### OUR COUNTY SCHOOLS

Oscoda pupils are to have a tennis court in the school yard.

Teacher, to culprit.—Joe, one of us has been lying. Joe—Yes sir, but I haven't.

California furnishes us the only example we have of state publication of school books. Under the law as adopted in 1885, the sum of \$20,000 was appropriated for the purpose of compiling a series of text books for the common schools. An additional sum of \$150,000 was set aside for the purpose of establishing a plant purchasing of material, and payment of salaries. In 1887 the further sum of \$165,000 was appropriated for the same purpose. Other and additional appropriations have been found necessary from time to time in order to carry on the work and provide suitable books. The state, of course, owns the copyrights and the plants for binding and printing. California, according to figures compiled by the secretary of state, has appropriated \$405,000 in all for printing text books. There seems to be other items not included in the sum amounting to \$73,669. Very much of this large sum has been refunded to the treasury from the sale of books. Theory of the state board fixes eight years as the time in which the estimated sales of books would pay for themselves and also for the plant. As against this theory are the facts that the books, as all school books must, need frequent revision, that the plant will wear out, and that the number sold does not reach the estimate.

D. F. Witter, a member of the Capital Park school board, Iowa, has this to say regarding the free text-book system: We have had free text-books in our district for eight years. We adopted the system long before it was legal to do so, but our people were all favorable to it, and we did not fear the result. We have found it a success, and our people would not do away with it for any consideration. We bought our first books eight years ago, and keep them carefully covered, changing the covers each year, and as a result we still have a great many of the books on hand included in our first purchase. Especially is this true of the more expensive books we have to purchase for the higher grades. In the primary grades, where the pupils have less discretion and do not handle books as carefully, they wear out quickly, but they are cheaper, and the item does not amount to much. Directly the benefit to the residents of the district is very marked. The best estimates are that half the expense of purchasing books, or even more in my opinion is saved the patrons of the school each year. We have found from observation that it cost a person ordinarily about \$15 for books enough to go through the high school if he has to buy them outright, while under our system the cost is about \$3 per pupil for books used in the high school. We have found that the measure has greatly increased the attendance at our school, and with exception of a few persons who go to the parochial schools, there is hardly a pupil of school age in the district who is not enrolled. This is because there is absolutely no excuse for not sending pupils. The poor are provided with books as well as the rich, and no discrimination is shown. We only charge that pupils should take good care of the books.

### That Sewer.

Much has been said and many ridiculous stories have been circulated regarding the recent suit of this city against the board of supervisors prohibiting them from using the Tawas river for sewerage purposes. The city won their case, as any one at all familiar with the law know they would. This was followed by threats of removal of the county seat to East Tawas, which story was most industriously circulated by certain citizens of that town, who even went so far as to say that the action of our city council was only backed by a few disgruntled "kickers." This story is not worthy of mention, as the taxpayers would

never vote from ten to fifteen thousand dollars debt on the county to move the court house a couple of miles farther away from themselves. as to the support of our citizens to the council, Mr. Sharp, who made the statement to supervisors last Tuesday, knew no more about that than he did about the law when he advised the board of supervisors to go ahead with the sewer as Tawas City had no control of the river.

The entire trouble would have been avoided had the board of supervisors appointed their committee to meet the council, before they proceeded with their sewer, instead of after they had lost their suit. The city council was never opposed to a sewer for the county buildings but always favored it. This fact was fully explained to the committee (and to a majority of the supervisors, who was also present) at the council meeting Tuesday evening. The entire trouble seems to be that the board went on the advice of one man, believing he was familiar with the law and was giving them good advice. The mistake has been demonstrated. The county will have the proper sewerage; the county seat will remain at Tawas City; the purity of Tawas river, and the matter will be satisfactory settled without further litigation and the city will not have to back down from the stand they have taken.

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THE Salt Lake Herald appropriately suggests that if a solid gold statue is made of President McKinley for the Paris exposition, another of solid brass should be made of Mark Hanna. It is only fair to give the foreigners a chance to see the image of the creator as well the creature.—*Milland Sun.*

TIMES are so lively, and so full of sensations just now, that the coming contest announced for Mark Hanna's seat in the senate is not receiving so much attention as awaits it by and by. Meanwhile the redoubtable Mr. Hanna is said to have just formed a pig-iron trust, and to be attending carefully to bond projects and other sorts of profitable business.

A STATEMENT prepared at the pension office shows more than \$10,000,000 have been legally paid by pensioners to pension attorneys during the last seven years. Just how much the attorneys have illegally gotten from the pensioners is more or less uncertain, but there is data enough in the pension office to show that the illegal exactions more than equal the legal fees. It is not surprising that the pension attorneys should be able to maintain a powerful lobby.

ACCORDING to a statement from Newport News under date of March 13, Captain Grommeyer, of German steamship *Castila*, declares that he saw submarine mines laid in the harbor of Havana two years ago. Two wires, he says, were attached to each mine, one being taken to one bank and one to the other, where they were attached to electric batteries, ready to be fired at the will of the officers who had charge of them. And now it appears that seven of these mines have been actually found.

