Moved by Ald. Murphy and supported by Ald. Dove, that the council adjourn until Friday evening, April 1, 1898. Carried, all voting yes.

The common council of the city of Tawas City met at the council chamber, Friday evening, April 3, 1898, pursuant to an adjournment from March 31.

Attorney Jahraus reported regarding request for removal of meat market building formerly occupied by Emil Buch, and gave the law relative to the declaring buildings public nuisances.

The committee on nuisances made the following report:

To the common council of the city of Tawas City:

We, your committee on nuisances would respectfully report that the building formerly occupied by Emil Buch, as a meat market and owned by Wm. Gartrell, is a public nuisance, and should be abated.

JOHN M. WATERBURY, F. W. ROLLIN, W. H. MURPHY.

Moved by Ald. Dove and supported by Ald. Phelps, that the report of the committee on nuisances be accepted and adopted.

Ald. Waterbury offered the following resolution, which was supported by Ald. Dove.

WHEREAS the committee on nuisances have reported that the old meat market, formerly occupied by Emil Buch, and owned by Wm. Gartrell, in block fourteen, is a public nuisance and recommending that it be abated, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the city clerk be and is hereby directed to notify the owner or agent of said property to abate such nuisance within one week, and in case such nuisance is not abated, the marshal is hereby ordered to remove said building and abate the nuisance as once, according to law.

The resolution was adopted, all voting yes.

The following bills were read and referred to committee on claims and accounts, and a recess of ten minutes was taken to give committee time to examine same and report:
