A POLITICAL CHARLATAN.

Pingree's Personal Extravagance Proven by the Record of His Own Office-Plunders the Dear People to Pay Political Obligations and Maintain a Monster Machine.

Despite the pretended friendship for the common people professed by Gov. Pingree, time has proven that his reforms-which are never pressed to an issue-are a cloak to cover his means for advancing himself politically.

While crying "Stop thief," and pointing toward the great corporations as despoilers of the public rights, he has been busy fattening his favorites at the public crib, until the taxes of the state have increased enormously.

To demonstrate this, we need only present from the official records, which are open to everybody, a comparison of the expenses of the executive office at Lansing, for every item of which the governor is directly responsible.

The annual report of the board of state auditors (page 482) gives a series of comparisons, from which we quote, giving the general expenses of the executive office for corresponding years of the Winans, Rich and Pingree administrations:

Gov. Pingree's extravagance in his own office forms a bad record and demonstrates his unfitness for the trust reposed in him.

Crop Report.

The following crop report was issued by the Secretary of State, last Friday:

For this report correspondents have secured from threshers the results of 7,317 jobs, aggregating 115,827 acres of wheat threshed in the state, the good digestion wait on appetite,' and in the northern counties, 15.59 September 19th and 20th. At C. H bushels.

May as compiled from the returns of 22d, 23d, and 24 supervisors was 1,725,448 acres. This is the probable acreage that was harvested this year. Computing by counties for the southern and central sections, and for the northern section entire, gives a probable yield in the state of 34,162,563 bushels. This is more than ever reported in the farm statistics. The final estimate will be made in October.

The number of bushels of wheat reported marketed by farmers since the August report was published is 1,-712,397. Of this amount 757,581 bushels were marketed before August 1. but not reported until late in August, and 954,816 bushes in August The amount of wheat reported marketed since the August report was published is 524,647 bushels more than reported for the same time in 1897, and the amount reported marketed in the 12 months ending with July, which is the wheat year for Michigan is 17,922,506 bushels or 7,391,453 bushels more than marketed in the same months of the previous year.

The amount of wheat actually marketed in August this year, 945,-816 bushels, is 167,243 bushels more than marketed in August last year.

Threshers' returns indicate that oats will yield in the state 32 bushels, and barley 24 bushels per acre. The figures for oats are seven bushels and for barley five bushels above the estimate one year ago.

Corn, beans, potatoes and pastures have been injured by the dry weather though scattering showers have afforded partial relief. Beans are estimated to yield 69 per cent and potatoes 72 per cent of average crops.

Apples promise in the state about six-tenths and peaches three-fourths of average crops. The estimate for apples in the southern counties is 52, and for peaches 76. The estimate for apples in the state one year ago was 25, and for peaches 17.

Improving Pastures. If there is any one part of the farm that is neglected in the summer time when th rush of harvesting takes up most of the and attention of all, it is the pasture fields says a writer in Indiana Farmer. While there may begome little excuse for this on large grain farms, it can hardly be overlooked on a dairy farm, where grass and green pasture are the chief dependencies of success. The improvement of pasture fields is a crying need on many old places. As a rule the roughest and most sterile fields are given over to pastures and it is not giving a cow a fair show to make make her pick up a living on land that would not produce anything else This is often the case, however, and then we biame the cow for not giving more milk. Half the fault against our dairy cows can be traced to improper feeding. Because a cow has a large field or meadow to graze in it does not follow that sh ought to give a large flow of milk. much smaller piece of land would produce much better results if the pasture was rich and well cared for. It is all right to giv the cows for pasture the roughest and rockiest part of the farm, fer naturally one does not select that portion for plow ing under crops. But it is the part of wisdom to bestow a little care upon such fields to improve them each year. A few days' labor devoted to the pasture fieles every season will surprise the owner in the results five years latter. First there are rocks and stones that can be gradually carried off the field and piled up. Clear ing the pasture field in this leisurely way will yield its reward some day when it i found desirable to cultivate the meadows or hillside for orchard or field crops. Along with this work should go that og clearing the land of wild berry bushes, brush, root and weeds. The roots once taken up wil kill the bushes and trees for good, and so with the weeds, See that they are rooted up, and not simply cut off. Noxious weeds prevent grass plants from growing. and generally they harbor parasites and rusts of grain which may spread to the cultivated fields any day, and do a grea amount of damage. This work of clearing the pasturse of foreign growths is very important at this season of the year when weeds are about ready to produce their seeds. One plant destroyed root and branch now may prevent the growth of fifty next summer. So it is wise to begin at once, for every year that the work is postponed the pasture field degenerates so much more. While engaged in this work of destruction it might be well to reconstruct, too Plant a few shade trees in the most convenient place of the field and if necessary for their protection tence them in until they attain a good growth. Years arer they will be appreciated by both man beast. Top-dressing is the only thing that can be done in the case of meadows, and I believe it to be the most effectual in the case of wheat, but if much manure is to be drawn it is a little late to leave it till after seeding, for a very little rainy weather will stor their work. year I usually hanl it out to be plowed under and do not feel that a particle of it has been wasted in plowing under. know it is held that wheat roots will not so readily feed on manures that have been plowed under, but I believe that I have practically demonstrated that where ma nure is plowed under the elements permeate the soil and the wheat roots feed abundantly on it, and I think I have demonstrated on my own farm that where rich manures are used it is difficult to topdress without overstimulating the growth in the fall to detriment of the plant thereafter, and in many cases producing an overgrowth of weak straw. In sowing wheat after clover sod fertility does not al lie near the surface, as in top-dressing. It may, and, I believe, usually does, embrace the soil to some depth and the wheat roots seek and utilize just what they need. So I say that I believe that in applying manures we frequently in our generosity, misapply, or rather, overapply our fertility, This, of course, occurs in small grain crops, where the application is too direct, for I do not think that much, if any ground gets too much manure. My ob servation is that about eight or ten acres is as much as the average farmer can manure each year, and because this amount is so meager, compared with the need, I contend that the best possible use should be made of the small amount we can save. I also believe that the fall is the best time to apply manures, as it can then be done with greater economy and with less waste from leaching and evaporation than in the spring. I do not presume to say whether you shall spread from the wagon or from piles; whether you shall haul with two horses or four; whether you shall have two wagons and one team, or have a team to each wagon. These are of small conse quence and will be practiced by each farmer according to his own tastes and circumstances. But here is the point. we emphasize, that nov is the time to haul manure; that it can more easily and more safely be applied to the crops we raise at this time of the year than at any other. It matters not whether it is for wheat now corn or oats next spring, the meadows of the young clover. Now is the time. And now, I say in conclusion, that I believe that manure can be saved in piles and yard sheds, under proper treatment, until this time of the year with such small waste that it will pay better to keep it than to endeavor to draw to the fields during the winter or spring months, when the ground is wet and the crops more easily damaged in driving over them. In a future article I shall treat on conserving fertility in manure piles and yards and on sawdust and its danger of acidity in manures.
