OUR COUNTY SCHOOLS

The last number of "Learning by Doing" is as caustic as usual, which saying a lot.

Reports from the School Inspectors are due now, and most of them have reached the hands of the Commissioner, but a few clerks are holding them. Please send them in at once.

Died, at her home in Watertown, Sanilac county, Mrs. G. W. McElhinney, Thursday Sept. 16th. Mrs. McElhinney was the mother of Miss C. N. McElhinney, who was Supt. of schools here last year.

In several of the school districts of the county the people are so patriotic that they take the flag pole rope to hang out their washing on. No instance is recorded of any loss of feeling since the close of the war; at least the ropes have not been returned.

The Commissioner has begun a trip through the schools of the county. All will be visited within the next few weeks, and another tour made later in the year. A pleasant sight is the flags that greet his eyes as he passes through the school districts of the county. People who never noticed it before are beginning to appreciate the beauty of "Old Glory,"—one result of the Flag Law.

The teachers' journals are particularly rich in supplements this month. The "World" has the Crab; "Popular Educator" "The House Fair;" "Journal of Education," half tone views of California scenery; "Primary Education" has a "Lion and Lioness" and "Elephant at Work" and the "Teachers' Institute," "Camel" and "Alligator." The "American Primary Teachers" shows the Black Bear, in all his glory. The Primary school comes out in a red cover. Educational Extension announces a drop in price from one dollar to fifty cents, the size of the paper to remain the same.

The races yesterday were excellent, and those on the program for today promise to be good.

They Are Afraid.

The auditor-general's report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1897, is not yet in print. Investigation proves that the delay is not the fault of the state printers. Is it possible the administration at Lansing is holding back this report for fear of the result if its extravagance becomes known?

Auditor-General Stone and State Accountant Caldwell, who were officers during the Winans administration, stepped out of office January 1, 1893, but their report was finished, and delayed only by the time necessary in printing, it was ready for the people early in March. By April 1, 1893, the auditor-general's report for the year ending June 30, 1892, was printed, bound and delivered to the people. It is now five months later in the year, this report is not out, and it is doubtful if it will be ready for distribution before election.

Our readers may depend upon it that the figures are not favorable to the administration, and that they are afraid of the comparisons that would be made with those of former administrations.

Council Proceedings.

A regular meeting of the common council of the city of Tawas City, held at the council chamber Tuesday evening, Sept. 27, 1898.

The minutes of the meeting of Sept. 13, 1898 were read, and on motion of Ald. Dove, supported by Ald. Rollin, were approved as read.

The committee on ways, means and finance reported as follows:

Tawas City, Mich., Sept. 27, 1898.

Your committee on ways, means and finance have estimated the amount to be raised for the current expenses for the years 1898-99 for the city, and recommend that the following amounts be raised by taxation on the taxable property of the city:

Total amount to be raised, \$2,130, which shall be apportioned to the several funds as follows: Contingent fund, \$1020 00; General street fund, 500 00; General sewer fund, 10 00; Interest fund, 200 00; Interest and sinking fund, 400 00.

E. P. DOVE, F. W. ROLLIN, Committee.

Moved by Ald. Swartz and supported by Ald. Brown, that the report of the committee on ways, means and finance, be accepted and adopted. Carried, all voting yes.

The following ordinance was offered by Ald. Rollin, who moved its adoption, which was supported by Ald. Swartz:

AN ORDINANCE:

An ordinance to be termed the annual appropriation bill, making provisions for, and appropriating the several amounts, as required to defray the expenditures and liabilities for the corporation of the city of Tawas City, Michigan, for the next fiscal year:

The City of Tawas City ordains:

SECTION 1.—That there shall be raised by general taxation, upon all the taxable property of the city, the sum of one thousand and twenty dollars, (\$1,020), to defray the contingent and other expenses of the city, for the payment on which, from some other fund, no provisions has been made, which said amount so raised shall be placed in and constitute the CONTINGENT FUND of the city.

SECTION 2.—That there shall be raised by general taxation upon all the taxable property of the city, the sum of five hundred dollars, (\$500.00), to defray the expenses of opening, widening, extending, altering and vacating streets, alleys and public grounds, curbing, grading, and otherwise improving, repairing and cleaning the streets, alleys, and public grounds of the city, and for the construction and repair of sidewalks and cross-walks, and for the care thereof, which said sum so raised shall be placed in and constitute the GENERAL STREET FUND of the city.

SECTION 3.—That there shall be raised by general taxation upon all the taxable property of the city, the sum of ten dollars, (\$10.00), to defray the expenses of sewers, drains, ditches, and for draining and improving the water courses of the city, which said sum shall be placed in and constitute the GENERAL SEWER FUND of the city.

SECTION 4.—That there shall be raised by general taxation upon all the taxable property of the city, the sum of two hundred dollars, (\$200.00), for the payment of the bonds of the city, which said sum so raised shall be placed in and constitute the INTEREST FUND of the city.

SECTION 5.—That there shall be raised by general taxation upon all the taxable property of the city, the sum of four hundred dollars, (\$400.00), for the payment of the public debt of the city and the interest thereon, which said sum shall be placed in and constitute the INTEREST AND SINKING FUND of the city.