It is to be borne in mind that Spain is such a little thing she could be picked up and laid out in Texas, and Texas would still have 76,686 square miles of territory to spare. Four of our states taken together have a greater population than Spain has, and their people are far more intelligent, too. Only one nation in Europe is lower in scale of enlightenment than Spain. Sixty-eight per cent of her population can neither read or write, and her credit is about as bad as it can be. The biggest thing in Spain is her national debt.—*Boston Herald.*

DR. GOMBERG, of the chemical laboratory of Ann Arbor, has just published two articles, each announcing the production of a new chemical compound of significance in chemical investigation. Both the papers are now published in Germany, and will be shortly issued in this country. Both belong to a field of work which the author had entered upon before he went abroad, labored upon in Munich and in Heidelberg and now holds under investigation here. One of the articles appears in "Liebig's Annalen" and the other in the journal of the chemical society at Berlin.

WHETHER we escape war with Spain or not it looks as if peace for the world were coming in a peculiar way. Russia has just ordered the expenditure of \$70,000,000 for warship, and Great Britain is to patch up and extend her navy to the extent of \$137,750,000. France has provided for expending \$161,000,000 for naval purposes during the next eight years. Perhaps the end will be that explosives will yet reach such horrible perfection that no great nation can attack another, especially on its own land without complete extermination of the invading forces. Is human nature too selfish a millennium of peace except by such means?—*Ex.*

DR. DAWSON, chief of the Dominion geological survey, in an estimate of the amount of gold obtained from the Yukon district of Canada, laid before the house of commons at Ottawa, places the total at \$4,100,500. Of this, \$2,500,000 was mined in 1897, \$300,000 in 1896, \$250,000 in 1895, \$125,000 in 1894 \$175,000 in 1893, \$87,000 in 1892, \$40,000, in 1891; \$175,000 in 1889, and various small sums prior to that time. On this estimate five dollars has gone in to the Klondike for every dollar that has come out, and this year will double this ratio. Still we are told that this wonderful gold region will stock the world with gold and make silver still less valuable!—*Choboygan D. moc. at.*

THIS week will probably determine whether Mr. McKinley is sagacious enough to retain the undivided support of congress in his Spanish policy. It will all depend upon the action he takes on the report of the Naval Court of Inquiry, which he now has. If he acts promptly and properly on that report and then sends the report and a statement of what he has done to congress, he will be squarely and unanimously supported by congress to any extent. But if he plays into Spain's hand by making a weak demand and delays the matter by keeping the report away from Congress, there will be trouble right away. A large majority of both branches of congress have made up their minds that Senator Proctor was right when he said that no settlement of the Cuba question could possibly be satisfactory that left the island under the Spanish flag, and if Mr. McKinley doesn't lay his policy along that line, he will probably find congress taking the matter out of his hands. He can control the situation if he does the right thing; otherwise not. Much will depend upon his first move, which should be made this week.—*Washington dispatch.*

It is now proposed by the Sons of Veterans to make good their professions of devotion to the principals for which their fathers fought by founding a great National Military College dedicated to patriotism and to be a living monument to the memory of the soldiers of the Union Army. This great work is receiving the commendation of G. A. R. and loyal people everywhere. Through education along the lines of civics and patriotism it is proposed to bring about a higher standard of citizenship and through good citizenship to have good government. This is a laudable enterprise and these loyal young men will receive the hearty support of all good people. A committee has been appointed to devise a feasible plan of organization and report the same to the National Encampment which meets at Omaha next September. The committee consists of A. L. Sorror jr., Mason City, Iowa, Chairman; Geo. E. Cox, Hartford, Conn.; Stanley Wren, Bethany, Mo.; H. O. Bixby, Chelsea, Vt.; R. M. Buckley, Louisville, Ky. This committee is now at work securing information and formulating plans. Many ambitious cities are trying to secure the location of the college and it promises to soon become a reality. This is the most enduring and practical memorial that has yet been proposed. All honor to the Sons of Veterans and success to their glorious undertaking.

### Railroad Men's Insurance Co.

The employes from all points on the D. & M. held a mass meeting at Alpena Sunday, for the purpose of petecting a local mutual insurance company, open only to employes of the road. The meeting was largely attended, and the following officers were elected:

President—C. Bonney.  
Sec.—H. Funk.  
Treas.—Thos. Hopper.  
Committee on by-laws.—P. T. Hackett; Con. O'Brien, Harry Clough and Nick Brown.

The object is commendable and deserves the support of every bona fide railroad man. By the terms of most fraternal insurance societies, railroad employes are prohibited membership, and to those accepting their dangerous calling such a prohibitive rate is charged that it is deemed almost excessive. Consequently many of them are without insurance.

The sense of the meeting was that a death benefit be paid and also a sick and accident insurance. The amount will be definitely settled at the next meeting, or as soon as the committee on by-laws reports.—*Alpena Argus.*

### Au Sabie Taxes.

After making some comment on the HERALD's remarks last week, regarding the Au Sabie taxes, the *Oscoda Press* says: "The Press has heretofore refrained from expressing any opinion in regard to the matter. It is an undisputed fact that the township taxes are excessive. If the taxes are collected at all, it will be at a great expense to the county, and the Press believes the board of supervisors acted unwisely in refusing to compromise."

We fail to agree with the Press as to whether it is a undisputed fact that the taxes are excessive or not. There is certainly much dispute as to this fact. But, be that as it may, it is not the question. We believe the supervisors have acted wisely in the matter, even though it cost the county more than the taxes amount to. Here is a delidate attempt on the part of certain public officers, backed by parties most interested, to evade the payment of taxes should this prove successful it would be next to impossible to collect taxes in any township or city in the future.

The board of supervisors have been justified in every step taken and their actions are indorsed by a large majority of the tax-payers of the county.
