HE COMES OFF.

Gov. Pingree is Called upon to Correct one of His Errors.

Some time ago Gov. Pingree spent a few hundred dollars of the people's money in an attempt to further his ambitions, by sending out several thousand circular letters explaining the defeat of the "Atkinson Equal Taxation Bill" by the state senate at the recent special session. On the back of this letter were printed a list of the senators who it was claimed voted against the bill. In this list was the name of Senator G. A. Prescott, of this district. It is a fact that Senator Prescott voted for the bill. The attention of "Ping." was called to this fact, and he was requested to correct the mistake. As a result the Governor's private secretary has been busy for several days mailing letters to the newspapers and various individuals throughout the 28th district explaining how the error happened. The following is a copy of the letter to Senator Prescott, which "Ping" requests published:

LANSING, July 8, 1898.

Hon. George A. Prescott,
Tawas City, Michigan,

DEAR SIR:—Your letter to Governor Pingree was received during his absence in the south. I could not very well answer it until he returned.

The circular letter of which you complain was given out in the absence of the Governor, but the substance of it was approved by him before he went away. After he had gone it was suggested that a list of the senators who voted against the Atkinson bill should be printed and sent out at the same time and this was finally agreed upon. The making of this list was intrusted to an unusually careful clerk but it seems that in making up the list he selected the wrong vote and that made it appear that you voted against the bill. It was a clerical error, pure and simple, and the Governor directs me to say that he desires such a correction to be made as will be entirely satisfactory to you.

While, personally, he is only responsible for what appears above his signature, still he is willing to give to the correction any force which his name may add to it. When the error was discovered a prompt correction was made. He expresses the most sincere regret that such an error should have occurred and desires to have anything and everything done which will tend to put the matter right.

A Pioneer Gone.

Michael Katterman, one of the oldest and most respected German citizens of this city, died at Woodmere, near Detroit, Friday, July 22, 1898, age 74 years.

He caught a cold while on the boat which affected his kidneys, on the 6th inst, he was taken with a severe attack of dysentery, which resulted in his death as above stated. The remains were brought to this city Saturday and the funeral was conducted from the Zion Lutheran church Sunday afternoon, and the remains were laid at rest by the side of those of his wife, whom preceded him to the other shore last November.

The Farmers' Institute

At Whittemore Next Thursday Promises to be a Big Success.

The one day meeting of the Iosco County Farmers' Institute Society which will be held at Whittemore, Thursday, August 4, promises to be a very successful affair. Farmers from all over the county are preparing to attend and much interest is being manifested.

The program contains two addresses by Prof. Clinton D. Smith, of the Agricultural College,—“Keeping up Soil Fertility,” and “Home Butter Making.” There will also be papers by local speakers on various subjects of interest to all. Ample time is allowed on the program for a thorough discussion of each paper, and every one present is invited to take part in the discussions. The program is interspersed with music.

At 4 o'clock p. m. a meeting of the officers of the society will be held for the purpose of making arrangements for next winter's meeting, and every officer, including the vice presidents, are urged to be present.

The distribution of the Michigan Institute Bulltins will take place at this meeting and each member of the society will be entitled to one. New members will be received on the payment of the Institute fee of 25 cents, which will entitle them to a copy of the bulletin. These bulletins contain a full report of the last winter's meetings throughout the state and much other matter of interest to the farmer.

The Care of School Rooms.

The Michigan State Board of Health respectfully recommends to all school boards and other officers and persons having in charge assembly rooms, that they cause to be observed the following methods of care, in the interests of public health.

That the regular care of school-rooms includes sprinkling the floor before sweeping, the subsequent dusting of desks or wiping them with a clean damp cloth, and the airing of the room before its use.

That interchange of books be allowed only under such conditions as render the transmission of disease impossible. That the use of slates be discontinued.

That persons known to be affected with tuberculosis of the lungs, or who persistently cough and expectorate, be denied the privileges of such room either as a teacher or pupil. That all spitting upon the floor by any person be strictly forbidden, and that proper conveniences for receiving sputa be supplied.

That, at least once a year, the room and contents be thoroughly disinfected, the woodwork and floor washed with an antiseptic solution, the walls whitewashed, and the plumbing and ventilating inspected.

Good Country Roads

With Proper Drainage Good Roads are Easily Maintained.

“The great secret of success in road-making and road-keeping is to drain the roads, and keep the roads drained by keeping the ditches open,” writes John Gilmer Speed on “How to Have Good Country Roads,” in the August Ladies Home Journal. “The old method was to run a plow through the side ditches and throw the disturbed soil, sod and all in the middle of the road. There it would stay till a heavy rain came to wash this soil back into the ditches and fill them up again. If there were money enough this kind of thing would be done over and over again, as often as four times a year. Where there were wet spots broken stone or gravel would be placed in the road and left for the passing wagons to wear this metal into ruts. The money spent was absolutely thrown away.

