OUR COUNTY SCHOOLS

The following paper was given by Miss Mable Redhead, of the ninth grade of the Tawas City Public Schools at the Memorial Day exercises.

THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

In no country, save our America, does there exist among the people, such a feeling of common brotherhood, and in no other association is this fraternal feeling more obvious, than in that of the Grand Army of the Republic.

When in 1861 President Lincoln called for volunteers, to help preserve our Union, men from all over our land responded to that call, and went forth, as one man with one mind, to save the country or die. Many did die, as we all know, but the Union lived.

When the war was ended, and the brave soldiers had returned to their homes, an idea was suggested by Dr. B. F. Stephenson, of Springfield Ill., that all honorably discharged soldiers and sailors, of the army navy and marine corps, should unite in forming an organization for the purpose of keeping alive the brotherly feeling, that had bound them together in hours of peril, as well as in hours of triumph. And as a still more worthy object, that of perpetuating the memory of their dead.

In order to effectually carry out this design, John A. Logan their second commander-in-chief originated the idea of establishing a day, to be known as Memorial Day, in which, year by year, they could manifest the reverence, in which they held the memory of their dead comrades.

They have made an effort also, to interest the children, in these expressions of loyalty; and how well they have succeeded, is plainly demonstrated, by the prompt manner, in which the boys grown to manhood under these influences, have of late answered the call of another president, to suppress another evil.

We school children can testify to an evidence of their efforts to encourage patriotism. The flag of our Union, which floats over our school-houses, is there at the suggestion of the Grand Army of the Republic.

It is also interesting in having our text books on history reliable and accurate.

Charity as well as Fraternity and Loyalty is another of their laudable objects, as many of their own number and families of many deceased members can tell.

The membership of the Grand Army of the Republic, at their twenty-fifth national encampment, held Jan. 1. 1891, was estimated at 500,000; at their last reunion their number had fallen to 350,000. Reflection upon this fact, proves to us, that the Grand Army of the Republic is passing away. Comrades that were "in rank" last Memorial day, are now sleeping with their heroic brothers. The time will come, when there will be no soldiers of '61; when our children's children will know of no Memorial day, only as an historical fact.

And we think, that this Memorial day, should be especially sacred.

Today there are other soldiers in camp. Today we have other dead to mourn.

So while we pay the accustomed tribute to "Our Army of the dead," let us, as it is the intention of the Grand Army of the Republic to do, remember the boys who have perished, that no more innocent blood should be spilt by treacherous, oppressive, Spain. All Hail, to our flag, and our Union! All hail, to the Grand Army of the Republic.

MEMORIAL DAY.

Most Appropriately Observed by the Tawas.

Monday was an ideal day for Memorial exercises. It was bright and comfortable, and the exercises in each city were largely attended.

At 9:15 a. m. the column was formed at the depot in this city, under Sheriff P. E. Shien, as marshal-of-the day. The line was headed by the city officials in carriages, followed by the city band, Sons of Veterans, Grand Army of the Republic, school children, Womans' Relief Corps, and citizens. The line of march was taken up and proceeded to the cemetery, where the exercises were held.

The exercises at the cemetery consisted of the regular G. A. R. memorial service and recitations and songs by the school, and was much enjoyed by the large attendance. The graves were decorated by the ladies of the W. R. C. and the salute fired by the S. of V.

Business was entirely suspended and all business places and many residences were appropriately decorated with American and Cuban colors.

In the afternoon exercises were conducted at the East Tawas cemetery and were attended by as equally as large a crowd.

The only complaint heard was owing to the long distance traveled in order to reach the cemeteries. It has been suggested, and we believe should be carried out in the future, that the exercises be conducted at some central place between the two cities, and details sent to the cemeteries to do the decorating. We believe this would assure a large attendance at the exercises and furnish more time for addresses and other exercises.

A Sons of Veterans Regiment.

Michigan Division Sons of Veterans are now recruiting a regiment to answer to the second call for troops. The state has been divided into districts and a company will be raised in each district. The local camps appoint a recruiting officer who receives and enlists all men who desire to go. The membership of this regiment is not confined to the members of the order, but any one eligible to membership in the order is taken. The age limit is between 18 and 45.

Gen. J. Patterson has been appointed recruiting officer, and is now ready to receive volunteers. Anyone whose father holds an honorable discharge from service in the rebellion will be enrolled on application to him, providing they can pass the necessary examination.

DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

To the Democratic Electors of the State of Michigan.

The Democrats of Michigan will meet in state convention in the city of Grand Rapids on Wednesday, June 22, 1898, at 12 o'clock noon for the purpose of nominating party candidates for the following state offices: Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor-General, Attorney-General, Commissioner of State Land Office, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Member of State Board of Education. The convention will also transact such other business as may come before it.

