Senate May Pass Resolutions Today

Which Declare For the Independence of Cuba.

The Resolutions Adopted by the House not Satisfactory.—The President's Message a Disappointment to All.

War with Spain is still the principal topic of conversation, and seems inevitable. The House passed resolutions Wednesday authorizing the president to put down the war in Cuba, but they were not satisfactory. The senate is expected to pass resolutions to day which demand that Spain shall evacuate Cuba at once, and the president is authorized to use the entire army and navy to force Spain to yield. They will undoubtedly pass the house.

General Lee and Capt. Sigsbee both state positively that the Maine was blown up by Spanish officials. The president's message, which was sent to congress Monday, has been denounced by his own party and party papers as weak.

The clerk reported that he had served notice on G. L. Corville, agent for Wm. Gartrell, to abate nuisance of old meat market building formerly occupied by Emil Buch, in accordance with resolution passed at last meeting. Mr. Corville informed him that building had been sold to Mr. Lang and same would be moved within a few days.

Moved by Ald. Waterbury and supported by Ald. Rollin, that Mr. Lang be given a reasonable time in which to remove said building. Carried, all voting yes.

The following communication from Temple Emery, Jr. was read: EAST TAWAS, MICH., April 9, 1898. To the common council of the city of Tawas City:

A communication from the secretary of the International Mining Congress was read.

Moved by Ald. Dove and supported by Ald. Rollin, that communication be laid on the table. Carried, all voting yes.

Moved by Ald. Waterbury and supported by Ald. Swartz, that the council resolve itself into a committee of the whole to discuss matters relative to fire department. Carried, all voting yes.

The council arose as a committee of the whole.

Ald. Waterbury offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, which was supported by Ald. Rollin:

RESOLVED: That hereafter the care of fire apparatus when in the engine house be in the hands of the city marshal, and that he be held responsible for the condition of engine, hook and ladder truck, hose and hose car.

The above resolution was adopted all voting yes.

Moved by Ald. Waterbury and supported by Ald. Dove, that the bonds of the city treasurer be placed at \$3,000.00 for the ensuing year. Carried all voting yes.

Moved by Ald. Dove and supported by Ald. Koenig, that the council adjourn. Carried, all voting yes.

OUR COUNTY SCHOOLS

The Teachers' World issues a fine Arbor Day number.

A class in Michigan History has just been organized in the high school in this city.

The next teachers' examination will be held at Whittemore in the middle of June.

School began Monday in Dist. No. 3, Baldwin township, with Miss Florence Oaks in charge.

Program committee of the teachers' Ass'n met on Saturday and made assignments for next program.

The Detroit Tribune severely handles the Dept. of Public Instruction for the questions used at the last examination.

Arrangements are being made for a lecture by the commissioner, at the Hall School on April 22, the last day of Miss Geldie's term.

The State Superintendent is sending out notices to the directors in regard to the Uniform Text Law. It must be voted on this year.

Miss Isabelle Dunham has purchased a set of the Ridpath Library of Literature. It is a valuable addition to any teacher's library.

The Dept. of Public Instruction has issued a limited number of copies of the Governor's proclamation in regard to Arbor Day, and the commissioner has sent copies to the teachers as far as the small number sent him would allow.

When planning your summer vacation do not forget that the Teachers' Institute will be two weeks in length this year. It will be held in East Tawas, and will begin the last Monday in August. Mr. McGee, of Hudson will act as conductor.

The Reading Circle topics for next year have reached the commissioner's office. They are furnished by D. Appleton & Co. this year, and are three in number, Uncle Sam's Secrets, Practical Hints for Teachers and Teaching the Language Arts. Price is as usual, \$2. There will be a supply at the Institute, in August.

Eighth grade examinations were held in many of the schools of the county this week. Questions were sent to all teachers making a request for them. Another examination will be held about the fifteenth of June. Teachers wanting questions for this examination should let the commissioner know of it before the first of June.