SECTION 6.—The foregoing appropriations and provisions are made and required to defray the expenses and liabilities of the corporation of the city of Tawas City for the fiscal year, payable from the several general funds, herein before designated, and it is hereby determined that the said several amounts are necessary to be raised by levy at the next general tax levy, and to be paid into the several funds, the object and purpose for which such appropriations are made, as herein above specified and set forth, together with the amounts appropriated for each object or purpose of each of the general funds. This ordinance is made in conformance with Chapter XXX, of Act 215 of the Public Acts of Michigan for the year 1895.

SECTION 7.—This ordinance is ordered to take immediate effect.

The foregoing ordinance and appropriation bill was adopted, all voting yes.

Moved by Ald. Rollin and supported by Ald. Dove, that ordinance No. 33 be taken up and passed to its third reading and read in full. Carried, all voting yes.

Ordinance No. 33, relative to the adoption of the dry earth system was read in full.

Moved by Ald. Dove and supported by Ald. Rollin that ordinance No. 33 be passed as read. Lost by the following vote: Yes, Ald. Dove, 1; no, Ald. Brown, Rollin and Swartz, 3. Total 4.

Moved by Ald. Rollin and supported by Ald. Swartz, that ordinance No. 37 be taken up and passed to its third reading. Carried, all voting yes.

Ordinance No. 37 was then taken up and read in full.

Moved by Ald. Rollin and supported by Ald. Swartz that ordinance No. 37, relative to the riding or running of bicycles, tricycles or tandems within the city, be passed as read. Lost by the following vote: Yes, Aldermen Brown, Dove and Rollin, 3; no, Ald. Swartz; total 4.

Moved by Ald. Swartz and supported by Ald. Brown that council adjourn. Carried, all voting yes.

HAZEN IS A HUMBUG.

And His Acceptance of the Detroit Platform Proves It.

Pingree vs. Pingree, or What the Governor of Michigan Believes Before and After Taking the Gold Cure.

Nothing could prove more convincingly the utter unreliability, inconsistency, and political dishonesty of Hazen S. Pingree than his acceptance of the platform upon which he was nominated at the Detroit convention.

Mr. Pingree has always claimed to be a free silver man. He even talked in favor of free coinage during the campaign two years ago, and immediately after the election announced himself in an interview in the Detroit papers in these words:

"Yes, I am in favor of the free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, and I don't care a damn who knows it."

In a proclamation which he had published in the Detroit papers April 7th, 1897, explaining the reasons for the defeat for his candidate for mayor, he stated that the failure of the prosperity promises of the Republican party, and the ruinous results of the gold standard policy, were responsible for the Democratic victories in Detroit and other places throughout the state. In the course of that proclamation he used these words:

"I predicted after the fall election that the Republican party would never win another victory for the single gold standard, and I am today firmer in my belief than ever."

And yet in the face of similar declarations made time and again in private conversation and in public print, Governor Pingree gave his assent to the following plank in the platform adopted by the convention which nominated him:

"We stand upon the existing gold standard, and condemn the proposition to admit silver free and unlimited at the ratio of 16 to 1."

It will thus be seen that the governor's prediction means his own defeat. Nor is this the only exhibition of duplicity in connection with Pingree's endorsement of the platform. Weeks before the passage of the Dingley bill Governor Pingree violently assailed the proposed measure, and immediately after its passage he published an interview in which he declared that it was in the interests of monopolists and trusts. Among other things he said:

"The hide trust will coin millions out of the new tariff. * * * The promoters of the Dingley bill ought to be proud (?) of it! I predict there will be a reckoning for them yet with the people."

Yet in the face of the fact that from the day of the passage of the Dingley bill up to the day of his nomination Governor Pingree has been denouncing the pretensions that it has been a help to business, his state convention adopted the following tariff plank, and the Governor gave it his unqualified approval.

"We congratulate the country upon the gradual return of business prosperity since the return of the Republican party to power, and point with satisfaction to the successful operation of the Dingley bill."

Nor are these astounding exhibitions of inconsistency all that are made clear by Governor Pingree's acceptance of the platform. It is well known that he is opposed to the policy of retaining any of the territory conquered from Spain. He has so declared in more than one interview, and in a signed communication to a leading Chicago journal, and yet on the heels of this declaration, he climbs upon a platform which says that he believes "that Providence has made this nation the instrument for the uplifting of an oppressed people," and also that "our flag once raised should never be lowered."

Was there ever such a shameless exhibition of moral cowardice and lack of principle?

A Prophecy.

The London Times said about American finances in 1865: If that mischievous financial policy which had its origin in the North American republic during the late war in that country, should become indurated down to a fixture, then that government will furnish its money without cost. It will have all the money that is necessary to carry on its trade and commerce. It will become prosperous beyond precedent in the history of the civilized nations of the world. The brain and wealth of all countries will go to North America. That government must be destroyed or it will destroy every monarchy on this globe."

Powers' Prattle.

Perry F. Powers as a private citizen confessing an honest opinion, says he does not think free silver has anything to do with the low condition of the people in Mexico. Perry as a politician charges everything to free silver. We are surprised that he has not charged yellow fever and other plagues to free silver. The fact is that Mexico has made more progress during the 25 years past under free coinage than during 400 years before. We will credit it to free silver; that we have as much or more reason for doing than he has for attributing the present conditions there to free silver. —Ithaca Journal.


