STATE WAR BONDS.

Everyone to be Given an Opportunity to Invest if they so Desire.

The following circular has been issued by the state treasury department:

Subscriptions will be received by the State Treasurer, at Lansing, up to and including Saturday, May 14, 1898, to the Michigan War Loan of 1898, for one hundred and one dollars for each one hundred dollar bond. At this price the bonds will net purchaser slightly more than 3½ per cent per annum for the first five years and 3½ per cent. per annum thereafter.

Bonds bear interest from May 1, 1898, at the rate of 3½ per cent. per annum payable semi-annually and purchaser will be required to pay accrued interest on bonds to date payment is made to state, in addition to the premium on bonds.

Bonds are due May 1, 1908, but are payable at the pleasure of the state after May 1, 1903. Principal and interest payable in Detroit, Mich.

Delivery of bonds to be at Lansing or Detroit, at the option of the purchaser. Bonds will be ready for delivery about June 1st. At time of payment purchaser will be given negotiable certificates, exchangeable for bonds as soon as bonds are prepared.

The right is reserved to reject any or all subscriptions and to allot less than amount subscribed.

Payment will be received in lawful money, post-office or express order, or bank draft on commercial centres.

Remittance may accompany application. In case for any reason allotment is not made in accordance with application money will be refunded.

Another Robbery.

Unknown parties secured an entrance to George W. Mount's store last Saturday night and helped themselves to a quantity of goods consisting of shoes, socks, shirts, etc. Mr. Mount is unable to state the exact amount taken but estimates it to be between \$25 and \$50.

The robbery was discovered by Mr. Boldt, who found the rear door of the store open. He notified Mr. Mount who came down and made an examination, when it was found that entrance had been made by removing a glass from the window in the rear of the store.

Sufficient evidence has not yet been secured to warrant the arrest of the parties who committed the act, but strong suspicions are had, and if caught it is to be hoped they will not escape.

Suicide.

Just as we go to press the report reaches us that Rora McLoed, of Baldwin township, took a dose of paris green Monday, from the effects of which he died this morning. Coroner G. S. Darling has gone to hold inquest. The decease is a man over 70 years, of age, and has been a resident of the county for 30 years.

Circuit Court.

The regular May term of circuit court convened at 10 o'clock last Tuesday morning, Judge Simpson presiding. A call of the calendar was had and criminal cases with the exception of that of the People vs. John C. and Hugh J. McDonald, were put over the term.

The cases against John C. and Hugh J. McDonald, for violation of the liquor law, was tried by a jury Tuesday afternoon and a verdict of not guilty rendered.

The case of Wesley L. Hoffman vs. Pack, Woods & Co., trespass on the case, was taken up and is now being tried.

Second Spanish Squadron Nearly Ready.

London, May 3.—A Cadiz dispatch says that the second Spanish squadron, consisting of the warships Pelayo, Alfonso XIII. and Victoria, and a number of smaller ships, has nearly completed its preparations for active service. It is reported, however, that great difficulty is experienced in fitting out the ships, owing to lack of money.

The British engineers have refused to serve on board of them, owing, it is said, to the belief that they are liable to heavy punishment under the foreign enlistment act. The Spanish auxiliary cruiser Guardo has, it is announced, taken 14 guns on board and is now on a trial cruise.

TO TAKE PORTO RICO.

Sampson's Squadron Has Sailed from Key West for that Purpose.

The Battle is Expected to take Place Today or Tomorrow.

Washington dispatches state that a portion of Sampson's squadron sailed Wednesday to capture Porto Rico and engage the Spanish fleet. It is expected that the battle will take place today. The cruisers and gunboats were left behind to maintain the blockade at Havana.

The report that Admiral Dewey's official report had been received, is now denied. No word has yet been received from him.

Another Naval Battle Expected.

Special Bulletin from Detroit, 1 o'clock p. m., May 5, 1898.

Tampa.—Naval battle expected. It is believed that Sampson sailed to capture Porto Rico and then engage Spanish fleet. A strict censorship is exercised by government at Key West.

The St. Paul Joins Schley's Squadron.

Philadelphia.—Cruiser St. Paul, Capt. Sigsbee commanding, steamed to League Island navy yard today, amid an enthusiastic ovation. After loading ammunition will join Commodore Schley's fleet, to which she has been assigned.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

May 2, 1898.

