## Circuit Court.

The regular August term of curcit court convened Tuesday morning, Judge Simpson presiding. The calendar contained seyen criminal, eight civil and six chaucery cases. The first case taken up for trial was that of the people vs. Arihur F. Dudgeon, for the willful neglect of official daty. This is the case wherein Mr. Dudgeon refused or neglected to spread the taxes assessed in AuSable township. The case occupied the attention of the court Tuesday and the most of Wednesday. It was then given to the jury who, after twenty minutes deliberation returned a verdist unlty.
The next case taken up was that of the people vs. George Tompkins and James Hamilton charged fering with an officer in the discharge of his duties. It appears that these men assaulted Village Treasurer G. H. Cosgrove, of Oscoda while he was attempting to attach a team to secure the payment of taxts. The case was given to the jury Thursiday afternoon and they found Tompkins guilty as charged and no cause of action against Hanilton.
The appeal case of $W$. G. Pierce vs. Phillip Rosenthal was tried Thursday and a verdict given in favor of Rusenthal.

## Washington Letter.

(From our Regular Correspondent.) Washington aug, 1st 1898.
I. hile there is some Spain, in answer to its request, and which the French ambassador acting as Spanish Minister, ;has accepted, the general impression is, that on the whole, the administration has aquitted itself very creditably in handling this matter as far as it has gene. The term require Spain to withdraw its troop require Spain to Porto Rico to pay all just Americans for property destroy in Cuba; the U.S. explicitly disclaims any responsibility whatever for bonds issued by Spain and secured by its revenues from elther Cuba or Porto Rico, a decided cheek to the scheme which certain Americans have been trying to work in behalf of the European holders of that class of Spanish bonds; and the final disposition of the Philippines is left open to be settled as we may see fit. One man's guess is about as good as another as to what will be the next step of the tricky Spamards. Any other country might be counted upon to follow the recommendations of its accredited minister, but Spain cannot be counted upon to do anything.
Commissary General Egan of army is out in an interview replying to a letter written by R. B. Roose that there was either "shameful in capacity of infamous dishonesty" in
the commissary department, and that neither enough, nor proper food had been furuished the men at the front. Eagan's reply is what the boys cal hot stuff; he calls Roosevelt several kinds of a notoriety hunting liar, and says hit letter was "a low libell ous, scandalous villification of honest men."
Surgenn General Sternberg admits that although more than 5,000 of Gen. Shafter's men are now down with the fever, that he thinks the worst is yet to come. those who know that hogs love it and when allowed to run at large will root for it.
A few years ago hog cholera rag. ed in our neighborhood, depleting the herds of hogs to an alarming extent. One man had two fine hogs, one of which took the desease and died, the other one he saved. Procuring a box of pine tar he at once annointed the taca of the remaining hog well up between the eyes and around the nose, allowing some of the tar to go into the mouth. He also smeared the inside of the feeding trough with it. This hog lived on and flourished despite the fact that the disease continued to rage, all owing to the efficacy of pine tar. These are simple things to do and while they may not effect cures, may be beneficial as preventves, and if "an ounce of prevention worth a pound of cure" why not use the ounce?
