Week'y Crop Builetin.
U. S. Department of Agriculture. climate and crop bulletin of the Weather bureau, Michigan section, The wean ending June 4th, 1899. The mean temperature for the week ended Saturday, June 4, 1898, 91.1 degress, was 0.4 of a degree above the normal. The first 3 hays of the week were cool and deficient in temperature; the last 4 were warm with a daily excess. The warmest temperature was 91 degrees on Saturday, and the coldest was 29 degrees on Monday. Light frosts are reported but they did no damage.
The rainfall averaged only 0.12 . The normal is 9.68 of an iuch. Showbut the rest of general on Wednesday generally without rainfall.
The sunshine has averaged 72 per cent of the possible amount.
The week's weather has been generally favorable to all crops and for the progress of farm work, although there is begimning to be a need for more rain. The early part of the week, with its cool nights, delayed crop growth, but the abundant sunshine and higher temperatures of the last four days have pushed crops forward very fast. Wheat is generally in very fine conaition and promises to be a fine crop; it is generally heading and io the sournern part of the
state is already beginniug to turn state is already beginning to turn
yellow. Corn is coming up nicely, has made a good stand and shows a strong, healthy growth; its cultivation is becoming general in all
counties of the lower peninsula. Barley and early potatoes are up and look good. Late potatee planting has been rushed and the crop will all be in the grotnd during the coming and Bean planting is also genera arger acreage than usual will be planted this year. In the extreme southern counties early planted beans are coming up. Rye is heading in arding the hay crop. Reports regaraing the hay crop indicate that
the yield this year will be lighter than last; old meadows especially are rather light. Clover is in blossom and the new seeding is doing well.
Reports regarding curl leaf on peach trees are still discouraging: a number of correspondents say that although the fruit has dropped considerably, that the warm weather is bringing out new leaves and that there is stil there is no doubt. however, that curl eaf has shortened the peach crop materially. Other fruit prospects continue fine. Oats have made cona erable impravement and are no in a farrly promising condition.

Guldbug Financiering During the five years previous to 1892, the national debat was reduced from $\$ 1,146,014,100$, to $\$ 585,029,330$. which made an annual average reduction of $\$ 112,198,974$. If the debt had been paid at the same rate for the fiye years from 1892 to 1897, it vouldohave been reduced on the 1st day of July last to $\$ 24.045,560$, and t would have been altogether wiped out more than six months aro. The republican gold bond revenue bill proposes to add $\$ 500,000,000$ more to the national debt. If this can be done without the slightest excuse or necessity for it, bonded slavery will have made great progress by reason of the war with Spain. The reasons why the bondholders and gold monometallists want both bonds and contraction are (1) bonds aresafe investments, and (2) contraction enhances the purchasing nower of money and bonds which are money futures,-Silver Knight Watchman.

## Mexican Dollars

Since we have heard so much about the value of the Mexican dollars the following from the Chicago Tribume will be of interest:
Colonel Amos S. Kimball, quartermaster of the department of the east brought 250,000 Mexican dollars for use of the army invading the Philipines.
He paid 46 cents for each of these dollars, their regular market price in New York. When they are used in the far east they will be worth nearly twice as much as the American silver dellar would be. So it will be seen that the purchasing power of the $\$ 25$, 000 will be double their cost.
The Mexican dollar is practically the standard coin in the Oriental trade ouiside of India. It is the coin commonly used and practically the only one used in Japan and China Chmese especially in Islands. Th Chmese especially have the highest regard for the Mexican dollar and in
the Philipines there are many the Philipines there are many more Chinamen than all the foreigners put
together. From which it appears that the law does have something to do with the value of money. The Mexican dollar is not the standard of the United States and it does not pass for its face value. In the east it is the standard and, lo, it is worth nearly twice a much at the American silver dollar Odd isn't it?-Kalamazoo News.

It is how England has been able to bear prices of farm products by the aid of demonetized one-half its value here and by sending it 50 Asia where it is worth send ghe that with he ratio that gives it par with gold, buying wheat and olhor product with silver, thus depreciating the value of our products one half.Cheboygan Democrat.

## Dehorning Cattle

Dr. H. H. Lamson, of the New Hampshire College Experiment Sta-
tion, in a recently issued bulletin distion, in a recently issued bulletin dis-
cusses the question of dehorning cattle, and also the prevention of th the latter course as being the more humane, and because it avoids the dis. agreeable features of dehorning matured animals. The horns of cattle, he explains, consist of two parts of different origin: the outer horny shell is a growth derive from skin, the in is the outgrowth of the skull. At the birth of the calf each of these parts is undeveloped and only exists as a grow, and in a short time the young horn can be felt as a shight elevation r button.
The horn tissue develups from the skin just as do hoofs and claws in the ings. There is a zone in the skin about the base of the horn known as the matrix, from which new horn-cells are constantly being formed, the older parts being pushed on. If we destroy the periosteum from which the bony
part of the horn is formed and the matrix from which the horny part is formed, we prevent the further development of the horn. In removing developed, as in dehorning mature an mals, the cut must be made deep enough to include the matrix or the stump of the horn will continue to grow. It may not be out of place nere to remark that there is no danger of cutting into the brain cavity as at this point it lies yery deeply The openings frequently seen on re noving the horns are only empty honey-combed.
In calyes the growing points of the horns are small in extent and can be destroyed with little trouble. In our experiments we have made use of causis a pure form of the same substance which constitutes the potash sold in cans for soap making and cleansing purposes. It is in the form of white sticks, in diameter about the size of an ordinary lead pencil. Warning Against the use o Ethereal txtracts in Sum mer Beverages
The May bulletin of the State Dairy and Food Department just issued; calls the attention of propue tors of soda water fountaius, dispensers of summer drinks, and the public in general to the all to common in the preparation of these beverages. Since September 1st, 1897, the sale of these extracts has been prohibited in Michigan, and under the work of the department's inspection force they have largely disappeared from the shelves of the retail trade.
These extracts, the most common $0_{f}$ which arelpineapple, raspberry, straw
berry and banna are manufactured from ethers, are collored to imitate the fruit desired and contain no part they bear.
As an example of the mind's influeuce upon the taste, it has bee proyen in the department's laborator that a person hlindfolded will pro-
nounce the same ether an extract of trawberry or raspberry if told it is one or the other.
The ethers themselves are rank poisous and even in such small quantities as found in the so called extracts are injurious to health. There is no excuse whateyer for their use because fruit juices are easily obtained though a trifle higher in cost, whil and decidedly dangerous substitute, The department is taking steps apprehend and prosecute dispens appreherd and prosecute dispensers of summer drinks who make use of these