The publication of the plans to invade Cuba this week to the extent of capturing a port and landing six thousand men from the regular army, to make a junction with the Cuban army and operate against the Spaniards, a few hours after it had been determined upon by the authorities, aroused the administration to the necessity of taking some steps to prevent the publication of intended war movements in advance of the movements themselves, as there isn't the slightest doubt that such publications are cabled to Spain as soon as they appear. The result is an order that no military information shall be given out by subordinates of the department, and lest the argus-eyed newspaper men might see some scrap of writing that would give them a clew to intended movements they are to be barred out of all the offices in the war and navy departments.

Every scrap of news from our warships, whether relating to the capture of Spanish prizes, the silencing of Spanish forts or the gallant action of our Asiatic squadron, increases public confidence in the fighting qualities of our navy, and the hope that the order will soon be issued to give Sampson a chance to batter down the fortifications at Havana.

Uncle Sam has too many resources to allow the activity in the fighting branches of his establishment to interfere with the orderly conduct of business in the far more important peaceful branches. The war will not be felt to any marked extent in the industrial and commercial progress of the country, and Uncle Sam will continue to do his part by looking after our postal system, public lands, granting patents to inventors, etc., without neglecting the war.

It is not creditable, but it is nevertheless true that many politicians of his party are showing much more anxiety to succeed in their efforts to get Mr. McKinley to appoint their favorite officers in the volunteer army than they are in making efforts to help rush the war to a speedy close. In addition to a number of appointments that will be at his disposal under the law reorganizing the regular army, there are 384 officers to be appointed by him in the volunteer army—twelve major generals, 34 big generals and the following staff officers; 21 lieut. cols. 100 majors, 147 capt., and 68 first lieuts. The scramble for the staff positions especially is being participated in by men who make no pretence of having any other claim or ability to fill the places than their political pull. In the appointments so far announced Mr. McKinley has not yielded much to political influence, and he has told a number of democratic senators and representatives that he did not intend that politics should determine a single one of these appointments.

The democrats who voted against the republican war revenue bill, which passed the house by a vote of 181 to 131—only six democrats voted for the bill—did not do so because they did not believe in providing the government with all the money that it will need to lick Spain, and any other European nation that attempts to meddle with the thrashing process, but to show their disapproval, not only of the method by which this bill provides for raising money but of the method resorted to by Mr. Dingley and his republican associates of the ways and means committee in preparing the bill. The democratic members of the committee were not asked to help prepare the bill, but an attempt was made to cram it down their throats after it was prepared, although it is un-democratic all the way through, because all of the taxes it imposes will fall heaviest upon the poorest of our people, and the richest and most favored classes and corporations will not be made to bare their share of the burden. The democrats also believe that the authorization of the issue of \$600,000,000 in bonds was unnecessary at this early stage of the war, and that all of the money needed could otherwise be provided for anyway.

Senator Gorman says he retired from the chairmanship of the democratic caucus, which he held for many years, for personal reasons and because his term will expire next March and he certainly ought to know better than those who are giving other reasons for the change. Senator Turpie, of Ind., succeeded Mr. Gorman as chairman of the democratic caucus.

A DASTARDLY ACT!

A Spanish Spy Attempts to Blow up the Government Magazine at Indianhead.

A French Steamship Loaded with Contraband Cargo Captured While Attempting to Run the Blockade.

Special Bulletin from Detroit, 1 o'clock p. m., May 6, 1898.

Washington.—A dastardly attempt was made by a Spanish spy to blow up the government magazine at Indianhead last night. The magazines contain thousands of pounds of dynamite and gun-cotton. The buildings were fired but the wind saved them. It was clearly an act of incendiarism. Millions of dollars worth of government's munitions are stored there.

A Key West dispatch says the French steamer Lafayette attempted to run the blockade and refused to stop when signaled. The Anapolis fired on her and after a hard chase captured her. She had on board a contraband cargo.

Admiral Sampson Expected to Engage in a Battle To-day.

Washington dispatches state that a portion of Sampson's squadron sailed Wednesday to capture Porto Rico and engage the Spanish fleet. It is expected that the battle will take place today. The cruisers and gunboats were left behind to maintain the blockade at Havana.

The report that Admiral Dewey's official report had been received, is now denied. No word has yet been received from him.

A Recruiting Office To Be Opened There.

A dispatch from Mobile says: Lieut. Weston, of the 19th infantry has been ordered to Saginaw to open a recruiting office.

RIOTING CONTINUES.

A Revolution in Spain is More Than Probable.

A Madrid dispatch says rioting continues. Soldiers are shooting women and children. Guards join rioters and all Spain is revolutionary. Weyler is the hero of rebellious Spain and is bound to come to the front. The royal family seem to be doomed.

Confirmed.

