The House pass ed resolutions Wednesday authoriz ing the president to put down the war in Cuba, but they were not satisfactory. The senate is expected to pass resolutious to dav which demand that Spain shall evacuate Cuba at once, and the president is authorzed to use the eutire army ane navy to force Spain to yield house.
General Lee and Capt sioube both state positively that the Maine "as blown up by Spanish officials.
The presidents message, which was $\mathrm{s} \cdot \mathrm{rt}$ to congress Monday, has been
