ADMIRAL DEWEY.

Took Grande Island, Subig Bay, 1300 Prisoners and Arms and Ammunition.

Manilla, via Hong Kong, July 13.—The American navy, under Admiral Dewey, won another important victory in the capture of Grande Island in Subig bay; the Island of Luzon and also the chief harbor in the Philippines, Chief Aguinaldo on July 6, informed Dewey that the insurgents had full possession of Subig bay, with the exception of a large island controlling the entrance. A strong Spanish garrison occupied the island, he said, and he was unable to take it. Dewey, on July 7, dispatched the cruiser Raleigh and the gunboat Concord with orders to take the island and capture the garrison. As soon as the boats arrived they shelled the principal points on the island, destroyed the earthworks and other fortifications, and laying the torpedo station in ruins. After a six-inch shell had been sent through the commander's house, a white flag was run up on the ruins of the earthworks. A landing party was sent ashore to demand absolute surrender. The Spanish colonel, Rio, gave up his sword, and 1,300 men, comprising the garrison made prisoners, and their rifles taken from them. Forty thousand rounds of ammunition and one Hotchkiss gun were captured. This victory gives the Americans control of Subig bay, the Spanish strategic point.

School Meeting.

The annual school meeting for Frac. District No. 7, Tawas City and Tawas township, was held at the high school room last Monday evening, and was largely attended. The question of whether or not this district would come under the new uniform text book law was voted on and it was decided not to come there under. The vote was unanimous against the law. In this connection it may be said that a majority of the voters of this district are in favor of a uniform text book law, but uniformity(?) as was saddled on the people by the last legislature is a farce and will not be tolerated by intelligent people. We believe that the bill as originally introduced would have been a blessing to the school patrons of the state, but after the school book companies had brought their influence to bear on some of so-called people's representatives at Lansing, the uniformity was knocked out.

On the question of free text books, it was decided by a large majority not to adopt. We believe this was a mistake on the part of the tax payers of the district, as were ever the system of free text books has been adopted it has given universal satisfaction, and has proven a success from an economical standpoint. Some of the arguments put forward against this system were amusing in the extreme. The election of a trustee to succeed James Hamilton developed a very warm fight, and it required two ballots to decide the matter. The first ballot showed three candidates in the field, and resulted as follows.

After this ballot it was developed that Conant was not eligible to the office, and on the next ballot Mr. Hamilton received a majority of all votes cast and was declared elected succeed himself.

ON TO MANILA.

Extracts from a Letter from a Former Tawas City Boy, who is now on his way to Manila with Gen. Merritt's Army.

The following extracts are from a letter received from Fred Wilkins, who is a member of Co. A. 23d regular infantry, now on the Pacific bound for Manila, and will be read with much interest by Fred's many friends in the Tawas:

Camp Merritt,
San Francisco, Cal., July 6, '98.

Dear Friend:—I received your welcome letter on the 3d, and just have time to answer it now. Say, I do not see what makes you people think California is such a nice place. I have not seen any nice weather yet. The days are very windy and the nights foggy and damp. Not a very nice combination. The only nice thing are the people—especially the girls. They are thicker than the hair on a dog's back.

Well I suppose you would like to know something of our camp life. They selected the most sandy spot in California for us to camp on. We are living in 4x6 tents and only five in a tent. We have nothing but a blanket and the sand to sleep on, but the food is very fair and plenty of it. No hard-tack either. We have fresh bread or biscuits, fresh beef, pork and beans, potatoes, coffee and tea, with a few other things. Of course, we do not get any pie or cake but can get along without that. On the whole we get along very nicely, and are used a little better than the volunteers, as you may know. Well I will not be in Frisco much longer as we are booked to leave next Monday, if orders are not changed, and I am not sorry to hear it, as I have seen pretty near enough of it and would like to get just one crack at the Spaniards before the war is over. Well, I guess I will have to close as it is nearly supper time and I do not want to miss a meal.

Letters will be forwarded to us, even if we do leave Monday, so you need not be afraid to write. Letters will be worth a good deal over in Manila, as we will not get very much news except what does come by letter.

THE Michigan "decoy ducks" are busy sending out dispatches from their Grand Rapids headquarters announcing that arrangements are being made to hold a state convention this year, but as yet no date has been fixed. It probably has not yet been decided whether or not they can be of the most use to the republicans with or without a state ticket.

Gov. PINGREE says that the republican party is the roosting place for all the corporations and trusts that are bleeding the country. Yet this great anti-trust opponent is anxious to have these octopi bleeding concerns re-nominate and elect him governor. The fact is Ping would accept the support of the devil if he thought it would further his personal ambition. The "dear people" are a secondary matter with this man Ping as compared with himself.

Washington Letter.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)
WASHINGTON, July 11, 1898.