LONDON.—A Singapore dispatch confirms the destruction of the Spanish fleet by Commodore Dewey. Manila was shelled, causing great loss of life.

ONE of the funniest things that has appeared in the Gazette for some time is the editor's "gush" over Tip Aplin's appointment as postmaster of West Bay City. He is so "pleased" at the reward of "Tip's" "partial recognition" for faithful service, rendered gratis. The facts are Tip is the most persistent "papsucker" in the tenth district, even to the extent of holding a good federal job for four years and drawing his salary in violation to the law. Besides this he did not devote three weeks time to the office in the four years.

Uncle Sam's navy will be very materially strengthened in the near future by the addition of three new battle ships of a different type than the Oregon, Indiana and Massachusetts. The first of the three, the Alabama was launched at Philadelphia yesterday and will be fitted out as rapidly as possible. Battle ships are not built in a day, and even by working double crews the Alabama will not be ready for active service for six months. The Alabama is 374 feet long; 72 feet breadth; 23 feet, 6 inch draught and has a displacement of 11,520 tons. The main battery consists of four 13 inch guns in turrets; four 6 inch rapid firing guns. Secondary battery, 17 six pounder rapid-fire guns, 6 one-pound rapid-fire guns and four Gatling. Maximum thickness of armor on waterline 16 and one-half inches tapering to 9 and one-half inches at the bottom of the belt. The Alabama will have a guaranteed speed of 16 knots. The other vessels of this class are the Illinois and Wisconsin.

The meeting of the Iosco County Teacher's Association at Whittemore was a success in every sense of the word. All the East Tawas teachers but two, and all of Tawas City except one, were present, and all the district teachers with but one or two exceptions. The lecture Friday night by the Commissioner was well attended. A number of the teachers were able to be present.

Price presented his views on Nature study and was followed by a splendid discussion of this important topic. On motion of Mr. Stephenson, a call of the house was made and only Mr. Campbell and Mr. Price seemed to be in favor of no written work.

Mr. Gregory read his paper on this subject written for a previous meeting of the Association, which he did not attend.

Rev. E. Johnson, of Whittemore, had for a topic "The Teacher as a Moral Factor in the Community." He treated it in a strong manner and gave much amusement to the assemblage with his experiences as a teacher in Frog Street. At this point an adjournment was made to the Hotel Drummond, where dinner was served to the visitors.

At two p.m. the work was resumed, Miss McElhinney beginning a discussion on grammar, as the paper was not presented. Her position on this subject was sustained by extracts from a late work of J. U. Patrick, author of "Pebbles," etc. Miss Wye of East Tawas, took exception to the idea that too much technical grammar was being taught, and made an able talk from her point of view. Miss Wye thinks that technical grammar will do nearly as much to train the reasoning faculties as arithmetic.

Miss Bannan lead a discussion on music. This subject was well treated and some good thoughts brought out.

During the recess the room was darkened and preparations made for the paper on Physiology, by Mr. Stephenson. The talk given was illustrated by fine views, shown by the stereopticon. Mr. Schofield manipulated the machine. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Stephenson at the end of his talk.

Miss Oakes had the Comet and she remembered most teachers present. Her story of Sir Walter was much appreciated. We wonder who she meant? Miss Oakes had put much work into "Comet," and the result was satisfactory to all.

CRUISER CHARLESTON.

It has Sailed for Manila with Supplies for Admiral Dewey.

Vallejo, Cal., May 18.—The cruiser Charleston got under way for Manila shortly after 10 o'clock this morning. Salutes were fired at Mare Island navy yard and the employees of the yard and the citizens of Vallejo, who were assembled along the shore, vigorously cheered the departing vessel. The compasses of the Charleston will be adjusted as she proceeds down the bay and no stop will be made at San Francisco.

On the yessie are a number of newspaper correspondents, among them E. Langley Jones, who has been ordered to Manila to report the movements of the United States troops there for the Associated Press.

The Charleston was heavily loaded with ammunition for her own guns, in addition to a large supply of powder and projectiles for Admiral Dewey's fleet. No troops were carried on the cruiser and she has no room for more than her own crew, 380 men.

The cruiser was heavily loaded with coal, but will not have much left when she reaches Manila.

TAX TITLE DEALERS BLUE

Decision of the Supreme Court Yesterday a Reverse.

Lansing, Mich., May 18, (Special)—The decision in the case of Featherly vs. Hoffman, affirmed in the supreme court yesterday, is a defeat for tax title dealers. It was alleged by the defendant's attorneys that the description had been cut from the affidavit of sale, but the court decided that the evidence was insufficient, and affirmed the judgment setting aside the sale made by Mrs. Featherly in 1895, for 1893 taxes.

