When in 1861 President Lincoln called for volunteers, to help preserve
our Union, men rrom our Union, men grom all over our
land responded to that land responded to that call, and went
forth, as one man with one mind forth, as one man with one mind,
to save the country or die. Many did die, as we all know, but the Union liverl.
When the war was enden, and the brave soldiers had returned to their homes. an idea was suggested
hy Dr. B. F. Stephenson, of Springfield III., that all honorably discharg ed soldiers and sailors, of the army navy and marine corps, should unit in forming an organization for the purpose of keening alive the brother-
ly feeling, that had bound them together in hours of peril, as well as in hours of triumph. And as a still more worthy object, that of
perpetuating the memory of their perpetuating the memory of thei
dead.
In order to effectually carry out this deaign, John A. Logan their second commander-in-chief originated the idea of establishing a day, to be known as Memorial Day, in which, year by year, they could
mamfest the reverence, in which they held the memory of their dead comrades.
They have made an effort also, to interest the children, in these expressions of loyalty; and how wel they have succeeded, is plainly
demonstrated, by the prompt demonstrated, by the prompt manner, in which the boys grown to
manhood under these influence manhood under these influences,
have of late answered the call of another president, to suppress anothe