It must have been noticed by all observant readers of war news that the victories scheduled in advance have invariably failed to be pulled off on schedule time, and that our greatest victories, such as the destruction of the Spanish fleet at Santiago and at Manila, have not been handicapped by advance notices. This was especially true of the Santiago affair. That the postponements in taking that town was caused by orders resulting from Spanish trickery is more than probable, although it is constantly—too constantly, in fact—reiterated by those attached to the administration, that Mr. McKinley has issued no orders about the movement on Santiago, since it was begun, except that instructing Gen. Shafter not to accept the surrender of the Spaniards except unconditionally. The Spaniards across the Atlantic are trying to create the impression that they are on the eve of suing for peace, and they are succeeding, too, with some persons high in authority, and thereby hangs some of the delays which have so aggravated those who believed that the quickest way to secure peace was to lick the Spaniards as fast as we could get at them.

Very few senators and representatives remain in Washington. The most of the latter have gone to their districts to look after their "fences," while the former, as a rule, have gone in search of cooler places. The senate left quite a number of small military nominations—mostly captains and Lieutenants,—unacted upon, as well as a lot of nominations to civil officers. Some were not acted upon because of lack of time, but the most of them were hung up because of objections to them by some senator.

Leaving war appropriations out entirely, the other appropriations made at the session of congress just closed, exceed the total of any previous session. The following statement is made by Representative Sayers, of Texas, the ranking democratic member of the house committee on appropriations: "The total appropriations at the present session amount to \$892,527,991. This includes \$117,836,220 permanent appropriations and \$361,788,095 for war expenses. From the sum total, we have \$530,739,896, to be charged against the civil and ordinary expenses of the government. It should be borne in mind that no river and harbor bill has been passed. Considering this fact, the appropriations for civil and ordinary expenses of the government, at this session, and excluding war expenses, exceed that of any previous session."

Congress was too anxious to adjourn after the Hawaiian annexation resolution was adopted, to hear senator Morgan when he said: "There is absolutely no necessity for an adjournment at this time; it is a hasty, improvident and dangerous step," but unless many are mistaken, the wisdom of those words will be seen later. The truth of his other words—"The very moment that the treaty of peace is signed by the President and the government of Spain, the military power of the President will cease, and the legislative branch of the government must provide a government for any territory we may acquire by the war,"—is undisputed; yet the legislative body cannot meet again until next December, unless called together by Mr. McKinley, in extra session.

The report of the senate committee on claims, which investigated by instruction of a senate resolution, the disposition of the money paid to the Southern Methodist Book concern for a war claim, was not intended to be a humorous document, but many have so regarded it. It starts out by absolving the church from all blame and then proceeds to make scape goats of E. B. Stahlman, the attorney who got 35 per cent. of the claim, and Messrs. Barbee and Smith, agents for the book concern, because they led these very innocent senators to believe that no fee was to be paid out of this claim. There may be senators who believe that men devote their time to lobbying any bill, no matter what its nature may be, through congress without expecting pay for their service, but there are certainly no other persons in Washington who believe that way.

They didn't "splice the main brace" the other day on the Nashville when that gallant gunboat had raced through the sea, with every human pulse abeat, and captured the first prize of the war. They won't splice the main brace on the Oregon even if all hands should have the strain of that seemingly impossible thing, an all day running fight with a fleet of Spanish cruisers. "Splicing the main brace" is, or rather used to be, serving an "extra" allowance of grog to all hands on a naval vessel after an engagement. This explanation is so old that it will be news to many in these days. If things were as they used to be how naturally it would have happened when the Nashville had captured her prize and when every heart aboard was aglow with the success the boatswain and his mates should have piped through the ship the order, "All hands for grog." At the beginning of any other war in our history "Grog oh!" would have resounded through the ship. But they've raised his pay five cents a day and stopped his grog forever. A notable event was the invention of grog in 1740. According to a learned article on the subject published in the United States service by Admiral Meade, in 1884, the honor is due to Admiral Vernon of the royal navy. In bad weather it was his fashion to wear on deck a program cloak, from which he acquired among the men the sobriquet of "Old Grog." About the year mentioned, while in command of the West India station, he originated a new and satisfactory official beverage composed of rum and water, the serving of which began on his flagship, the Burford, and thence spread. The beverage was dubbed "grog," and the word has lived.

When our navy began its illustrious career amid the revolution, liquor was, of course, as necessary a part of the supplies as sea biscuit and powder, and we find Paul Jones, on sailing from Portsmouth, in 1777, bewailing, among other shortages, "only 30 gallons of rum."

In 1831 congress took an advanced step by providing that all in the navy who voluntarily relinquished the spirit ration should be paid six cents a day. In 1842 the ration was cut down to one gill, but the alternative of half a pint of wine was added, and the commutation price was marked at three cents.

