A LOUD CONVENTION.

A Hot Fight was Made for the County Clerkship, Forty-six Ballots being Required.

The republicans held their county convention at the court house Tuesday and every township in the county was represented with a full delegation except Alabaster. Maynard Butts, of Whittemore, was elected temporary chairman, W. H. Bradley, of Oscoda, temporary secretary. After the appointment of the usual committees a recess of 30 minutes was taken to give them time to report. On reassembling the committees made their reports which were adopted. The temporary officers were made permanent. We did not hear the resolutions but understand that they endorsed everything republican from the administration down. After the reports of the committees had been adopted the convention took a recess until one o'clock.

On being called to order after dinner, the first business taken up was the nomination of a candidate for sheriff, and Peter E. Shien was renominated by acclamation.

The next thing on the program was the nomination for county clerk, and it proved a battle royal. The first ballot gave John A. Marks 17, Frank F. Taylor, 15; Thomas Galbraith, 8; William H. Warren, 5; Gust Karus, 1. The balloting continued with very little change until the 42d so-called informal ballot when Mark received the required 24 votes, Taylor getting 19 and Galbraith 1. A motion was then made to proceed to a "formal" ballot, which resulted in Mark receiving 23, Taylor 20, and two scattering. Two more ballots were then taken each of which were "stuffed." The 46th ballot nominated Mark, he receiving 25 to 21 for F. F. Taylor.

For county treasurer Robert A. Richards was renominated by acclamation. The next nomination was that of prosecuting attorney, which brought out three candidates. A. E. Sharpe, C. A. Jahraus and C. S. Pierce. The first ballot resulted in the nomination of C. A. Jahraus, he receiving 24, Sharpe 19, and Pierce 2. In accepting the nomination Mr. Jahraus said that he had no excuses to offer for being in a republican convention, that when some of his republican friends urged him to accept the republican nomination for prosecuting attorney he concluded to do so. The silence that followed Charlie's remarks was so oppressive that it took some time for the convention to recover.

The balance of the ticket was nominated by acclamation as follows: Circuit court commissioner—G. L. Cornville.

Register of Deeds—John W. King. Surveyor—H. M. Bellknop. Coroners—D. C. Howell, and L. N. Gagnier.

THE faculty of the department of law is now considering plans for the dedication of the handsome new structure which will henceforth be its home. Thus far neither the precise date nor the details of the program have been fully decided upon. It may, however, be said in a general way that the exercises will include three main features. First, there will be an address, probably in the afternoon, in the University Hall, by some distinguished speaker. This will be open to the public, and the public will also be invited to share in the second feature of the program, which will be an inspection of the new building. In the evening there will be a reception of the dean and faculty of the law department, to which the officers and senate of the University, members of the bar, friends of the University, and others will be invited.

Isaac S. Minthorn,

The Democratic-union-silver nominee for state senator from the 28th district, comes from good old revolutionary stock. His father and one brother seryed in the war for American independence, being natives of Connecticut. The present candidate for senator was born in 1834, and settled in Michigan in 1868, taking up a tract of wild land in St. Clair county, where he hewed out a comfortable home. As his family grew up he required more room and so came to Iosco county about fifteen years ago, settling in Wilber township, where he resided for a number of years. Mr. Minthorn has always been a successful farmer and much interested in the agricultural developments of the county.

In politics he was formerly a republican, but becoming dissatisfied with the financial policy of that party and its extravagant expenditure of public fund, he cast his lot with the old greenback party, but for the past twelve years has been an active supporter of the democracy. He has never been a seeker after office, although four years ago, at the earnest solicitation of his friends, he allowed the party to nominate him for the lower house of the state legislature, and made an excellent run in this largely republican district.

Mr. Minthorn is a careful student of all public questions and one of the best posted men in this section of the state. He stands on the right side of the financial question. He is in favor of forcing all corporations to stand their just share of taxation. He is in favor of legislation that will be of benefit to the laboring and farming classes. If elected, he will represent the interests of his constituents and not those of the monopolists and trusts. The voters of the twenty-eighty district will cast their yotes for Isaac S. Minthorn if they wish to have a man in the state senate who is there to represent them.

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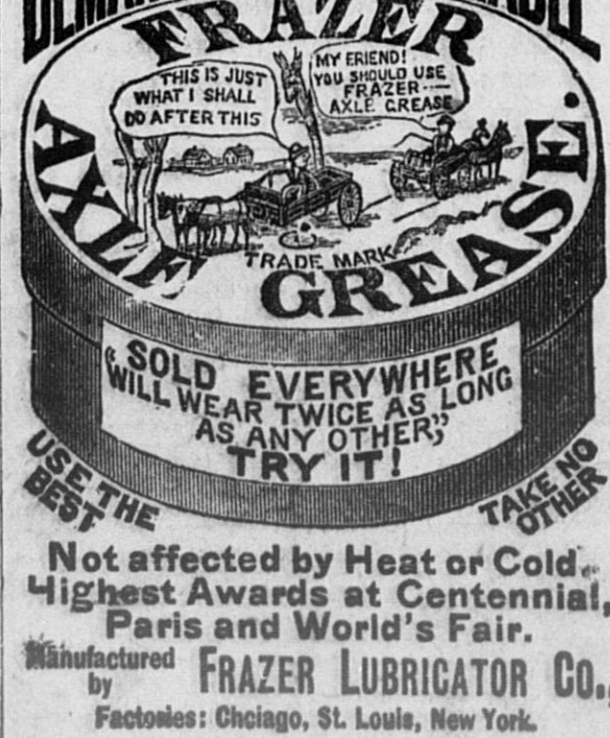

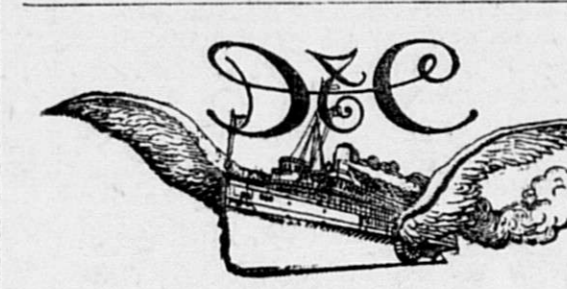