“But the new process all the road-mender needs to do is to provide ditches and outlets for them, and then so shape the road that the water falling in a rainstorm will run off at once into the ditches. The water must not be suffered to run in the road, but off the road. The rainfall being thus simply and effectively disposed of, becomes a most beneficial instead of a destructive agent; it cleans, and shapes, and hardens the roadway, instead of washing it away and deepening the ruts. When there are wet places, such as springs, in the roadway, gravel and broken stone will not cure such things. The water must be drained off underneath the roadway and into the ditches by means of pipe or blind drains. The whole thing is so simple that any one can easily master the principles and put the details into practical operation.

IMPORTANT OPINION.

Maynard's Construction of the New Tax Law.

Lansing, July 28.—An opinion construing two important provisions of the general tax law has been handed down by Atty.-Gen. Maynard. He holds that “a person purchasing the state bid upon any land for the taxes of 1894 would be required to pay not only the amount for which the same was bid off to the state, but also subsequent taxes due thereon as a condition precedent to receiving a deed conveying the interest of the state to the purchaser. The law makes no distinction between the amount paid for subsequent taxes and the amount paid for the bid. Both are placed upon the same footing and required by the same law to be paid. It follows, as a necessary conclusion, that the purchaser of tax lands is entitled to the return of the full amount required to be paid by him at the time of purchase, whether the same be for the state bid or for the subsequent taxes remaining a lien on the lands purchased, together with 100 per cent. in addition thereto, as a condition precedent to his making reconveyance of the land to the person entitled thereto.”

Notices by the holder of tax deeds, it is also held, must be made in accordance with the statutory provisions.

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It looks as though Crump would secure the republican nomination for congress from this district without opposition. Col. Loud hrs announced his withdrawal from the race. It remains to be seen whether the people of this district wish to be represented in congress another term by Crump or not.

THEO. R. MACCLURE, chief clerk of the state board of health, has prepared a most valuable and attractive souvenir in the nature of a review of a quarter century of public health work in Michigan. The document, which comprises 48 printed pages, reviews the work of the board since its establishment in 1873, noting the progress made and the various lines of investigation conducted. Three thousand copies of this souvenir will be printed by the state for distribution at the quarter centennial celebration of the organization of the board to be held in Detroit August 9, 10 and 11.

Look back upon the economical administration which Governor Winans gave the state of Michigan, and then compare his expense account with that of every republican governor which we have had during the interval. Winans was economical for the same reason that Whiting will be if elected. He represents the people rather than the agents of organized greed. No reform can come from an election of republican representatives, for as has been truly said by Pingree himself. "Today the trusts, all the monopolies, every agency which is bleeding the country, has taken refuge under the wing of the Republican party, because they fear the Democratic party, which has kicked them out."—Pontiac Post

Yes, and look back on the Winans administration, we hope that if Whiting is elected and makes as fine a record, the gang then known as the "referees." And now the "goldbug assistant Republicans," will not be allowed to come back into the party in time to hit him in the neck as they did Winans, for no other reason than that he was favorable to the interests of the people, and they feared his ascendancy in the party. We believe that Gov. Winans could easily have been reelected had the leaders of the party stood by him, and made the fight on his record. Importance of Business Education in our Schools.

"Think of a man going into business with three-fourths of his brain cells filled with classical knowledge dead languages and high sounding but unpractical ideas? I have been severely criticised for saying I would not have a college bred man in my office. Here is my reason. To become a successful merchant, banker or broker one must begin young. Most college boys when ready to enter an office, are over twenty years of age. I have a son at college—a six footer in his twenty-first year. Can I ask him to undergo the training I deem necessary to every business man? Would he be willing to commence at the foot of the ladder? Why that youth not only knows more in every branch of knowledge than all the office boys and clerks in the office, but he knows more than his father, too.

A collegian can't, or perhaps will not, humble himself sufficiently to learn the rudiments of the bussness man's vocation. He has been used to regard himself as a brilliant young gentleman for several years; can you blame him for objecting to sit on the same bench with errand boys? And has he enough practical knowledge to deserve a place behind the desk?

In my opinion the average graduate does not even know enough of arithmetic and caligraphy to earn, upon his arrival in an office, a salary of five dollars a week. My legible hand secured for me the first good position I ever held; the average college graduate writes a fearfuls crawl, and is proud of it. I understand that none of our universities employs a teacher of caligraphy. This is a sad defect, of which the collegian does not become aware, as a rule, until it is too late to remedy the evil.

I have practically tested the problem whether a college education is desirable for a business man, Years ago I emploted several college men, one after another; none of them succeeded in benefiting either my business or himself. So I got rip of them."—Henry Cleve in *Munsey's Magazine*.