The first year of the civil war brought a greatly increased naval force and increased trouble from strong drink. Moral sentiment had progressed, too. In July 1862, congress revolutionized the American navy by passing the historic law providing: "That from and after the first day of September, 1862, the spirit ration in the navy of the United States shall forever cease and thereafter no distilled spirituous liquors shall be admitted on board of vessels-of-war except as medical stores, and upon the order and under the control of medical officers of such vessels, and to be used only for medical purposes."

"From and after the first day of September next there shall be allowed and paid to each person in the navy now entitled to the spirit ration five cents per day in commutation and lieu thereof, which shall be in addition to the present pay."

And since that day there has been no "grog" in the United States navy.—San Francisco Call.

Weeds in Pasture.

When considering the subject of weedy pastures it is necessary first to notice the kinds of weeds that are interfering with the usefulness of the pastures. Different localities have different weeds. In some sections, brush land is used for pasture. There it is usually advised to cut and burn the brush, and to be especially particular about the hazel and buck brush. The hazel on timber and bottom land is easily held in check by cutting close to the ground, but prairie hazel keeps coming. For five years in succession I cut down the hazel brush on a forty-acre tract, and the brush came the following year as vigorously as ever. I then resolved to break the land and take a few crops from it and then sow to grass. It would have saved me a good deal of work and time if I had done that in the first place, but I fancied I would have better pasture if I could get the land set to blue grass without plowing it. This was a mistake, for the stock prefer Timothy and clover, and will eat it and let the blue grass stand almost untouched. Large portions of the country have pastures invested with the new, coarse thistle, which is a very vigorous grower; some call it a Spanish thistle. If let alone it spreads very rapidly and its thorns are so numerous, and so irritating, that no stock will attempt to eat the grass very near it. These thistles can best be killed with a good hoe, and they should be cut below where the green part joins the root. This should be done before the bloom is out, or with us say during the first half of July. All land owners should be particular to attend them before they become firmly established, and should impress upon their neighbors the necessity for doing so as well, because the thistle down flies a long distance. Missouri has a law imposing a fine of \$10 for letting one of these thistles mature seed on one's own land. Some pastures are taken by the bull nettle. They are very hard to get rid of after they are once established, and the only way I know how to conquer them is to cut them every time they be seen above the surface of the ground. If they are plowed the smallest piece of root that may stick to the plow will, if carried to any new place, make a start for a new patch. Plowing them spreads them. They should be taken care of in pastures or in fields, for they are a very serious nuisance. Their seeds are like the potato tubers and they propagate by means of them. Many pastures become foul with rag weed, boneset and Spanish needles. Where they become thick so as to cover the ground, if the surface is so that a mowing machine can pass over it, it is the best way to clean the soil. It ought to be done before they become hard and woody, and before they mature seed. If this course is followed up it will lessen the evil and in time subdue it. I cut over some bottom land where the weeds were quite thick, and left a land or strip unmowed. Next year one could see the difference very plainly. The weeds on the strip that had been left untouched were more numerous than ever, while that which had been mowed had scarcely any. Where weeds are few and grow in bunches they can be cut with a good sharp hoe, or a weed scythe. It is good economy to attend to this matter closely and at the right time. Do not allow valuable land to be devoted to worthless and injurious weeds and briars. We were put here so subdue them. - *Prairie Farmer.*

Crop Report.

The following crop report was issued by the secretary of state last Friday. The acreage of wheat grown in Michigan this year is, approximately, 1,710,000 acres. This total is the footing of the column "acres now on the ground" as returned by supervisors in the Farm Statistics last spring, though for a few townships not yet received or footed the acreage has been carefully estimated.

The average yield per acre, in the state is estimated at 16.74 bushels. This estimate is based on nearly 1,150 reports covering all parts of the state. More than 700 are from the southern counties and more than 300 from the central counties. The estimate however, must be understood to represent simply the best judgment of our correspondents while the grain was standing uncut or in shock, as when made no threshing had been done. The estimate points to a crop of about 28,600,000 bushels.

Harvest is full two weeks earlier than in 1897. With good weather it will be completed by the 10th to 15th, or about the time begun last year.

The number of bushels of wheat reported marketed in June is 1,132,931, as compared with 490,278 reported marketed in June, 1897, and the amount marketed in the eleven months, August-June, is 16,622,661 bushels, as compared with 9,455,582 bushels in the same months last year.

The area planted to corn is about normal, and the crop is in excellent condition. The condition is 22 per cent higher than one year ago.

The average condition of oats is 91. The estimated area planted to beans is 91 per cent, and to potatoes 96 per cent of area in average years. For potatoes the percentage for the southern and central counties is 95, for the northern 104, and for the upper peninsula 100. In condition this crop averages 96.

Meadows and pastures and clover sowed this year average about 90. The hay crop of this year is fairly good and secured in fine condition.

Apples promise in the state 80 per cent, and peaches 74 per cent of average crops. The figures for the southern counties are, apples 74 and peaches 71. One year ago the outlook was for less than a half crop of apples, and for less than one-fourth crop of peaches.