Teachers' certificates as follows were granted at the meeting of the board of school examiners on Saturday: Third grades—Peter Osborne, Sarah Beardslee, Mary Gates, Edna Otis, Isabelle Dunham and Sarah McDonald.—Seconds to Florence Oaks, Kate McDonald, Maude Shippy, May Crandall, Mary McCahey and Nancy Beardslee. Harry Price and May Ash wrote part of the first grade examination.

The board of school examiners have decided to take advantage of the law that allows the renewal of certificates with out examination when the teacher has had an average of 85 per cent on the two previous examinations, and has continuously and successfully taught in the county. Hereafter teachers who can fulfill these requirements may have their certificates renewed on application to the board.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

The week ending April 9, 1898, has been generally dry and cold. The temperature of the first four days of the week were decidedly cold, averaging from 1 to 14 degrees below the normal in all sections. The last two days have been more moderate and mean temperatures which were about normal and slightly above, have prevailed.

There has been practically no precipitation during the week; only very light scattered showers have occurred and the ground is drying out rapidly from the heavy soaking it got during March from heavy rains and melting snows. The cold weather has been unfavorable for the advance of winter wheat, rye and clover and has generally checked all growth and retarded farm work. The snow is off the ground in all counties of the lower peninsula and is nearly all gone in the upper peninsula. Frost is entirely out of the ground except in the upper peninsula and there it is fast disappearing. Very little spring farm work has been done. Some early plowing has been commenced in the most southerly counties of the State where some farmers have also begun out sowing and clover seeding. The soil has dried out very fast during the past week and with warmer weather plowing will very soon become general. Correspondents say that rain and warmer weather is needed to improve the condition of

wheat and start its growth again. Wheat is looking yellow in many places, especially on low ground, and some injury has been done to it by the cold snap of the first five days of the month.

Some clover seeding has been done. Old clover looks rather poor and needs rain. Fruit has wintered well and has apparently been uninjured by the late cold weather. Apple and peach buds are in generally fine condition and at this date promise a good crop.

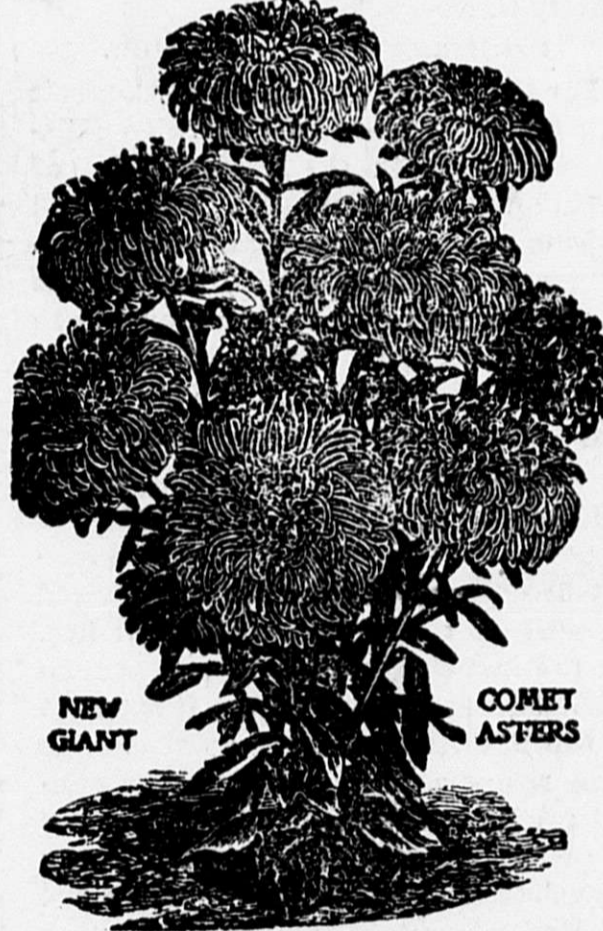
