MEMORIAL DAY.

Arrangements Made For Its Proper Observance in the Tawas.

Next Monday is Memorial Day and arrangements for its proper observance in the Tawas has been made by G. K. Warren Post, No. 63, G. A. R. and kindred organization, the W. R. C. and S. of V. The citizens in general are requested to join the exercises of honoring our heroes dead.

Next Sunday afternoon at 2:30, (local time) the regular Grand Army Memorial Service will be held at the East Tawas opera house. The address will be delivered by Capt. B. F. Oakes, and the public in general are invited to attend.

Monday forenoon exercises will be held at the Tawas City cemetery. The procession will leave the depot at 9:15. Mayor J. W. King will act as marshal of the day.

At 1 o'clock in the afternoon the column will leave the G. A. R. hall in East Tawas and proceed to the East Tawas cemetery where exercises will be conducted.

The public schools and citizens in general are invited to attend and participate in each of the services.

ARMY OF INVASION.

It May Move to Cuba this Week.

New York, May 25.—A Washington special to the Journal says that the American army of invasion will have started for Cuba before the end of this week unless all signs fail, and it would not be surprising, after the embargo on the correspondents at Tampa and other embarkation points is removed later in the week, to learn that they had sailed Thursday. Fifteen thousand men have been sleeping on their arms for weeks and can leave on a moment's notice. The expedition will start at night and a landing will be made early the following morning.

Secretary Alger, Gen. Miles, Assistant Secretary Mekejohn and Adjt.-Gen. Corbin had a conference this afternoon, at the close of which great activity was displayed in all departments.

Last week revenue officers learned that a good deal of beer and other liquor was being consumed, at Camp Eaton, Island Lake, and much of it being sold without license, the officers started an investigation, whether sold with or without a license, the furnishing of liquor to our soldier boys is a shame and a disgrace.—Michigan Christian Advocate.

Young officers who are burning to win honor and distinction in the war with Spain in Cuba, will do well to note the fact that Antonio Maceo, the hero of two Cuban wars, whose lion-like courage add keen military sense have been among the most potent factors for the freedom of Cuba, was according to his friends, a total abstainer, not even using liquor as a medicine. Remarkable as it may seem, he did not even use tobacco.—Voice.

Cardinal Gibbons in a recent address to a class of children, confirmed by him at St. Augustine's church, Washington, said: "I believe that habits of intemperance are contracted in youth.