According to the rule adopted by the Democratic state convention held in Detroit in 1880, and since followed, every county in the state is entitled to one delegate for each 500 votes cast for governor at the last general election, and one additional delegate for a fraction of not less than 250 votes. But each county is entitled to at least two delegates. All delegates must be residents of the county which they represent.

The delegates from each congressional district will meet in caucus at 10 o'clock on the morning of June 22 at quarters to be hereafter designated by the state central committee, and will select persons for recommendation to the convention for service upon the several committees of the convention.

Each district will be entitled to one vice-president of the convention and one assistant secretary, and one member on each of the committees on credentials, permanent organization, and order of business and resolutions.

The secretary of each county convention is requested to forward to the secretary of the state central committee at Lansing by the earliest mail, after the delegates to the state convention have been chosen, a certified list of such delegates as are entitled to seats at said convention from their respective counties.

County chairmen in calling county conventions to elect delegates to the state convention, are requested to include in the business to be transacted by the county convention (in all counties where applicable), the election of delegates to the congressional and state senatorial and representative conventions, when called.

All electors who approve of the Chicago platform of 1896 are invited to participate in the Democratic primaries under this call.

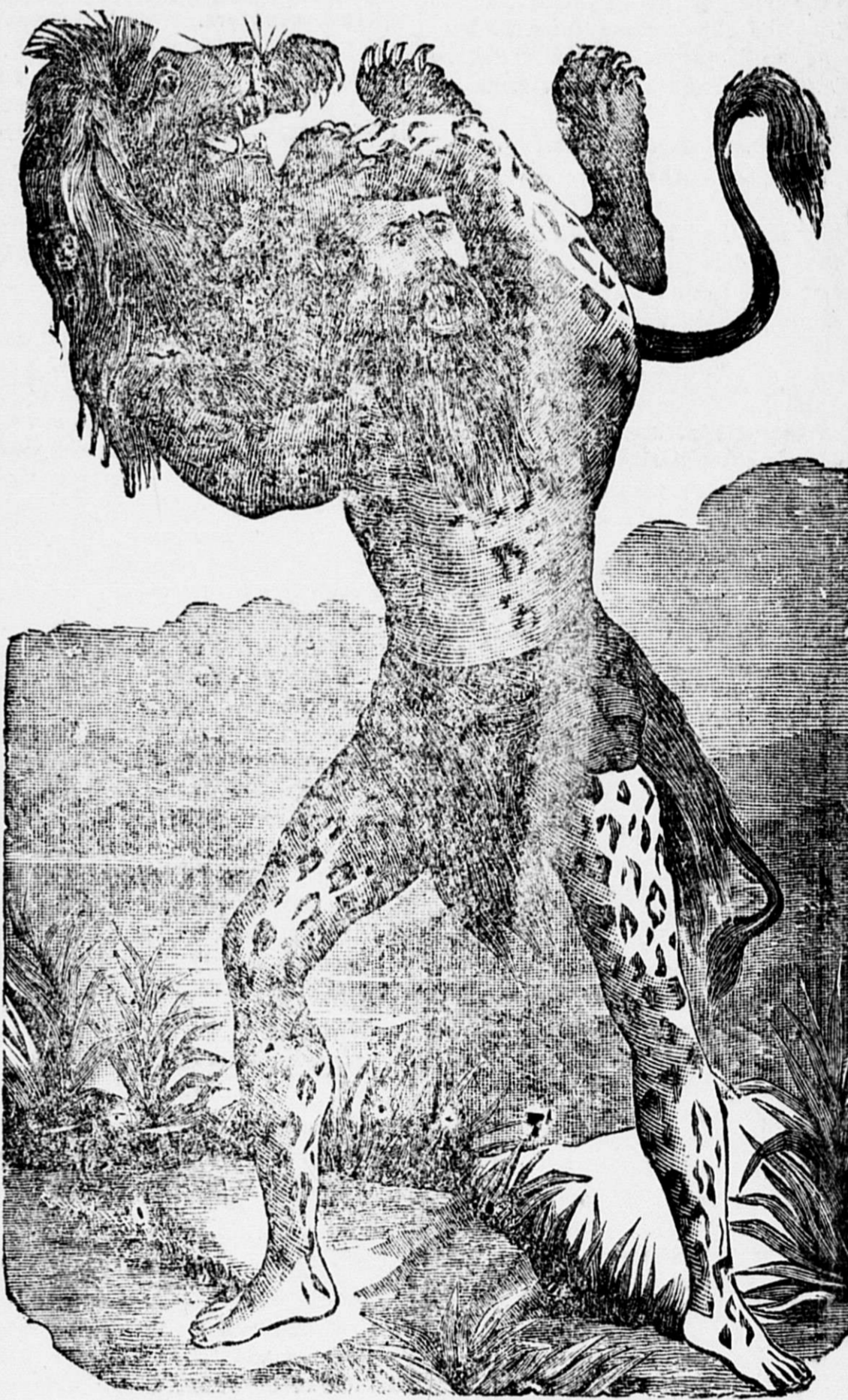