Washington Letter.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, July 25, 1898.

If the recently officially announced intention to send Commodore Watson's fleet to Spain was not a bluff, why in the name of common sense is the official announcement now made that the sending of that fleet to Spain has been indefinitely postponed? Only a small portion of the powerful fleet we now have in Cuban waters will be needed in the campaign against Porto Rico, which was opened by the landing of Gen. Miles and the troops with him on Porto Rican soil, news of which has just reached Washington. At no time since the war started, could so many of our strongest fighting ships be spared to go to Spain as right now. This was acknowledged by Secretary Long in conversation with a friend who was trying to find out why the fleet had not gone to Spain. A senator who is very friendly with Mr. McKinley said on the subject: "The official announcement of the orders to Commodore Watson, several weeks ago was unquestionably made to bluff Spain into begging for peace, and now that Mr. McKinley has information that the bluff had served its purpose, he has caused it to be publicly announced that the sailing of the fleet has been postponed, in order that Spain may act." "But," said another senator, "suppose that Spain doesn't ask for peace, what then?" "Then," said the first senator laughingly, I suppose the bluff will be repeated. "Well," answered senator No. 2 "that sort of thing is a little too Spanish to suit me; I believe it is the duty of the administration to fight this war to a close at the earliest possible moment. In trickery, we can never hope to equal the Spaniards, and I should be ashamed to be an American, if we could. We can lick them every day in the week, when it comes to fighting, and the sooner we send the fleet over there to fight them at home, the sooner we shall have peace.

The administration is showing a disposition to make Gen. Shafter bear all the blame for the break with Gen. Garcia and his army of Cuban insurgents, although it is not denied that, as a whole, what Garcia complained of was the result of Shafter's carrying out orders given in Washington. It is claimed that he should have jollied Garcia sufficiently to have made him believe that he was at least being consulted about what was being done. The plain truth is, that the administration doesn't want to quarrel with the insurgents, although it has been fully determined that the government of Cuba shall not be turned over to them at the close of the war, unless they can get a majority of the residents of Cuba, to declare by their votes in their favor.

There is no other officer in our army who has profited to so great an extent personally as Gen. Leonard Wood, now military governor of Santiago. When the Maine was blown up he was a surgeon in the regular army, with the rank of Captain, stationed in Washington, performing among other duties those of family physician to Mr. McKinley. When "Teddy" Roosevelt conceived the idea of enlisting the regiment of Rough Riders, and it was approved by Mr. McKinley, he asked that Dr. Wood be made Col. of the regiment. It was done. He was made a Brigadier General for gallantry in the field, being strongly recommended for the promotion by his immediate superior, Gen. Wheeler, "fighting Joe." Just why he succeeded McKibbin, who was first named as military governor of Santiago, by Gen. Shafter, is not so clear, but it was probably because he was the president's friend and doctor, and wanted the place. A jump from captain to Brigadier general is certainly extraordinary, even when one is as brave as Gen. Wood has proved himself to be and is the president's doctor and friend.

No visitor to Washington since the war opened has received a more cordial welcome from everybody that Lt. Hobson, the Merrimac hero, who came to hurry up the work at this end of the line of saving some of the wrecked ships of Cervera's fleet. He thinks three of them can be saved if no time is lost unless there comes a severe storm before the ships can be got afloat.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Climate and Crop Bulletin of weather Bureau, Michigan Section, for the week ending July 23d, 1898.

The mean temperature for the week ended Saturday, July 23d, 72.3 degrees, was 3.4 degrees warmer than the normal. The temperature ranged from 3 to 9 degrees above the normal. Maximum temperatures ranging from 90 to 96 degrees occurred in all parts of the state. The coldest temperature was 42 degrees in Delta county and Oscoda county.

The average total precipitation, 0.77 of an inch, is 0.30 of an inch more than the normal. It was poorly distributed.

The sunshine has averaged 65 per cent of the possible amount.

Much needed showers fell last Tuesday and were very beneficial to all growing crops, but insufficient and poorly distributed; more rain is needed, especially for corn, potatoes and pastures. Corn showed some improvement after the showers, but during the latter part of the rolling; in spite of the dry weather corn is in generally good condition; it is earing. Pastures are drying up. Wheat and rye harvest are now generally finished except in the most northerly counties of the state; the grain has been secured in fine condition and threshers returns show that the wheat yield this year is very fine. Oat harvest is well under way in the southern half of the lower peninsula and is being well secured; the yield is light. The hot, dry weather has done considerable damage to spring clover seeding, and many correspondents report it killed. The high winds of last Tuesday did some damage so orchards, especially to winter apples. Fall plowing has already commenced, but the ground is too dry for best results. The week closes very warm and there is a general need of more rain.

In the upper peninsula haying is about finished, the cut being finely secured and generally a very good yield.
