. Now what shall we do to insure the safe passage of the cow through this period? My method is this: If I am feeding meal or any other heavy grain, I stop it at least two or three weeks before it is time for the cow to come into milk. All such feeds tend to produce heat, and heat means fever to a sick cow, and who can deny that a cow is sick at that time? I feed a ration of bran once a day; this has a cooling influence. With this I try to give some kind of roots, plenty of good hay and corn fodder, cut. The cow is allowed liberty and the run of the yard on warm days, until the distended udder, and other signs not unfamiliar to the watchful farmer, tell him that the time of maternity is near at hand. Then she is taken out of her stall and put into a good box stall, unfurnished, with plenty of good straw. I would rather do this several times than to make a mistake about the matter. The cow ought to be left to herself after the calf is born, for two or three hours at least. Then she should have a warm bran mash. Some give a feeding of three or four quarts of whole oats. I prefer the bran. This assists the afterbirth. Then milk the cow and if she will drink it, as most cows will, let her do so. Leave the calf with the cow for the next twenty-four hours. Then take the calf away and put the cow in her place. At times in the day let the cow have a few quarts of water from which the chill has been taken. By no means let her get out to drink all the cold water she can hold. Chill and perhaps milk fever, often follows such a course. Give the cow fresh hay and gradually get her back to her usual ration of grain. I never have lost a cow when I followed the above course.

SENATOR CHANDLER, who has been conspicuous in his championship of Mr. McKinley's bimetalism, has this to say of the latest attempt of the latter to carry gold on one shoulder and silver on the other: "The President is trying to satisfy the gold people and also prosecute international bimetalism, which is a very difficult thing for him to do, because the former are not in favor of any kind of bimetalism. So he declares in favor of paying the national debt in the best money in the world, in deference to the gold people, and refrains from saying that the best money in the world is gold, in order to avoid disturbing the bimetalists. It may be sagacious policy, but it will be difficult to pursue it much longer, if Secretary Gage and his assistants are to continue to declare, on every possible occasion, that international bimetalism is impossible, while the president maintains that he is prosecuting negotiations with other nations. The time will soon come for the explicit declaration as to whether Mr. Gage or the president represents the republican party." Senator Chandler was the only eastern republican who voted for the Teller resolution, which was adopted by a vote of 47 to 32.

Circuit Court.

The regular February term of circuit court convened at the court in this city, Tuesday forenoon. After calling the calendar, the jury was excused until Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock, and the balance of the day was taken up in assigning cases and hearing motions.

Wednesday morning the case of the *People vs. John C. and Hugh J. McDonald*, of AuSable, charged with selling liquor without license, was taken up and tried. It was given to the jury soon after dinner, and a verdict of guilty was rendered against John C. McDonald, and of not against Hugh J. McDonald, it appearing to the jury that Hugh J. had no connection with the saloon.

The next case taken up was that of the City of AuSable against the Board of Supervisors of Iosco county, to recover certain delinquent personal taxes charged to the city, and is still on trial as we go to press.

THOSE who have been blackguarding Spain for trying to buy the friendship of the U. S. through trade concessions offered in the negotiations for a reciprocity treaty between the U. S. and Spain, to include the products of Cuba and Porto Rico, which are now under way, will doubtless be surprised to learn that the first step in these negotiations was taken by the U. S. minister to Spain, under instructions from the department of State, but such is the fact. Just why this administration should have come out of its way to make such a practical demonstration of its friendliness towards Spain, each individual must determine for herself; but it seems to be all a part of the same deal with Spain which pacified congress and the people for a time, by sending a U. S. warship to Havana.

Co., upon presentation to conductor without the exchange ticket now required with the Central Passenger Association interchangeable mileage ticket.

The Michigan Central will continue to accept thousand mile interchangeable tickets issued by the Mileage Ticket Bureau of the Central Passenger Association, sold prior to February 1st, upon compliance by the holder with the conditions under which said tickets were issued.

The Teller resolution calling for the payment of government bonds and the interest thereon in either gold or silver, was passed by the senate last Friday, by the decisive vote of 47 to 32.