Tax dealers say a premium has been placed on the slashing of records by this decision.

Michigan Troops May Go To Manila.

New York, May 18.—The Washington correspondent of the Journal says that Gen. Merritt will be given the strongest division of 15,000 men it is possible to raise in the United States for army occupation of the Philippine. He will be given the pick of troops in various states. Crack regiments from Ohio and Michigan will probably be in Merritt's command. The vanguard of a thousand men will be sent to Cavite to prepare camp for the troops that are to follow.

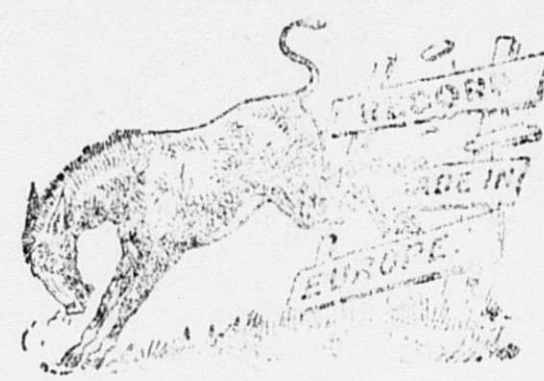

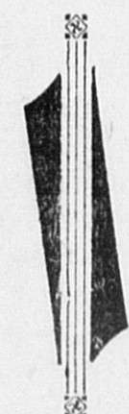

Timothy and Clover Hay.

It is rather surprising that Timothy hay keeps its popularity so well as it does. At its best its nutritive value is much less than clover. But very little Timothy grass is cut early enough to be at its best, because the majority of customers prefer it after it has fully formed its seed and has passed the flowering stage. Timothy then has largely changed the richer juices which the green Timothy possesses into woody fibre that is little better than so much straw. At its best, says American Cultivator, and cut before flowering, Timothy contains, of its dry matter, possibly four or five per cent of albumenoids. But Timothy grass cut thus young, dries down to less than half the bulk it will make if cut two or three weeks later. Consequently no farmer is willing to cut it early, particularly as the majority of horsemen like the Timothy hay fully ripened; making up for its deficiency of nutriment by grain feeding, which supplies the animal with food most conducive to strength, and in such concentrated form that there is little distention of stomach to prevent the horse from making its best speed. Where Timothy hay is feed without grain, as it is on most farms, while horses are not working, it is a very poor and uneconomical feed. Horses will grow poor if feed on the dried fiber of fully ripened Timothy hay. We sometimes hear complaints that horses grow poor and show rough staring coats while they have Timothy hay always in their racks or mangers, though they have nothing to do. These same horses will flesh up and even fatten when set to work in the spring, when some of the hay is cut and fed, moistened, with a mixture of corn and oatmeal. This, we think, is a better feed for horses than

have Timothy, than is cut hay and oat meal. Timothy is very deficient in fattening properties as well as in the nutrition for giving strength. When some clover is mixed with the Timothy, oats are a better grain to grind to be mixed as cut feed, than is corn and oats. If the hay is all clover, horses for farm work will do well on it without any grain, though they will even then be somewhat more efficient if given a small amount of oats with the hay. It is only the careless feeding of clover hay which makes it unpopular with horsemen. It is never disliked by horses and cows. Indeed, the trouble is, that horses like it too well, and if given all they can eat, will gorge themselves so full that in hard working, or fast driving, the gorged stomach will press against the lungs. There is almost always some dust with clover hay, because, being highly nitrogenous, the clover heats too much and some of it is burned, which makes it very dusty. This, with horses whose wind has already been injured by fast driving on an overloaded stomach, produces cough and the disease called "heaves." Yet the worst broken-winded horse we ever knew was used on the farm for work for many years. Care, however was taken never to feed clover hay without wetting it; in fact all the clover hay it ate was cut and had meal on it, so that all the broken-winded horse's feed came to it in a concentrated form. Clover hay is universally reckoned the best feed for horned cattle, including sheep. For either of these, Timothy hay as it is usually cured, is very poor feed. Cows fed on Timothy hay cannot yield a large amount of milk, and what they do give will not be rich and will make a white and inferior quality of butter. In fact, with a very little clover hay to even up the ration, cows will give more milk and make better butter on corn stalks than on any kind of hay as their main diet. If some ears of corn or corn meal are also fed to cows, the yield of milk will be all the greater, taking care, however, to lessen the grain ration if the cows fatten too rapidly under it.
