OUR COUNTY SCHOOLS

Miss Bertha Pringle is on the sick list this week and her sister, Miss Luella, is taking her place in the school room.

E. M. Merrill, formerly teacher at the Watts school, is visiting in this part of the country again. He is now a book agent, and he reports great success in the work.

Many of the schools in the county use the Worner School Book Co. books. They can be obtained from Dr. Darling and J. R. Snody. Dr. Darling has nearly all if not all the books used in the county.

Miss Laura Goldie has the nicest selection of pictures on the walls of the schoolhouse that it has been the good fortune of the commissioner to see, so far. Dist No. 1, in Reno, Miss Nesbitt has the smallest but best selected library yet examined.

District No. three, Burleigh knows enough to keep a good thing when it gets one. W. J. Kehoe has taught there for the past three years and is now on his fourth one. Would that more schools would show this kind of wisdom and less of the "penny wise and pound foolish" kind. When a district has a teacher that suits the majority of the people of the district that teacher should be retained for at least two years. To change teachers every term, or even every year is to waste money, for no new teacher can do as well as one that is familiar with the pupils and people.

The commissioner is out on a tour of annual visits this week. A number of schools will come in for the visitation. Monday he was at the Whittemore school in the forenoon and with Mr. Kehoe in the afternoon. Tuesday he spent with Miss Goldie and Miss Alice Nesbitt. Mr. Campbell has some fine work on exhibit, and much interest is taken in the coming school exhibit. All the people of Whittemore are interested in the coming Teachers' Association, and the writer predicts that one of the pleasantest meetings of the Ass'n will be held there. There will be an entertainment and lecture the night before, and a rousing time the next day.

8—What demand was recently made by Spain and refused by the United States? Name our representative at Havana? What title does he bear.

9—Who calls extra sessions of legislature? By what right? What business is done when so convened?

10—Why is a township called a pure democracy? Would it be a beneficial form for a nation? Give reasons!

A Sad Case.

A few weeks ago Thomas McCulloch arrived here from Au Sable, having engaged to work in the Marais Lumbering Co's mill, and two weeks ago his wife came, and they commenced house-keeping on Brazil street. Mrs. McCulloch was in good health and excellent spirits after her arrival until about a week ago, when she began to show signs of a deranged mind, and before the end of the week she became violently insane, and on Monday Mr. McCulloch left for Au Sable with her, in hopes that by returning to familiar scenes and under the care of her mother that her mind might be restored.

Mrs. McCulloch is well known to many of our citizens, former residents of Au Sable and is universally esteemed, and all join in the hope that she may soon recover.—Grand Marais Leader.

Mrs. McCulloch was brought before Judge Ludlaw, Monday, and committed to the Traverse City asylum. As Miss Lucy Mead, she will be remembered as deputy in the Au Sable post office, under Postmaster Henry. She was universally respected and her numerous friends hope to hear of her rapid recovery.

Caring For Heifers.

Most of the difficulties in growing valuable cows, where the breeding has been what it should be, come from their feeding. It is hard to say whether the fattening, or the starvation policy, is worse for the future of the cow. By the first she is made fit only for the butcher. By the second the animal is stuned and its digestion impaired so that it is little good for any purpose. There should be abundance of food, says American Cultivator, and a good share of this should be succulent, so as to furnish nutrition in bulky form and stimulate the glands that carry the milk. All milk-producing breeds of cows have originated in mild and moist climates, where succulent food can be had during most of the year. Ensilage is good food for heifers, though if it be of corn fodder some dry clover hay should be fed with it, to increase the material for growth. If clover cannot be had, a small ration of wheat bran mixed with the corn ensilage will make a better feed than ensilage alone. We believe in breeding heifers early, and at the same time feeding liberally of food that will make growth rather than fatten. If a heifer drops her first calf when she is a year and a half old, she will always be a better milker than if she were kept from breeding until a year later. If the heifer is too small, let there be a long time between the first and second breeding, and in the meantime feed more liberally than ever, not with corn. Some oats may however, be given, if the milk production is large enough to keep the heifer thin in flesh, but the grain feeding should be stopped when the heifer dries off as she approaches her second parturition. Heifers thus managed will be about as large as if they were kept until they were past two years old before being bred, and they will all their lives be much better milkers.