THE only democrat who voted against the Teller resolution, declaring United States bonds payable in silver at the government's option, was Senator Cafferey, La.

THE house by a vote of 188 to 67 passed the bill to pay \$288,000 to the Southern Methodist Book Publishing Company, for damages sustained by the company during the war.

CRUMP is after the scalp of Editor Jay Allen, of the Grayling News, for publishing the hot anti-Crump resolutions passed by the West Branch G. A. R. Editor Allen is receiver of the U. S. Land Office, and Crump is asking his removal.

SAGINAW W. C. T. U. women threaten to follow the example of the "crusaders" in Ohio a couple of decades ago. They say that if the officers do not either close up Saginaw saloons or make them obey the law, a band of women, with a body-guard of masculine supporters, will enter the saloons, seize the whisky barrels and bottles and dump them into the river.

THE LODGE gold bond resolution having been defeated by a vote of 53 to 24 in the senate, the gentlemen who have been paying board bills in Washington with the idea that legislation for gold bonds could be secured from this congress have at last got their eyes open to facts known to most people from the first day of the session—the absolute impossibility of gold bond legislation.

The striking employees of the Wheeler shipyard at Bay City insist on being paid the scale of 1895. That, if our memory has not failed us was a Democratic year. When Mark Hanna's most gorgeous liars were about the country in the autumn of '96 regaling workmen with visions of McKinley prosperity these wages of '95 were held up as a horrible example of the results of Democratic rule. Yet two years after McKinley's election men are striking to have the wages of 1895 restored.—Ann Arbor Democrat.

No senator presents more unique arguments than Senator Tillman, of S. C., and his latest, on the silver question, was one of his best. He said, as he walked down the aisle: "Before 1873, we used to go on two legs. One leg was gold and the other leg was silver. Then we cut one leg off, but not content with that, we placed the cut-off leg on our shoulder, and now we go hopping along on one leg with the other leg on our shoulder." The senator illustrated his remarks by action, and when he ended by hopping around on one leg, bending over with the imaginary burden on his shoulder, there was such a burst of laughter and applause that the vice-president had to sharply demand order.

CZAR REED cracked the party whip and compelled the republican majority of the house to stand up and be counted against the Teller resolution, declaring bonds to be payable in silver at the option of the government. Reed is no dodger, whatever else he may be. He is for the gold standard and for gold bonds, and he simply compelled the house to endorse the payment of bonds in gold by defeating the Teller resolution, although there are lots of republicans who would rather that he had killed the resolution by the pigeon-hole method. If many of the republicans of the house had dared to vote as they thought, there would have been enough of them with the solid democratic vote to have overthrown Reed's plan and adopted the Teller resolution.

PLAYING the voters for suckers is a very old republican game, but it is to be played again this year, and if it wins, in 1900. It is the regulation three card monte political trick. The republican administration, through its president and secretary of the

treasury, is manipulating the cards so that in sections where some silver votes are necessary to win, the cards will show the republican party to be a great friend of bimetalism, and many fairy stories will be told about what Mr. McKinley expects to accomplish for silver through international bimetalism, and in sections where the gold standard sentiment is held by a majority, the cards will show the republicans in their true colors—supporters of the single gold standard. To be forewarned is to be forearmed, and is any real friend of silver gets caught in this game, he will deserve to be caught.

The court took the matter under advisement for a few days and their decision has not yet been received.

Francis, wife of T. Kish, of Tawas township, died Thursday, Jan. 24, 1898, after a very short illness. The deceased was about 55 years of age, and leaves a husband, three daughters and three sons, besides a large circle of friends to mourn her loss. The funeral was conducted by Rev. Fr. Bogacki, from the Catholic church on Saturday last and the remains were interred in the Catholic cemetery, at East Tawas.

The United Alkah Company, of Liverpool, Eng., has decided to locate the American branch of its mammoth institution at Bay City, and last week Tuesday afternoon the deed was signed conveying the McGraw property to the new owners, the purchase price of the site being \$35,000. Bay City celebrated the recording of the deed by ringing of bells, blowing of steam whistles and various other forms of noises to welcome the event.

Waterbury received third prize on Buff Cochins, their birds not being up to standard as to weight only.
